

Remember the dates -October 21, 22 and 23 - and plan on attending NOW!!


A Plea To All OARBC Pastors

On Wednesday evening of October 11, 1973, the Calvary Baptist Church of indiay, Ohio (Rev. Richard Snavely, pastor) suffered a devastating fire. These dear people met the very next Lord's Day in a nearby High School wilding to continue their testimony for the Lord. The work is going on... buls are being saved and believers are being strengthened! In a recent issue of their church paper "Glimpses of Calvary", there pre-red the following article under the heading -- "Ground Breaking 'hase IV"....

Sunday was a memorable day in the history of Calvary Baptist Church, when the entire congregation gathered on the church site following the morning service, to formally break ground for the new \$507,000.00 Phase IV building project. One could sense a spirit of nostalgia, thankfulness, unity and joyous anticipation as they crowded inside the boundry lines of the proposed new building which had been outlined to exact size by Ted Blunk and Willis Powell. The auditorium is to be 101' x 101', going out to 108' some places seating 870 on the main floor, with 230 in the balcony and 100 in the choir loft. The adjoining education unit, including restrooms, choir warm-up and multipurpose room, three nurseries and bookstore is approximately 64' x 64'.

Gary Johnson, bus coordinator, voiced the opening prayer thanking God for former groundbreakings and the opportunity to break ground again today; for souls saved since the tragic fire and petitioning God for the safety of our buildings and the continued unity of the church family.

Pastor Snavely challenged the group with Acts 18:9-11 "...Be not afraid, but speak and hold not thy peace. . For I am with thee . .for I have much people in this city." He pointed out our new building was a place where ones can hear, believe, follow the Lord in believers baptism and then grow in spiritual maturity to reproduce themselves in the lives of others. He stated, "God would say to us today, speak and hold not thy peace, we have a message from this very Word ones need to hear. <u>A year ago</u> today we broke ground for Phase III. Though Satan would have <u>estroved us. God would say to us 'I have much people in this</u> ity and in this country that need to be reached with the Gospel of Jesus Christ.' The main purpose of the fire was that we might enlarge our buildings to do a better job for God in this area."



Tokens of Appreciation

The Executive Director of Hiawatha Baptist Missions, Rev. Guy E. King, and his wife Marian were honored at special services during the two day sessions of the H. B. M. 32nd Annual Council Meeting in Silvis, Illinois, June 6 and 7, 1974.

June 6 and 7, 1974. Rev. King is retiring as Executive Director of Hiawatha Baptist Missions effective September 1st of this year. The Kings have served as missionaries for 28 years. Our brother will remain with HBM serving in an advisory capacity as Field Director. Eighty-six missionaries and council members along with friends from the Silvis area were present for the occasion.

The Kings were presented with a \$2,000 gifton behalf of all the friends of HBM. Mr. King received a watch inscribed: 21 years as Executive Director. Donald Dove, Chairman of the HBM Field Council, presented them with a handmade quilt consisting of 77 squares made by the missionary wives and were representative of each mission station. The quilt blocks were yellow finished with orange, gold, brown and green and put together with deeper yellow and brown with gold color backing. Guy and Marian King were approved as missionaries in 1946. For six

Guy and Marian King were approved as missionaries in 1946. For six and one-half years they labored at Watersmeet, Michigan, before accepting the call to Escanaba to assume the duties of Executive Director upon the death of Rev. Arthur Glen.

Vital Decisions At C.O.M.E. Conference

At the 7th Annual Meeting of C.O.M.E. held recently in the Memorial Baptist Church, Columbus, Ohio decisions of far-reaching implication were made.

A permanent, staffed office is to be opened in Northern Ohio; a fulltime General Director was extended a call; two additional evangelists became associated with C.O.M.E.; new Board Members were added; and, TWO PROJECTS APPROVED FOR 1975 - the Marquardts to Brazil and the Morrells to Jamaica. The entire Conference was

Report On National

GARBC Conference

The opening crowd, Monday night, June 24, 1974, at the Ocean Grove, N.J. annual Conference of the GENERAL ASSOCIATIONOF REGULAR BAP TIST CHURCHES was unusually large for opening nights according to the GARBC's National Representative, Dr. Joseph M. Stowell (formerly Pastor of First Baptist Church in Hackensack, N. J. for over 25 years). The num-ber was 3,131. Dr. Stowell estimated Tuesday's crowd at "over 4,000." Wednesday and Thursday nights had people in the balconies of the Great Auditorium as well as on the main floor, and is estimated at between 5,000 and 6,000.

