Bob Larson Speaks On Rock Music

Mr. Bob Larson, renowned lecturer and author on the subject of rock and roll music, will be speaking in Alford Auditorium April 11 at eight o'clock.

The son of a preacher, Mr. Larson became a musical success at the age of 18 when he began writing his own music; and at 15, he had his own rock and roll combo. For more than four years, Mr. Larson performed as a guitarist and singer for the combo. During that time he entertained on radio, on television, in nightclubs, in Convention Hall, Atlantic City, N.J., and received many recording contract offers. He also worked as a rock and roll disc-jockey.

In March, 1963, through the ministry of T. Texas Tyler, formerly a well-known country and western en-

DR. REED RETURNS FROM EUROPE - PLANS BOOK ON ROGER WILLIAMS

"The British Museum is the greatest in the world," according to Dr. John W. Reed who has just finished studying there for several weeks. "The resources are so deep—it was a magnificent experience."

Other experiences Dr. Reed enjoyed were visiting an original crusader church, seeing the street and house where Cromwell led out Charles I and beheaded him, and ingesting beef and kidney pie and about twenty cups of tea a day.

Although disappointed with Spurgeon's Tabernacle, he found at Westminster Chapel Dr. Martyn Lloyd-Jones who also is quite interested in the Roger Williams concept. This was most important to Dr. Reed as Dr. Lloyd-Jones is willing to spend his time reading the work when it is

finished. Mr. Larson committed his life to Christ. At the time, he was studying pre-med at a large midwestern university. Eight months later, through the ministry of Dave Wilkerson, director and founder of Teen Challenge, Mr. Larson was persuaded to enter the ministry. Since that time he has traveled extensively throughout the United States, Canada and many foreign countries. He has lectured at schools, churches, colleges, universities, and civic organizations and has shocked thousands by revealing the effect rock and roll music is having on our society in general and youth in particular.

Mr. Larson has authored a book on the subject of rock and roll music entitled Rock and Roll, The Devil's Diversion. In his book he gives a factual and comprehensive presentation of the subject from an academic and clinical basis. Mr. Larson points out that "Satan is aware that this generation is most likely the one which will see the return of Christ, and he has therefore created a master plan to dominate and control today's youth. Rock and roll music is part of this plan to achieve a world-wide moral decay."

In his lecture at Cedarville, Mr. Larson will explain the origin, development and evolution of music through the years. He will also discuss the psychological, physiological and sociological effect of rock and roll music. In addition, he will relate his personal experiences as a professional musician and songwriter, and will relate his personal experiences as a professional musician and songwriter, and will give a musical demonstration answering the question, "What is rock and roll music?"

FACULTY STARTS STUDENT COMMITTEE

Due to the need for changes and to the problems that seem to exist in relation to the students, the faculty is forming a Student Morale Committee which will include administrators, faculty, staff, and students.

They have drawn five conclusions from their meetings:

1. a student morale problem does exist.
2. many factors contributing to poor student morale could be alleviated.
3. many things have already been done that have been beneficial to student attitudes and indicate that the problem can be partially solved.
4. that there are a number of issues which could have significant bearing on student morale.
5. they are prepared to submit a specific program which will greatly reduce the problem.

The Student Morale Committee asks that the program it has drafted be expanded and implemented prior to the 1970 Fall term.

"I don't want to write an editorial or a letter to the editor about what I really think for fear that it might be taken wrong, might be made fun of, or I might be 'kicked' out of school." Many students have expressed such fears.

Unfortunately, recent occurrences of people castigating others either because the individuals couldn't com-

U.S Financial Equality Equals Communism

Then it was "Liberty, Equality, Fraternity" and today "the streets belong to the people." And so the long hairs, the YSA'ers, the yippies, the hippies, the weathermen, the totality of the new left marches down the Chapel -- is a time for...

teeming streets of our cities. Their message is very clear: revolution! Overthrow the existing government. Why? Because it is a capitalistic system. It is a vulture that must feed on the weak to exist. By our government's very nature it must repress the peoples in other nations (i.e. Vietnam) and at home. In a nutshell, they are saying that the government of the United States is repressive and must be done away with. Do you agree? Do you disagree? Have you thought about it? You should have. So in this issue I would like to start you off in a

thinking process to find an answer to the question, "Is the government of the United States repressive?"

You are probably expecting me to follow true to so called conservative form and disagree with the new left completely. I hate to disappoint anyone, for my answer to this question is yes. But my yes is different than the new left's yes. It is inconceivable to me that our government is repressive because it is capitalistic. Our government is repressive because it is just the opposite of capitalistic. At least it is heading in that direction.

This idea I have just presented is best demonstrated in the following statement by Otto Kerner, former chairman of the National Advisory Commission on Civil Disorders. Mr. Kerner states that "We (the government) are trying to close that breach now, to achieve the great American dream of an equal society." How about that! I'll bet you didn't even know that the great American dream was the formation of an equal society, did you? Well now, I certainly don't want to upset anyone, but that just

happens to be pure, unadulterated communism. Somehow, the great American dream has come directly from the thoughts of Karl Marx. But, one might ask, what is really wrong with the American dream?

