> You men are first of all godly, faithful men who sense deeply the calling of God in your life. You are men of the Book and men who know the work of prayer. Eachone has a pastor's heart (Phil. 1:7). By and large, our men are not satisfied with mediocrity, but are faithfully buying up the opportunity in the place where God has put them, whether it be large or small. My hat goes off to many of our men who are in difficult places where the opportunities are relatively small when it comes to rapid and large growth. In this day when the success syndrome bug has bitten some people, it is good to seemen who build solidly and well to the full potential of their church and community. We rejoice, too, with

Our men are preachers of the Word and hold to a balanced, dispensational approach to Bible study and preaching. This makes each of you a believer in and preacher of futuristic prophecy. You labor in the light of the imminent return of Christ. You are concerned about having an intelligent, welltaught membership that knows the Word of God. In a society that has gone in the way of Cain, like

would stand on every issue.

Our men are concerned for souls. They are in there, snatching men as brands from the burning, and following a true pattern of Biblical evangelism, Sunday School building, and of challenging youth. The typical GARBC pastor is a recruiting officer to get his young people enlisted for worldwide conquest for Christ. He pleads with them not only to be saved, to have a strong Christian character, but to also yield all of life to the will of God, so that the Holy Spirit may thrust them forth and deploy them to the ends of the earth. He is deeply involved in our worldwide missionary enterprise and is imbued and caught up with the idea of the importance of church plant-

By conviction he walks a path of personal separation. You will not find him at the movies. He does not become involved in social dancing. He is against the liquor traffic and practices total abstinence. He shuns all forms of worldliness that would militate against his spirituality, his testimony and the highest effectiveness of his service for Christ. He avoids vulgarity, is refined—and in speech is beyond

He is thoroughly convinced along the lines of our stand on ecclesiastical separation and is conversant about the issues of our day. He does not cooperate with the local

ministerial association in his community, which has in it liberals, modernists and often outright unbelievers. He is not a member of such an organization with a mixed multitude. He does not cooperate in union religious services in his community which involve these same, diverse types of people. When it comes to such issues as Explo 72 and Key 73 there is no question in anyone's mind where he stands. He is aware of the compromise and dangers of Neoevangelicalism and opposes this popular movement. He is not led astray by the Charismatic thrust of our day. He is not involved in it, and teaches his people to stand against it. He sees the weaknesses of interdenominationalism as a movement. He is convinced of our Baptist distinctives. In all of this he is not soft, but takes a firm stand. He will not bow when the pressure becomes great. In the midst of his firmness, however, he seeks (like Daniel) to maintain an excellent spirit (Dan. 6:3).

A typical GARBC pastor believes firmly in the central place of the local church in God's work in the world. He loves the church of which he is the pastor and longs for its welfare. He sets a pattern for the flock. He is a tither.

He loves our GARBC Fellowship. He is not an isolationist. He prays and works to the end that the Fellowship may be kept pure; that it may know great peace and pros-perity. He is glad to be a part of it and is concerned for it. He pushes our approved agencies and our camps. He enjoys the state and national Fellowship meetings and attends whenever he can.

He is a family man. He seeks to have his home an example to the entire church and community of what Christ can do in the family setting. His wife is a precious helpmate. He longs to have his children walking in the way of God. He has no greater joy than to know that his children walk in truth (3 John 4).

God bless you men. May your tribe increase!



The missionary and his co-workers have been praying for more emit workers and all of a sudden, the young man or woman appears on the gy horizon in the M.A.P. Program. The opportunity to expose a raw 3 apti recruit to missions is possible, and this opportunity presents a per blessed challenge. The missionary's desire is to be used of the Lord light to inform the apprentice of the work, burden him for the work, and Heldi train him in the work. It could very well be a new experience for both even though the missionary happens to be a veteran. Mistakes are age t made and this only makes the missionary more determined to be the better prepared for next year's apprentice. 

