Rescue Squad Given New Van

The only one of its kind, Alpha Chi's Rescue Squad is a model for the nation. The American Red Cross is planning to use Cedarville College's Rescue Squad as a model in establishing other units on college campuses across the nation.

A new van, worth over \$5700 was recently given the Rescue Squad for their use during disasters here in the Dayton area. During the month of January the Rescue Squad went to five major fires in the area.

Ed Decker was given immediate assistance by the Rescue Squad when his trailer burned, in the form of \$125 for clothing and \$25 food, through the Red Cross.

Alpha Chi Rescue Squad members are trained in several areas. First aid training is first and essential. In addition to this there is training in mass disaster feeding, plus training in areas of rescue, such as fires, floods and many other types of disaster.

Cedarville is proud of the good job the men of Alpha Chi do. Keep up the good work.


Have you heard about the four day week? Believe it or not, it's here. Some companies are all ready trying it and say production has actually increased. The

Gap Found in Nixon Administration

President Richard Nixon, who said during the 1968 presidential campaign that Humphrey's views on the economy "would make him the most expensive President in American history. In 1970 he submitted the first budget exceeding \$200 billion. And finally, this January 29th he submitted a proposed \$229.2 billion budget. This led me to wonder if, by any chance, Nixon had made any other statements at one time only to find he had to "change his mind." The results, to me, were expected and typical of the Nixon administration's credibility gap. I hope they are eye opening to you.

The first instance involves the 1970-71 budget. In February 2, 1970, the President delivered his Budget Message to Congress. He declared, "I have pledged to the American people that I would submit a balanced budget for 1971...The budget I send you today — the first for which I bear full responsibility as President — fulfills that pledge." Then on May 19, 1970, he said, "I am issuing today the latest revisions of the budget for the fiscal years 1970 and 1971...we now estimate a deficit for 1970 or \$1.8 billion. For fiscal year 1971...\$1.3 billion." And on July 20, 1970, "we announced that (the deficit) in February." Remember, it was February that he announced just the opposite.

The second instance involves economic philosophy before and after the election. In *Fortune* magazine for October 1968, Nixon tore down the deficit spending of the Johnson administration; "The way to stop the inflation is to reverse the irresponsible fiscal policies which produce it." And, "the

accelerated rise in prices in recent years has resulted primarily from an excessively expanding money supply that the intern had been fed by the monetization of the Federal Government deficits." Notice, there are two reasons for inflation; one, expanding money supply, and two, deficit spending. And the way to stop inflation is to reverse those policies that cause it.

The deficit for the budget mentioned in the first paragraph is \$11.6 billion. Listen to Nixon in '70: "Some of the present deficit is government's way of picking up the check for a slow down of inflation." Way to reverse those policies. And how does post-election Nixon feel about expanding money supply? "...As the economy rises toward full employment, more money will be re-

quired to do the nation's business..." In all fairness, however, we must admit that this rise may not be excessive.

The reason the deficit exists is because "we plan our budget on the basis that it would be balanced if we were at full employment. During December unemployment reached 6% — the highest level in nine years! But, you understand, if we were at full employment this budget would be great.

Usually, now, I come up with some answers that arise in my article, however, every time I do people get upset. It really doesn't bother me too much, but this time I will let you answer. The next time you see me you tell me why Nixon says one thing one time and another thing some other time. You tell me why the credibility gap is so huge.

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

'And the Students Murmured'

For the past two weeks, student council has been discussing in some detail a topic about which you have been complaining since you were a one-week freshman — THE FOOD. We've talked about soggy moodles, too much bread in the meat, and not enough variety in the dessert choices; and shatever else is wrong with the food service. In case the members of the Student Council hadn't noticed, the condition of the food and other mistakes the food service has made, there are seven hundred and seventy-one people on campus who will enumerate these obviously "careless" errors for all and any who will listen. This reminds me of a story I once read in Exodus 15 and Numbers 11 which shows what God thinks of murmuring and griping. It goes something like this:

"And the students murmured against Mrs. Smith, saying, 'What shall we drink?' And Mrs. Smith cried unto the Lord; and the Lord showed her a machine which when she had placed it in the cafeteria the waters were made sweet.