To begin with, the dream of equality is an impossible one. People are never equal. Each individual has certain capacities or lack of capacities

The second thing wrong with this new American dream gets back to our original statement: That any government which embarks on the carrying out of this ridiculous dream becomes repressive. The dictionary defines the verb repress, as meaning "to prevent the natural development nothing natural about stifling the development of a more able person in the form of a more heavy tax load so the less able person may be given more money, or a better home, or, perhaps, better clothing, thus making the two equal. (Notice the assumption that equal material possessions make equal persons.)

Another aspect of this repression is seen in the massive campaign on the part of our Federal government to convince the American people that this great American dream of an equal society is a desirable and attainable goal. Our government has to do this because some people have the strange idea that they should be able to keep what they earn. Our government has had to make one segment of society feel guilty that there are those who do not fare as well as they do. So our government has set itself up as a benevolent Robinhood traipsing through the Sherwood Greens taking from the rich and giving to the poor, and at the same time, telling the rich they owed it to the poor all the time.

"And so dear Christian friends, that concludes the presentation of our slides, and we hope it has given you some idea as to the work we'll be doing as missionaries in Brazil. We have eighteen more months of deputation to raise \$300.00 more for our support. Won't you please help us?" Sound familiar? All too familiar I'm afraid.

Christians are faced with the awesome task of evangelizing the world in compliance with Christ's command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel..." Now I'm wondering, what is God's way of undertaking this enterprise?

A man believes he has received a call (whatever happened to the command?) to the mission field. He spends three or four years in Bible or related training, a year or so in missionary internship under a missionary board, and at least two years of deputation work to raise support. At the earliest he has five years delay before reaching his place of "calling."

Someone has said, "If God calls you to be a missionary don't stoop to be a king." Has it ever occurred to you that kings do not beg? Why should a missionary then have to go from church to church begging for support to do a job God has commanded to be the responsibility of every

Christian? A church pledges so many dollars to missions and believes that it should be commended for its great benevolence. Any cause in the world can raise money almost without any effort at all and yet the work of God is greatly hindered because Christians have blindly neglected the priority of evangelizing the world.

Now I do not take issue with mission boards or churches or Christians. That is a matter for which each shall answer to God. But I do have a suggestion for your consideration.

Maybe God's means of provision for missions is to have missionaries be self-supporting. I know of a mission work in Korea which is self-sustaining. The missionary owns and maintains a small farm as a means of food and income. He reaches out to his and surrounding villages with the Gospel. He and his family live there and seldom come to the United States except for serious medical reason. This is a work that is genuine, lasting and fruitful.

Suppose this missionary was working under a mission board. He might live in a mission compound. Funds would be expended for various

necessary items. If his support did not come, his ministry would suffer. If support was completely cut off, he would have to return home.

James Oliver Buswell will be giving a violin virtuoso concert in Alford Auditorium Friday, April 18, at 8:00 p.m.

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Murdoch Predicts Tennis Season

The Cedarville College's tennis team is ready to defend its District 22 championship against some of the toughest competition in the area. Following an extremely successful season last year, Coach Murdoch feels that the team has the potential to be as good as last year's team which won the MOC, the District 22, and then for the third consecutive year went on to the nationals and placed 12th in the nation, the highest any District 22 team has ever finished.

The main reason for the optimism about this year's team is the return of 4 of the top 6 men from last year. Gone, will be numbers 1 and 6 men, Paul Enter and Ron Baker. Dan Ruffin (15-3), Warren Pettit (16-2), Dave Durham (17-0), Dave Beck (16-2), Dan Martin, Dave Nelson, and Mike Coffman will be back.

This year's schedule may be the roughest schedule in the team's history with 19 dual matches plus the MOC Tournament and the NAIA District playoffs. New teams on this year's schedule include NCAA schools Capital, Mount Union, and Xavier. In the MOC, main competition will come from Defiance and Bluffton. In the District, competition can be expected from Ohio Northern. The two teams who play for the district play-off are the district teams with the best records.

Coach Murdoch, who has compiled a 33-10 record over the last 5 years, sets the team goal as "Kansas City, and the NAIA Nationals." He also feels that due to bad weather and lack of opportunity to practice outside the team has not really "jelled" and he looks for improvement throughout the year.

Because of the 6 new tennis courts, Cedarville College will be hosting an invitational tennis tournament for the first time. It is scheduled for Cedar weekend, May 8 and 9.

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


Cedarville College was one of 16 teams from all over the nation chosen to attend. Other colleges included West Chester, Pa., last year's champ, California State, Kansas State; Iowa Wesleyan; Western Carolina; Southern Illinois; and Northeastern, Mass.

In their first game of the tournament, Yellow Jackettes faced Iowa Wesleyan, a very tall team led by a 6' 2" center. Despite 26 points by Pat Wessinger, the Jackettes went down in defeat 54-33. They also lost the second game to Cortland, New York.

In the final game, California State won the tournament by defeating Weschester 50-46 in a tight game. Ursinus College, Pa. came in third and Southern Illinois took 4th.

While they were in Boston, the girls stayed in Miss Kearney's cottage
