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
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

First place winner Karen Anderson represented Emmanuel Baptist Church of Toledo, Don Sewell, pastor, in the woodwind competition.
Karen actually lives in Lambertville, Michigan but attends the Toledo church. The Andersons moved to the area only a year ago from Grand Rapids, Michigan. Karen plans to use her scholarship to attend Grand Rapids Baptist College in the fall. Despite having been at Emmanuel less than a year, Karen was involved in the Christmas and July 4 musicales of the church and has served on various committees in the youth department.

Like the other instrumentalists, Karen began her preparation in earnest two months before the April State Contest. She has played the flute for seven years. Her comment on the conference and contest was, "I wouldn't want to go through it again. It was scary." Although she did relate how much she enjoyed it.

He is also an accomplished pianist using this talent regularly in his youth group and serves as leader of the congregational singing at Grace. When asked for suggestions for future talents contestants, he stressed getting an early start. Select and memorize the music at least two months ahead so you can spend that two months refining your selections. He also suggested obtaining whatever help possible from accomplished people on your instrument. Mark was able to take lessons from the first chair trumpet player of the Lima Symphony

Joseph M. Stowell, III, pastor of The Southgate Baptist Church, Springfield, and Chairman of our OARBC Council of Twelve, has resigned his position in Springfield to become Senior Pastor of The Bible Baptist Church, Kokomo, Indiana.

Pastor Stowell, a graduate of Cedarville College, came to Southgate Baptist in May of 1970 after completing his seminary training at Dallas Theological Seminary, Dallas, Texas. At that time, our State Missionary, Earl Umbaugh, had been working with the families that organized The Southgate Baptist Church and a group of shout tist Church and a group of about 50 persons were attending worship services in Perrin Woods School. During these past six years the membership has grown to 306 and an average Sunday morning attendance of between 450-500 was reached this spring. Under Pastor Stowell's leadership the church building was completed and occupied in February 1973. Pastor Stowell has served on the Council of Twelve since 1972, serving as both Secretary and Chairman of the State Youth Committee. This year he has served as Chairman of the Council. Is A Church-In' The Answer?

Are you looking for a way to have a more personal work with your teens? You are probably asking - What is a "Church-In"? Is a "Church-In" the answer?

We would like to share with you an experience that was very successful for us here at the Grace Baptist Church in Toledo, Ohio. It all happended the week of July 5 through 10. It was called a "Church-In" and it had an exciting effect on our teens. We began with much prayer and a small group of teens who really meant business for the Lord. We had eight teens who were mostly freshmen and sophomores living at the church. Our purpose was to (1) Present a Bible study on the Life of Christ. (2) See if we could have a significant Christian life notonly at camp but right here in our own church, (3) Motivate the teens on a selfstudy on a project in John's gospel and encourage them in their own Bible study, (4) Do odd jobs around the church and (5) teach the girls the Christian Charm Course and the boys the Man in Demand course. (These are published by Manna Publications, P. O. Box 10964, Portland, Oregon - 97210.)

The week had a big impact on our

teens particularly as we studied selected chapters of the Book of John. Soon they were in an exciting study and eventually were leading the discussion over the chapters of this wonderful book each; day. They worked on projects such as -- "Why Was Christ Baptized?" -- the "I Ams" -- the "Miracles of Christ" and others. The teens were eager to study the "Christian Charm Course" and the "Man In Demand" each day as they learned more about personal care. They were greatly enthused, and highly recommended the course to others of our teens. Their time was also spent in recreation, work around the church, eating and a little sleeping.

We feel that our purposes were reached thus being avery successful "Church-In". It allowed me, as the Youth Pastor, to work closely with my teen-age young people and it taught my teen-aged young people how to work and cooperate together. We are happy to pass this information on to our O.I.B. readers. You might want to use it in your church. We trust it will work as well for you.

Ordained To Declare The Gospel

Upon the invitation of the First Baptist Church of Medina, Ohio, an Ordination Council was convened at 1:30 p.m. on Tuesday, June 1, 1976 to consider the advisability of setting aside to the gospel ministry Mr. John M. Rathbun who presently serves as the Minister of Music and Youth at the First Baptist Church of Medina. Pastor William Russell, host pas-

Pastor William Russell, hostpastor, welcomed the Council and led in the singing of a hymn.

Rev. Walter Speith was chosen to serve as temporary chairman and Rev. Myron Williams as temporary clerk to organize the Council.