"And the mixed multitude that was among them fell to lusting

and the students of Cedarville also wept again and said, 'Who shall give us flesh to eat? We remember the grade A steak which we did eat in our own town freely; the home cooking, the personal touch, and our favorite dishes cooked when we wanted them. But now our soul is dried away; there is nothing at all, besides this surplus good before our eyes.'

"Then the faculty and administration heard the students weep throughout their classrooms and every one in the rooms of his dormitory; and the anger of the Lord was kindled greatly. And Mrs. Smith said, 'Shall the beef and pork allotted in our budget be used to suffice them? Or shall all the fish in the coolers be gathered together for them to suffice them?' And the Lord said unto Mrs. Smith, 'No, but is the Lord's hand become short? Thou shalt see now whether my word shall come to pass unto thee or not. Behold, a truck has entered into the campus with many steaks in it.' And say unto the students, 'Sanctify yourselves for tomorrow, and ye shall eat flesh; for ye have wept in the ears of the Lord, saying, Who

shall give us flesh to eat? For it was well with us at home; therefore the Lord will give you flesh, and ye shall eat. Ye shall not eat one day, nor two days, nor five days, neither ten days, nor twenty days; but even a whole month until it come out at your nostrils, and it be loathsome unto you; because ye have despised the Lord who is among you, and have wept before him, saying why came we forth from home anyway?'

"And all the workers stayed up all that day, and all that night, and all the next day, and they set tables for all the students.

"And they gathered the next day seven hundred, four-score and sixteen souls to partake of the food. Now there being 3000 steaks each took good helpings. And he that gathered least gathered three helpings to himself.

"And while the flesh was yet between their teeth, before it was chewed, the wrath of the Lord was kindled against Cedarville, and the Lord smote the students with a very great plague. And they called the name of that place Kibroth-Lattaavah (graves of lust); because there they buried the students that lusted. And this was written that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by Ralph, the prophet, saying, 'This know, also, that in the last days perilous times shall come. For men shall be lovers of their own selves, covetous,

boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, and unholy."

This is a story similar to the one that thousands of Israelites told to their children in years gone by; but while to them it was just a story, to us it is a shameful reality.

If there is anything repulsive, it is a complaining Christian. One's respect for a man drops tremendously when one hears him murmur to another person about anything. It makes little difference whether the cafeteria is serving stewed hockey pucks or bread floating in grease or pure corn starch. When you open your mouth to say anything derogatory about the condition of the food God has given you, it is in direct disobedience to the Word of God.

Are we in a position to say we're better than the Israelites in the wilderness? No. Our heart is deceitful above all things and desperately wicked just like theirs was and complaining is just as sinful as it ever has been.

We in student council are working closely with the food service to try to have better food and more enjoyable meals. If you have a problem go to Mrs. Smith or your student council representative and you will see results. But one fact should be emphasized to us, namely that this continual murmuring is GODLESS. Student council is the Christian's tool — use it!

Hannah Helps Jamaica

On June 1, Hannah Stowell left Chicago bound for about eight weeks on the island of Jamaica as a summer missionary under Baptist Mid-Missions. She arrived in Montego Bay, the tourist center, that afternoon.

The first five weeks were spent at Fairview Bible College some 45 minutes from Montego Bay. Here Hannah lived in the dorm with the girls, and got a first-hand exposure to native foods and customs. Her main work while there was writing and coordinating DVBS materials. Since the Jamaican people aren't as literate as Americans, it was not feasible to order materials.

The next stop was Kingston, the industrial center of the southeast coast of the island, where she was able to be with American missionaries over July 4. (The other missionaries she stayed with were Canadian.) The language of the island is English, since Jamaica until recently was in British control, and so Hannah had no language barrier. In Kingston she spent the week as head of the primary department. A real thrill was watching the attendance jump from 52 on Monday to 198 on Friday, and being able to lead some of the children to the Lord.

Then it was back to the Bible College for a week. From here Hannah daily commuted to the city for DVBS there.

The final week and a half was spent in Montego Bay. A bus from the school turned over and she had the knowledge that God protects his own, for all the students were saved. In the final week of her stay, Hannah nursed one of the girls who had been in the accident, both of them profiting spiritually from the experience.