Thursday and Friday were YOUTH DAYS at the Conference, and over 582 young people from all over the United States registered for their special programs these two days. Many more at-tended who did not register. This is a higher registration for youth than at any recent GARBC Conference, according to a spokesman here in Ocean Grove at the conference grounds.

With the new churches that were added to the Association this year (less any of those that dropped out) the number of churches increased from 1473 to 1495, or a net gain of 22 churches.

The messengers from these churches elected for two year terms nine new men on the Council of Eighteen which represents the Association between Conferences: (1) Dr. Fred Brock, Salem, Ore-gon; (2) Pastor Russell Camp, Butler, Pennsylvania; (3) Pastor Ralph Colas, Waterloo, Iowa; (4) Pastor Mark Jackson, Muskegon, Michigan; (5) Pastor Don Jennings, Ypsilanti, Michigan; (6) Dr. Wen-dell Kempton, Cherry Hill, New Jersey; (7) Pastor David L. Moore, Cleveland, Ohio; (8) Dr. Ernest Pickering, Clarks Summit, Penn-sylvania; (9) Pastor Don Sewell, Toledo, Ohio. Nine additional members continued in office on the Council of Eighteen. A New Jersey Pastor, Dr. Carl Elgena, Pas-tor of Bethel Baptist Church, Cherry Hill, New Jersey, was elected as the Chairman of the Council of Eighteen for the coming year, and Dr. Ernest Pickering, President of Baptist Bible College in Clarks Summit, Pennsylvania, was elected Vice Chairman of the Council. Dr. Elgena also served as this year's General Chairman of the local New Jersey Committee that made arrangements for the Ocean Grove Conference.

Each day, from 10:00 to 11:00 a.m., Dr. Fred R. Brock, Jr., from Salem, Oregon, brought a series of vital messages on the HOME and FAMILY.

About a dozen Chaplains, both active and inactive, took part in Thursday morning's CHAPLAINS HOUR at 9:00 a.m., led by Dr. William E. Kuhnle, Chairman of the GARBC's Chaplains Commision. Chaplain Ray Pritz, Colonel, U.S. Air Force, brought the message of challenge for all the chaplains after each had given a brief word of greeting and a synopsis of their present duty in the Armed Forces.

Music throughout the conference was provided by Cedarville College, Cedarville, Ohio, and Baptist Bible College, Clarks Summit, Pennsylvania. These two musical groups did an excellent job in setting the stage for messages which followed them. The GARBC had a first reading

of some changes and additions to its doctrinal statement during the conference. A second reading will take place in their 1975 conference at which time there will be discussion and debate on the details. Dr. David Nettleton, member of the Council of Eighteen who was Chairman of this Committee, stated that these changes are a

strengthening of the doctrinal position of the Association, and were made so as to keep the GARBC very clearly in its historical and Biblical position, but with clarification in terms to provide for current changes in the theological climate of the world.

Included in the YOUTH ACTIVI-TIES of the conference was the TALENTS FOR CHRIST contest, where young men and women from all over the United States competed in the areas of Bible knowledge, Boy's Public Speaking, Boy's Voice, Brass, Girl's Public Speaking, Girl's Voice, Journalism, Or-gan, Piano, and Strings. Winners were selected in two rounds, a pre-liminary on Thursday, and a final on Friday. A panel of three judges in each category decided the winners. Trophies for second and first place were handed out by Dr. Duane Brown, Chairman of the Youth Committee of the Council of Eighteen.

The conclusion of the GARBC Conference on Friday evening was a spectacle in itself. Before the final message of the Conference delivered by Pastor David L. Moore, of the Cedar Hill Baptist Church, Cleveland, Ohio, on "THE LOVE OF GOD," two of the musi-cians from the TALENTS FOR CHRIST contest performed their winning selections-one playing the huge Ocean Grove auditorium organ, one of the largest pipe or-gans in the entire world! Then, in dramatic, suspense-filled style, the final night's crowd stood to their feet, while the new Council of Eighteen Chairman, Dr. Carl Elgena, Pastor of Bethel Baptist Church, Cherry Hill, New Jersey, asked the congregation assembled to sing "AMERICA" with the large American Flag in the center of the stage lighted up. At the same time on the program's agenda for the evening, Miss Lori Bourgeois, member of South Baptist Church, Flint, Michigan (with Dr. Kenneth Elgena, Pastor), delivered her first-place, stirring speech on "AMERICA -- DESTINY UN-KNOWN!" At the conclusion, she asked, "Will a REAL American please stand up?!" and the entire sudiance aroace as man! These audience arose as one man! These Regular Baptists really do love their country!