The letter of invitation was read and the roll call of churches and individuals was made. Fourteen churches were represented with ten pastors and ten messengers plus three observers present plus the candidate's father and the host pastor.

A motion was then carried to make the temporary officers the permanent ones.

Pastor Russell introduced the candidate John Rathbun who first gave testimony to his salvation in Jesus Christ. Then he told of his call to Christian service. His formal training consisted of two years at the University of Wisconsin, and then service in the armed forces. In service he dedicated his life to the Lord at a Jack Van Impe meeting after which he enrolled at Faith Baptist Bible College in Iowa where he finished his training. His wife, Sherrie, also gave a testimony.


The candidate then was questioned by the Council over his doctrinal statement, copies of which were distributed to the Council members.

The Council then proceeded to executive session where the following motion was passed. "The Council recommends to the church that they proceed with the ordination of Mr. John Rathbun". A second motion was passed by the Council to inform the church that negative votes cast by members of the Council were not directed against the man or his ability, but rather were questioning the propriety of ordination for one who is not anticipating the preaching or teaching of the Word as his life's work".

MARANATHA VILLAGE

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Approved by the Sunshing State Fellowship of Regular Baptist Churches



The approved mission agencies of the General Association of Regular Baptist Churches have united solidly behind the ministry of INFORMISSIONS, a special missions program geared primarily for our Baptist young people. The first national Informissions Conference took place in December, 1974, at Grand Rapids Baptist College with over 550 registered for the five-day period.

Once again excitement is mounting as another National Informissions Conference approaches. This one is scheduled for December 27-31, 1976, at Grand Rapids Baptist College. An excellent program has been planned for the 1,000 college students who are expected to be there. Further information will be forthcoming in this column as the conference date draws near. It is always a blessing to see joint efforts among our sister Baptist mission agencies. Regular Baptist Press in Sao Paulo, Brazil, is a good example of a joint effort, as Association of Baptists for World Evangelism and Baptist Mid-Missions work in close cooperation in a literature ministry.

Rev. Jackson Moore, involved in the ministry of Regular Baptist Press recently reported, "The press continues to be a source of blessing, both by way of tracts and books as well as Sunday School materials. Last year over 500 copies of "HEAVEN CAN BE YOURS" were sent to individuals who returned a tract saying they were accepting Christ as Saviour, Praise the Lord."

An interesting phase of the work of RBP came to light recently. Mr. Moore mentioned that the correspondence courses sent out by the press reach into unusual places. One of the seminary students who was correcting and mailing the courses was somewhat swamped by the large volume of work. The chaplain of the local penitentiary had just dropped off the test for 99 students. The prisoners are moved through the courses fairly rapidly since there is the chance they will be transferred. At the end of last year, Mr. Moore and his colleague went to the penitentiary to award 400 diplomas. This particular chaplain now has 300 prisoners enrolled in the correspondence courses. For the past ten years, the missionaries have had free access to the prisoners in various prisons scattered over Brazil through correspondence courses.

Thus the printed word is touching hearts of those in need of a Savior, and we know His Word has the power to transform lives. Please pray for this evangelistic endeavor of Regular Baptist Press of Brazil where these two sister missions work together to reach the lost with the Gospel of Christ through literature.

Baptist Mid-Missions is seeing tremendous success in its program to assist local churches with their mission conferences. The whole program is geared to provide the best possible conference for a church without burdening the church with the usual load of correspondence connected with such a conference. In fact, the Deputation Department contacts the missionaries, does all the necessary correspondence, provides a list of suggestions to create conference interest, instructs the missionaries in their contact with the church, and even provides a typed final program for the church as well as the conference participants. Churches have greatly responded to such an offer and it is not unusual to have several conferences going on at the same time each week. The following is one of the many fine letters received at the Baptist Mid-Missions Home Office. It comes from Rev. Ronald W. Graef, Pastor of Evangel Baptist Church, Taylor, Michigan.

"Last fall we had a five-day Missionary Conference sparked with ideas from Brother Kendrick. It was extremely successful. The attendance held high, and the interest still continues after all these months. Working through the Baptist Mid-Missions' Deputation Department simplified the hassling job of coordination. They arranged a perfect balance of missionary speakers for us - older and younger, veterans and appointees, different parts of the world represented, different types of ministries. We learned a great deal, loved each of the missionaries, and took on the support of the appointees who are now on the field. Thank you, Baptist Mid-Missions, for your great army of missionaries and for your help in promoting world missions in local churches like ours."