A frustrating part of the work was that the Jamaicans knew all the language of salvation, and yet often rejected it and were very difficult to reach. Because of their poverty and uncertainty, they find it very difficult to accept the idea of internal security. They are also a very superstitious people. While she was there, Hannah got to see a meeting of a sect called Pocomanians. They indulge in some form of devil worship, for the leader is powerless when a Christian is present.

Something that really blessed Hannah was seeing a man from the first graduating class of the Bible College out in the work of the Lord. Hannah's father had been present at the graduation ceremony, and it was good to see how the man was continuing to follow and serve God.

Hannah feels that there were distinct advantages in going out as a summer missionary. She got to know the culture of the people and see more places than most tourists. There came the realization that missionary life is not "all peaches and cream" but has some very real problems. To be a missionary, you must learn to live with people. In such close contact, it is only too easy to get aggravated at fellow missionaries. Finally, going out as a summer missionary gives one a good opportunity to let God speak concerning missions — it gives one a vision, and it makes the importance of missions real to one.

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'Jackets to End Roundball Season

The end of another long season is near, as the Cedarville Yellowjackets head into their final three games against Bluffton, Ohio Northern and Grace. Currently the Yellowjackets have a 10-12 season mark, which includes a 3-4 MOC tally, and have had an up-and-down season that has produced some surprises and some disappointments.

Junior John Harrison, freshman Barrett Luketic, and sophomore Dave Branon have improved throughout the season, earning starting spots on the 'Jacket quintet. Luketic, from Hammond, Indiana, earned a starting position about mid-season, and has provided some strong guard play for the Cedarville squad which had its greatest weakness at that position. Averaging 8.3 points a game, Luketic is valuable on offense as a tricky passer and playmaker, as his total of 59 assists attests.

Branon, from Portsmouth, Ohio, has also put in some strong play at one of the guard spots, valuable as a shooter and sticky defensive player. He is averaging 5.0 points per game.

John Harrison earned a starting position about mid-season and since then has vaulted himself into the Mid-Ohio Conference lead in field goal percentage with a .621 percentage.

Seniors Don Atherton and Gary Holbrook continue to pace the club in many departments. Atherton leads in scoring with a 21.9 average, while Holbrook is close behind with an 18.5 average. Both are good enough for second and sixth place ratings respectively in the MOC. In the rebounding department Holbrook holds the team and MOC lead with a 13.0 average, with Atherton close behind with a 12.0 average, good enough for third in the MOC.

Harrison leads the MOC in field goal percentage at .621, with Holbrook third at .546 and Atherton tenth with a .473 percentage.

As a team, Cedarville leads the MOC in field goal shooting with a .466 percentage.

Next Saturday the 'Jackets entertain Bluffton in an MOC battle. Cedarville took the first game by an 82-74 count, upsetting them soon after they had knocked off MOC leader Findlay. Overall Bluffton has a 10-10 record, which includes a 5-2 MOC mark.

Cedarville then closes out its 1970-71 season with a home game against Ohio Northern on Tuesday, February 23, and an away game at Grace College on Saturday, February 27. Both games will be the first meeting this season between the clubs.

Varsity Tops Malone; Loses to Defiance

The Cedarville Yellowjackets, showing a steadier offense defeated Malone on Saturday February 6, and then lost a close game to Defiance on the following Tuesday.

Against Malone, the last place team in the MOC, the 'Jackets combined accurate firepower and overwhelming board strength to beat Malone for the second time this year 96-83. Cedarville was never behind as Gary Holbrook and Don Atherton played the inside game to perfection and guards Barret Luketic and Dave Branon completely defeated the semi-press used by Malone and with good passes set up bucket after bucket off the shuffle. Holbrook had 19 points and Atherton and Harrison had 8 each on the way to a 49-40 half-time advantage.

Cedarville quickly widened the lead in the second half as they shot better than 50% — going on top by 19 points with about 10 minutes left and stretching it to 21 with about 3 minutes left. Lynn Howard came off the bench in the second half and spurred the 'Jackets with 2 fielders and 7 charity points — including 2 technical foul shots. Cedarville also cleaned the boards crisply in the second half with Gary Holbrook taking down 13 caroms and Don Atherton adding 4 more.