The GARBC passed a total of eight resolutions this year. 

What About The Finance Of The Ohio Association????

An Editorial by the Treasurer

Each issue the O.I.B. carries a financial report. As you read the paper you have seen that in most instances there is a very small useable balance and in many cases a deficit. Someone occasionally asks, "How do we continue to operate?" Well, it is very simple. The first of each month finds the major portion of the gifts arriving - so we use the next months receipts immediately. This means we are always behind. When the O.I.B. has a combined month we catch up a wee bit.

During the last year the O.I.B. has increased in size - almost double the previous magazine and it has been sent to every church in the association in sufficient number to allow each family to have a copy. This means in the past year the circulation of the O.I.B. has more than doubled. This is good for our advertisers - and good for all because it is now an instrument of information for all churches and families. It looks like we will end the year, September 30th, about the same as other years - Even. The new O.I.B. enlarged and increased has not cost us any more than before but of course we do not have nearly as many paid subscriptions as before. Many churches send in monthly gifts which has helped to pick up the subscription slack. But you have noticed each month the special financial report of the O.I.B. and it always ends with a deficit.

Two or three times in the last five years we have challenged the churches to bring a special gift to the annual conference to erase deficits and to give the treasury a good balance at the beginning of the fiscal year. This was a tremendous help. One year better than \$2,000 was given, another year \$1800.00 and still another year \$1500.00.

We have almost 200 churches in the Association. A \$25.00 monthly gift or support from each church would give us a continuing good working balance.

- WHAT CAN WE DO -- SOME SUGGESTIONS:
 - 1. Plan now to send a special gift from your church with your Pastor and messengers to the annual conference in Toledo. (An absurd example - 100 churches bring \$100.00 each would be a \$10,000.00 beginning.)
 - 2. Consider giving as has been suggested at least 5¢ for each copy of theO.I.B. your church receives. This would pay the printing cost of the magazine.
 - 3. Put the General Fund, State Missionary, O.I.B. all three or at least one on your regular monthly church budget.

We are a fellowship of churches, no one can legislate, only suggest. But from a business sense our association operates with a minimal budget. We have a State Missionary, Editor of the O.I.B. and printing expense. Believe it or not all other expenses of the association, apart from the annual conference, amount to less than \$150.00 per year.

We ask your suggestions - we encourage you to participate - we are open to your questions.






Mr. Danny F. Orr



Is It Of The Lord?

There is much confusion today in the realm of worship. With the Charismatic movement sweeping the Christian Church like a storm, many do not know if it is the Lord or not. Upon examining the Word of God, this brief observation is being presented as worthy of further examination.

Satan always appeals to the five senses: touch, taste, hearing, sight and smell. The Lord, on theother hand, appeals to the creative or reasoning part of the human intellect.

In Isaiah 1:18 we read - "Come now, and let us <u>reason</u> together, saith the Lord." Again in John 3:36a - "He that <u>believeth</u> on the Son hath everlasting life." In Ro-mans 8:1 - "There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the <u>flesh</u> but after the Spirit."

All non-Christian religions appeal to the flesh and its senses in their worship. True Biblical Christianity teaches that the flesh and its senses must be considered as being "dead". After the body and its senses are yielded to God the Holy Spirit, He will make them to become enjoyable in their proper and wholesome manner.

It might also be observed that every believer who has failed in his Christian experience has failed because of two things: (a) failure to read God's Word daily, devotionally and (b) Satan has attacked the believer through the senses and he has yielded to Satan's suggestions.

This is a safe rule of thumb and is worthy of serious examination. Any faith, be it Christian or non-Christian, that appeals to the senses in its worship is Satan influenced - thus unscriptural. 