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





Your editor was not able to attend this conference, however, we have spoken to many who did. Every report given us was a "glowing report"! There was a sweet spirit of unanimity and a determination to continue moving ahead to the glory of God. Read this report in full. It will bless your heart.

The General Association of Regular Baptist Churches (GARBC) met in annual session at the Seattle Center Opera House, June 21-25, 1976. Over 1,400 messengers from the church registered for the business sessions. Peak attendance reached 2,800 on Thursday evening as approximately 600 college and high school youth attended the Youth Day programs.

Among the items of business acted upon by the Association messengers was the relocation of the home office which is presently in Des Plaines, Illinois. The new site is 10 miles west, in Schaumburg, Illinois. Tentative moving dates are late November or early December.

The finals of the national Talents for Christ contest were held in conjunction with the Youth Day program. First-place winners in each of eleven categories received oneyear tuition scholarships to any of the six GARBC-approved colleges. Second-place winners received half-year tuition scholarships.

Forty-nine new churches were received into the Association during the conference, bringing the total number of churches to 1,528.

Other reports given to the assembled messengers included the approved mission agencies, colleges and social agencies. All of these institutions and agencies are independent and receive annual approval from the Association as good outlets for missionary giving

for the churches.

The missionary committee reported that the five approved mission agencies (Association of Baptists for World Evangelism, Baptist Mid-Missions, Evangelical Baptist Missions, Fellowship of Baptists for Home Missions and Hiawatha Baptist Missions) now have 1,915 missionaries, including 1,489 on the field, 188 on furlough and 238 accepted candidates. Another 79 are now on the inactive or retired list. They further reported receiving over \$14.5 million for the work of missions around the world. Regular Baptist missionaries are serving in more than 50 foreign countries, the United States and Canada. Church planting is their ultimate goal.

On the educational scene, the Association now approves seven institutions of higher learning:

Baptist Bible College of Penna. and Baptist Bible School of Theology, Clarks Summit, Pa. Cedarville College, Cedarville,

Faith Baptist Bible College, An-

keny, Iowa

Grand Rapids Baptist College and Seminary, Grand Rapids,

Los Angeles Baptist College, Newhall, Calif.

Northwest Baptist Seminary. Tacoma, Wash.

Western Baptist Bible College, Salem, Ore.

The schools reported a total of 4,468 students enrolled during the past academic year.

There are also four social agencies approved by the Association. The Baptist Children's Home of Valparaiso, Indiana, provides child care and foster home placement, adoptive ministry, a home for un-wed mothers and family counseling service. The Michigan Christian Home Association of Grand Rapids offers a home for senior citizens. The Regular Baptist Children's Agency of St. Louis, Michigan, provides child care, foster home placement, care for unwed mothers and family counseling services. Shepherds, Inc., a home and training school for the mentally retarded, is located in Union Grove, Wisconsin.

The international radio voice of the GARBC is "Living Reality," now heard on 60 stations in the United States, the West Indies and the Philippines. Dr. Joseph M. Stowell, National Representative, is the regular speaker on the

broadcast. Over 11,000 copies of the radio message booklets go out each month to listeners. Also heard periodically on the broadcast is Dr. William Kuhnle, Assistant to the National Representative.

The total number of chaplains, including those on active duty, Reserve Components, National Guard and the Civil Air Patrol, is 69. Of these 69 chaplains, 25

are currently on active duty.
The Baptist Builders' Club, which gives financial grants of up to \$5,000 to needy churches, reported that 12 churches had received grants totaling \$47,340 during the past fiscal year. Since the Club began, 386 churches have shared in grants totaling \$785,840.

One of the far-ranging ministries of the Association is Regular Baptist Press. Brought into existence 24 years ago by the express wish of the churches, the Press now serves over 4,600 churches. In addition to Sunday School literature, the Press publishes books, Vacation Bible School material and gospel tracts, and conducts Sunday School conferences. Gospel Literature Services supplies free literature to missionaries serving under GARBC-approved mission agencies as God provides the necessary funds. Literature was furnished to 24 foreign countries in addition to the USA. Two hundred fourteen literature projects were completed during this fiscal year, an increase of 101 over last year. 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Missionary Teaching Experience

"Go to Africa? Me? Are you kidding?"

Yet there I was, knees knocking, on November 2, 1975, in France, getting on flight 867 for Niamey, Republic of Niger, West Africa. In addition to the usual things a passenger takes, I was carrying a promise of God in my heart, "Have I not commanded thee? Be strong and of a good courage; be not afraid, neither be thou dismayed: for the Lord thy God is with thee whithersoever thou goest", Joshua 1:9.