THE CORINTHIAN CATASTRO-PHE (by George E. Gardiner, Kregel Publications, P.O. Box 2607, Grand Rapids, Michigan 49501, 1974; paperback, 56 pages, 95¢)

This is a clear and concise presentation concerning Paul's purpose in writing the Corinthian letters. One, major purpose was to clean up the selfish evil desire displayed by many to capitalize on the tongue "sign" for the purpose of gaining fame and popularity. Upon this subject the study centers.

In his background regarding the conditions existing in the city and the church, the author depicts the church at Corinth as "A church which was arrested in development, charismatic inpractice, immoral in living, and heretical in doctrine. The Corinthian Catastrophe!" This book offers an excellent scriptural study and appraisal of the tongues movement then and now. It clearly answers the arguments proposed by today's charismatic adherents. It would be well for pastors to make this easily understood book available to their people.

NO GREATER JOY (by Ruth A. Woodworth, Regular Baptist Press, 1800 Oakton Blvd., Des Plaines, Ill. 60018, 1975; paperback, 70 pages, \$1.25.)

A missionary biography from the life and pen of one of God's faithful servants. In the Philippines, Ruth Woodworth served the Lord for many years under the Association of Baptists for World Evangelism. Her terms of service surrounded those dreadful years of World War II--years of disaster and despair. This life story details the personal heartaches brought on by seasons of sickness, sorrow, discouragement and need.

Throughout the account, however, the ever prevailing grace of our God is manifest. Rightly so, Miss Woodworth concludes with a chapter which portrays "The Joy of Service" which she experienced through willingly adhering to God's blueprint for her life. I sense that this book will stimulate readers to faithful, fruitful service regardless of the sphere of ministry to which God has called them.

BUILDING AND BATTLING (by Dr. Curtis Hutson, Sword of the Lord, Box 1099, Murfeesboro, Tenn. 37130, 1974, 186 pages, \$3.00)

However, you will find the content also geared to challenge the saints toward Christ honoring living and reaching the unsaved. 


The Elyria Christian Academy recently held their Third Annual Banquet at the Midview Junior High School. There were over 300 in attendance.

What then went ye out to see? The answer -- a man. A man with a message. "Repent ye, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." -- "Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world." John 1:29.

What went ye down to Jericho for what went ye down to Jericho for to see? A city set on a hill, thriving with activity and people? No, we see there a "tell", a heap of ruins, a city accursed by God, (Joshua 6:17) burned, destroyed and the promise "Cursed be the man before the Lord, that riseth up and buildeth this city. Lericho." up and buildeth this city, Jericho.'

God is very strong against sin but warm toward Joshua's faith. What went ye down to the Dead Sea for to see? A beautiful sea with a summer resort, a beach for bathing, happy children playing in the sands? No, we see the results of sin against a Holy God. This area once the plain of Jordan, well watered everywhere, even as the "garden of the Lord", like the land of Egypt by the Nile. But God rained upon Sodom and Gomorrah brimstone and fire out of heaven. Because the men of Sodom were wicked sinners, heaped in homosexuality to such an extent they sought to take the angels to practice their evil deeds. (Genesis 13: 10-13; 19:24,25). What do you see then? The judgment of a Holy God upon the wickedness of men.

God is very strong against sin. What went ye up to Galilee for to see? Capernaum, a city by the sea where fishermen dry their nets? A city where women visit in the market place? A city where children play in the streets? Where singing praises unto the Lord of whom Matthew 9:1 says, "He entered into a ship, and passed over, and came into His own city." No! You see again a city rejected by God, a heap of stones, for her rejection of His lovely Son. Luke 10: 13-16 reads - "Woe unto thee, Chorazin, woe unto thee, Bethsaida
... and thou, Capernaum, which
art exalted to heaven, shalt be
thrust down." Yes, we see a reminder of man's need to keep true
to God and His Son, our Saviour, or accept the consequences.