"So" - The Word Of Manner

Very little attention is given by the majority of writers and commentators to this two-letter word, which is for the most part apparently not considered as particularly meaningful in exegesis. In general it is overlooked, disregarded, and in some cases misused and misinterpreted. Most readers pass over it as having no importance to the meaning of the passage, and therefore discard it as being insignificant. Actually this little word "so"

(Greek houtos) is an adverb of manner, and appears more than 200 times in the New Testament. Its basic sense is "in this manner, thus, in such a way." Because of its native demonstrative force, it ordinarily refers to what precedes in the sentence or paragraph, although it appears several times in certain passages to prepare the way for what follows, in the same sense of "in this manner, thus." In eight passages in the New Testament it is said to mark adegree of intensity, but in the majority of these uses the word is best rendered in its native sense of manner. It is most interesting and instructive to consider this remarkable little word in several passages where it should be translated properly "in this manner."

1... The passage in Matt. 1:18.

The first sentence of this verse is the announcement of the virgin birth of our Lord Jesus Christ, the facts of which are set forth in the rest of the paragraph, vs. 18b-25. It should be noted that the words "of Jesus Christ" are placed forward, i.e. they appear first in the sentence, and therefore bear a particular emphasis. Even here, in this word arrangement, our attention is purposely drawn to the miraculous manner of His entry into the world.

This is the point of importance. It is the manner of Christ's origin which Matthew describes: "Now the birth (origin, Greek <u>genesis</u>) of Jesus Christ was in this wise (houtos: "in this manner"). No other person ever had an origin in this manner. Human births are indeed wonderful, but no human has ever been born in such a way as this. Our Lord's entry into the world by miraculous conception and birth is denied by modernism. by the liberal theologians and religious leaders of our day, but the facts stand as they are recorded here in full detail. The birth of Jesus Christ was in this manner: the virgin shall be with child and shall bring forth a son and they shall call His name Immanuel, which being interpreted, is God with us.

2... <u>The passage in John 3:16.</u>

Scripture is rendered: "For God so loved the world...." That is, He loved the world to such an intense and <u>unsurpassed degree</u> that He gave His Son. That such is true cannot be questioned. That God did love the world to such an extent, to such an astounding degree, is the testimony of the cross. God the Father has revealed it, the Son of God has attested it, and the Scriptures witness to it. However the word "so" (houtos) is to be taken in close connection with the preceding context, and denotes manner. In other words, the way in which God so astoundingly loved the world and the manner in which He demonstrated it is all set forth

in vs. 14-15. "And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so (houtos) must the Son of Man be lifted up, That whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have eternal life."

It was in this manner that God loved the world. He sent His Son to be lifted up on the cross for sinners. The incident of the brazen serpent is well known. See Numbers 21:5-9. It must not be allegorized for the brazen serpent on the pole was commanded by God, and held up to the eyes of the Israelites as the symbol and reminder of their own serpent plague which had come upon them through God's wrath because of their rebelliousness and sin. Simply by looking up to it in obedience and faith, they might acknowledge their sins with true repentance, and receive deliverance from the deadly serpent-bites.

The brazen serpent on the pole is thus a symbol of sin judged, and is a type of Christ "made sin for us" (2 Cor. 5:21), in bearing our judgment on the cross. Hence, in this manner God loved the world: He gave His Son, the Lamb of God, to be lifted up in the wilderness of this world-age, on the cross of Calvary, to bear divine wrath for sins in His own body on the tree. It was in this special way that God demonstrated both His love and His wrath, by holding up to the eyes of whole world the death of Christ on the cross in order that whosoever believeth in Him might not perish, but have everlasting life.

This is the sense of "so" - borne out by the context of vs. 14-15, in an unforgettable manner, for all men to look upon and see what their sins did to Christ the Son of God, and seeing this - to repent and be saved.

3... The passage in 2 Peter 1:11.

The "so" (houtos) in this significant statement is obviously the adverb of manner. Peter says, For <u>in this manner</u> an entrance shall be supplied for you richly into the eternal Kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ." The word stands emphatically first in the sentence, and reaches back to pick up and carry forward "these things" of vs. 8, 9, 10, to the thought of v. 11. It therefore has the force of a result, i.e. as the result of do-ing "these things" entrance shall in this way be furnished for you richly into glory. The point is not at all that good works shall gain for us an entrance into heaven, nor that the way shall be made great and wide for the diligent. The true sense is that God will richly reward the believer who earnestly seeks to bear fruit by acquiring the great Christian virtues named in vs. 5-8, and who diligently uses God's gift of grace.