The game also vaulted John Harrison into first place in the MOC in shooting percentage. He is now 54-87 for .621. Gary Holbrook also show well with 10-12, bringing his percentage up to .546 for 3rd in the MOC. The team also has the best percentage in the MOC at .466.

Against Defiance, the Yellowjackets again showed their offensive capabilities, but could not hang on to a slim 5 point lead when the chips were down. A seesaw battle, the 'Jackets had to come back from a 12 point half time deficit, and did so. However, their momentum evaporated and they were outscored 12-2 in the last two minutes for the final score of 86-81.

Again, the outstanding feature

of Cedarville's game was a steady deliberate offense with accurate shooting. The 'Jackets hit 34 of 57 from the field for a 59.6% mark, a good 10% above their season average. Don Atherton led the deadly floor show with 11-16 with Gary Holbrook, Dave Branon and John Harrison close behind. Balanced scoring and great guard play kept us in the ball game early and gave the impetus for a second half charge that almost won the game.

Cedarville, behind from the beginning, led at only one point in the first half at 26-25 with 8:20 left in the half. After half-time, however, the 'Jackets climbed right back in the game as Defiance could not hit a field goal for six minutes and the 'Jackets scored 24 points to 11 for Defiance. That put it at 61-60 and Cedarville pushed it to a 6 point edge with 5:04 to go at 74-68. At 2:09 Cedarville held a 5 point lead, but that quickly disappeared as an aroused Defiance scored 10 points in a row to take an 84-79 lead.

Good team play was the reason for Cedarville's near upset of pre-season MOC favorite Defiance. Guards Branon and Luketic each handed out 8 assists, with Gary Holbrook adding 6. Cedarville also took advantage of some Defiance turnovers in the second half to build the short-lived lead. Turnovers also were way down from the Malone game with only 18 for the 'Jackets. However, a couple of miscues near the end spelled the end of Cedarville's upset hopes. The game also featured newly eligible Terry Clapp in his first appearance for Cedarville.

Did You Know?

Man has always had the desire for competition. It is this desire that has led to the establishment of scores of leagues in scores of different sports. Among one of the more popular, in the United States anyway, is basketball, where the level of competition has extended to the organization of so-called professional leagues. Since its institution many years ago, professional basketball has produced many records. Among these (taken from Guinness Book of Records) are:

GAMES

The most consecutive games is 844 by Johnny Kerr of Philadelphia and Baltimore between October 31, 1954 and November 4, 1965.

The most games won by one team is 68 by the Philadelphia 76ers in 1966-67. They suffered just 13 losses.

The most consecutive games played without a disqualification on fouls is 787 by Wilt Chamberlin between October 24, 1959 and mid-1969.

POINTS

The most points scored by an individual in one game is Wilt Chamberlin (Philadelphia) on March 2, 1962. In that game Chamberlin made 36 field goals in a record 63 attempts, and scored a record 28 free throws.

ASSISTS

Bob Cousy (Boston) made 28 assists in one game in February, 1959. Guy Rodgers (Chicago) made the most assists in a season, with 908 in 1966-67. The most assists by a team in one game is 51 by Sheboygan in March, 1950. The season record is 2,154 by Cincinnati in 1961-62.

FIELD GOALS

Wilt Chamberlin (Philadelphia) made the most field goals (36) in one game in March, 1962, and in November, 1963 (while with San Francisco) shot 18 in succession. Boston made the most field goals in one game (72) in February, 1959. Philadelphia holds the season record with 3,917 in 1961-62.

FOULS

Bailey Howell holds the record for the most personal fouls in one season with 345.

FREE THROWS

The most free throws made by one person in a game is 28 by Wilt Chamberlin on March 2, 1962, and the most scored in a season is 840 by Jerry West (Los Angeles) in 1965-66. The most consecutive foul shots made is 56 by Bill Sharman (Boston) in the 1959 play-offs. Syracuse made the most free throws in one game, 59, in November, 1949. Detroit set a season record in 1960-61 with 2,408.

Four Cedarville men pinned their opponents; Les Chambers, Steve Francis, Mark Stevenson and Dave Globig. Jake Tipton won by forfeit and Tim Northey and Bill Tobias decided their men.

The triangular meet score was Bluffton 52, Cedarville 48, and Malone 28. Grapplers are now preparing for the conference meet this Saturday.