God is very strong on unbelief. What went ye up to Jerusalem for to see? A city seton a hill, a house of worship, a temple full of people praising the Lord? No! We see a Wall. Matthew 24:1, 2 - "His disciples came to Him for to show Him the buildings of the temple and Jesus said, See ye not all these things? Verily I say unto you, There shall not be left here one stone upon another, that shall not be thrown down." Although Jesus greatly loved this place and these people yet. . .

children together, even as a hen gathereth her chickens under her

wings, and ye would not? Behold your house is left unto you desolate. For I say unto you, Ye shall not see me henceforth, till ye shall say Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord." "For the time is come that judgment must begin at the house of God; and if it first begin at us, what shall the end be of them that obey not the gospel of God?" I Peter 4:17. Yes, we see a Wall, where the people of Israel gather to wail -- "because thou knewest not the time of thy visitation." Luke 19:44.

We enjoyed an added treat -- an unofficial introduction to the Conference--in the person of Rev. Peter Masters from the Metropolitan Tabernacle in London.


Rev. Masters addressed the College assembly Friday, February 14, during the 9:00 chapel service and a special 7:30 p.m.

Over Forty Years Of Ministry

Following very clear leading from the Lord, Dr. Paul M. Cell organized a church in Willowick, Ohio (Cleveland suburb) beginning with 19 people, and was the pastor for 40 years. God so blessed his Bible teaching and expository preaching that in 1957 work was begun on a large new addition 60' x 100', two floors. Under his guidance the First Baptist Church became widely known as uncompromisingly. widely known as uncompromisingly fundamental, well informed and alert on the issues of the day. (The present pastor of this work is Rev. Bernard Flanagan.)

Early in this pastorate Brother Cell saw the need of an evangelistic parish paper as one means of evangelizing the area house-tohouse. He began editing and publishing a paper naming it FEL-LOWSHIP. Two years ago Evan-gelist Mel Stadt of Wisconsin became associate and Managing Edi-The paper has reached 107,000 each issue, and growing. Churches are using it in various quantities in most of our states. and in Canada, Australia and Kenya, Africa. Missionaries in Mexico have been given permission to reproduce the paper in Spanish. Whole families have been reported won to Christ and to local churches that distribute the paper house-to-

In the middle 1930s Dr. Cell became deeply concerned about the financial problems experienced by many fundamental churches, his own included. Believing the Bible to be the most practical gift of God to man, he concluded that God's plan for maintaining and promoting His work was not being practiced. This led him to search the Scriptures for what he believed was a lost truth. After several years of prayerful searching he discovered teaching he had never seen before. It was not tithing, but STORE-HOUSE TITHING that was God's stewardship plan for the church. When this was introduced to his congregation it wrought a glorious transformation financially and spiritually.

Invitations to tell this story were received from local churches and from state and national church conventions. Then came urgent requests to have it in print. This

The Drama Of Sacred Music

As, in language, music has the ingredients we call a harmonic phrase (syntax) and of course there is an organizational form.

Music almost always presents a particular philosophy of life or world view or life changing message. "Serious artists down through the years of history have always attempted to communicate a philosophy of life." We are aware, I am certain that

Because of this fact - that music is indeed a language - how very important that the Christian use extreme caution in his presentation of music. We must be aware of the drama which is taking place. Is it a spiritual nature? Is it of a fleshly nature?

He is a trustee of the Cleveland Hebrew Mission; has served many years on the executive committee of the American Council of

Christian Churches. At present Dr. Cell is devoting his time to editing the FELLOW-SHIP paper, also conducting Bible conferences with evangelism. When requested, he expounds the Scriptures that teach Storehouse Tithing, and the people are challenged. He says, "It is thrilling to know the many churches that have been blessed by this truth. Depending on the size of the congregations and the response of the people, actual results have brought additional yearly incomes from \$3,500 to over \$21,000. Last June a church in South Carolina of less than 100 members began receiving more than \$250.00 additional each week, and this during the summer slump months of July and August.