It is God's will for us to confirm our calling with a life agreeable to and in accord with that calling, Steady growth in grace and increase in the accurate knowledge of God and His will are to characterize the Christian's life and experience. Our Heavenly Father supplies the grace and mercy, and all that is necessary for such a life, and He expects to see "these things" developed in our continuing experience. Our path to glory is that of grounding and growing in the most holy faith, and this is making our calling and election sure. At the end, then, God will provide for us the grandest reward of grace, and will amply and abundantly supply all that the act of entering our Lord's Kingdom needs. "In this manner" we shall enter. This is the road we must travel, and the way of fruit-bearing is the indispensable evidence of our Christian faith and state as well as the manner of entrance into the glory. How are you travelling, friend?

Man--From A Mere Explosion?

"Man is a biological product of evolutionary processes that occurred over thousands of years. . .After three billion years, man developed from the primates. . . the apes are his closest relatives. In earliest Africa, man emerged. . . the growth of his brain was phenomenal. . .

Related to an ape! That message permeated the minds of hundreds of Co-lumbus, Ohio T.V. viewers as they absorbed the content of a National Geo-graphic film entitled, "The Time of Man," aired on WTVN Channel 6, on May 23, 1974. "A product of evolution... a developed pri-mate..." the thought aroused one Columbus listener to action Columbus listener to action.

In a letter to the WTVN station management, Pastor Ernest Fin-kenbiner, of the Maranatha Bible Baptist Church in Marion, Ohio, claimed that the program display-ed "a vigorous denial of the Bibli-cal account of creation." He asked for time to present the creationists' view and was granted one hour of prime time for a panel discussion. With agreement in hand, Pastor Finkenbiner assembled the panel for the July 23 program. The group included, Pastor James Custer of the Grace Brethren Church, Worthington, Ohio; Dr. Walter Griffeth, Professor of Biology at Cedarville College, Cedar-ville, Ohio; and Dr. John C. Whitcomb, Professor of Theology at Grace Theological Seminary, Winona Lake, Indiana, a published author in the area of origins.

The portion of the film to which the four men directed their attention centered on three major areas: the "Big Bang" Theory of Origin, What is Man?, and Man's Outlook for the Future.

Opening the 10:00 p.m. discussion, Dr. Whitcomb, author of the Genesis Flood, addressed himself to the question of origins. According to the film, billions of years ago, the collection of gases in the atmosphere exploded, and from it, the universe, including the sun, emerged. Through similar processes, our earth was formed. Dr. Whitcomb stated that our world and mankind did not originate following atmospheric gaseous explosions, but were created by the Word of God through His power. He said science realizes that living things do not increase in complexity by themselves. This fact "is utterly deadly for the "Big Bang uneory yet evolutionary processes demand such a happening.

Dealing with the creation of our universe prompted another question. What is man? Is he a biological process? Is he a developed primate? Tackling that question, Pastor Finkenbiner stated that man's origin was the direct decision of a sovereign God. Man was created in the image of God. Man is not an evolved primate, Pastor Finkenbiner asserted.

"Man is an amazing, complex, and intelligent creature made in the image of his Creator."

In further establishing Biblical authority for his statements, the 72 year-old pastor cited Genesis 2:18-25, which related the fact of Adam's domination over the creatures of the earth. Adam named the cattle, fowls, and beasts.

Creation of the world, and of man, stemmed from the work of God. Man has lived upon the earth for centuries. Can he still survive? Dr. Walter Griffeth feels that men, especially Christians have a unique opportunity to help care for the earth and its plants and animals. "Good ecology is a Christian re-sponsibility" on a God-created earth. Ultimately, though, Dr. Griffeth stated that question must be answered both yes and no. Physical man will not survive. Spiritual man will, in heaven or hell.

Man must realize his place in the universe as a created being and must recognize his place before his Creator.

A major project such as that undertaken by the four men demanded a keen understanding of the responsibility before them. Pastor Custer, who summarized the dis-cussion at the conclusion of the program, joined the panel because 'it would provide an opportunity to reach a wide range of people who are not exposed to Biblical statements concerning origins and their own personal destiny." The sandy-haired, articulate pastor commented that the whole theory of evolution is devastating in the lives of those who feed on it. "It is a philosophically acceptable sys-tem for their thinking patterns," he said.

A philosophically acceptable sys-tem, perhaps? Yet does complex man result from a mere explosion?