The whole experience seemed like a dream. During my first eleven years of selvetion life flowed fairly greatly.

of salvation, life flowed fairly smoothly. Then about 1972 my pastor asked a double-barrelled question. "Have you ever thought of going to Bible school?" and "Wouldn't you like to go?"

My answer to both of those questions was a flat, "No."

But the Lord had other plans and here I was on a plane, enrolled in the Christian School Education program at BBC, and on my way to student teaching in Niger! When classes began last fall, I was one of 31 students anticipating student teaching. BBC and Evangelical Baptist Missions, working cooperatively, arranged my teaching for 45 days in Niger. With God's promises still in my heart and mind I deplaned at Niamey

from Flight 867 at 3:15 a.m. Suddenly a thought struck me -- what if there were no one here to meet me? After all it was 3:15 in the morning! What would I do? A good old American, "Hi!" accompanied by the faces of E.B.M. missionaries interrupted my nightmarish thought.

Not one of my days in Niger was spent in exactly the same way, but each

was wonderful and all too short. McCaba Academy soon became familiar territory. The contacts there renewed my desire that Christ be seen in my life at all times. The eyes of seven students and Mrs. Robert Cowley, my supervising teacher, were watching me and once in a while there were visitors who came to observe as well.

Life at McCaba Academy is a little different from most Stateside Christian schools. For example, our reading groups seemed to excite the local lizard population and they scurried around trying to participate daily in our activities. They were not completely disruptive however, and I praise the Lord for what I learned from a good teacher and seven bright, active, American M. K.s.

In Niamey I lived with the Heath Bobbetts and had lunch each day with the David Nunemakers. The Bobbetts, both graduates of BBC, showed me the EBM work in Niamey and we took some weekend excursions to the bush villages to visit the American and African missionaries. On the bush trips I saw and learned a number of new things, e.g., how to pound grain, cook African style, sleep under a mosquito net tent, love the people, and I even had the privilege to ride on an African Cadillac, more familiarly known

Every morning in Niamey at 5:00 a.m. a loud speaker helped eject us from our beds with real gusto. The five o'clock blast was only the first of several daily Moslem prayer calls. By hurrying outside we could watch the people prepare for prayer. They filled a small container with water to wash their bodies, always careful to face toward Mecca. This rite is performed to cleanse from sin and thus to ready themselves for prayer. How tragic that all this conscientious effort is in vain. Observing these prayer times, I realized it is for these religious, but lost Moslems, those enthusiastic and dedicated EBM missionaries leave families and friends to follow their Lord's leading. Why should such educated, talented people choose to suffer the intense heat of the desert? Why should they choose inconvenience, disease and all the rest? The answer was obvious. These were men and women who themselves had heard the good news of salvation and were daily experiencing its blessings. They carry an intense burden to share the Saviour with the multitude of lost souls.

I was privileged to visit the EBM French school for national children where Florence Houck, a BBC grad, is principal. The six-room school is staffed by six African teachers. It is quite a sight to see over 300 children come flying across the fields to their school. Even more of a marvel is the fact that the Nigerian children seem to have no problem walking five miles with a whole stack of books on their heads. Ever tried to balance one book on your head to walk across a room?

Maybe you think that if you had to walk five miles you wouldn't go to You would if only 10% of the children in your country ever had

that opportunity!

Would I ever return to Africa? Me? Me? You bet I would. The Lord lovingly leads in such wonderful ways and if He should direct my paths to Africa again I know I can continue to rely upon His promises to be with

Is Home Missions Really Important?

This may seem like a strange title for an article but with many it is a very real live matter. It is with this in mind that we take a glimpse into the importance of home missions and how much emphasis should be given to it. It is always a sad thing to hear the Lord's people differentiate between home missions and foreign missions to the extent that one is placed above the other in the order of importance. Of course, categorizing these two great ministries which represent the heartbeat of the local church has no scriptural basis.

One question which comes to mind is just how far have we moved away

from the scriptural concept of missions when a missionary in a foreign country, surrounded by people of a different culture and thus has an exciting story to tell. finds it easier to obtain support over that home based missionary simply because of his geographical location. We read in the Great Commission, of the command to go and preach the good news of Jesus Christ. In the 13th and 14th chapters of the book of Acts we find no financial scale relating to various degrees of responsibility among those sent out by the local church to preach the gospel. There is no doubt but that many in the local church today have faulted the missionary who is called of God to so called home missions. He is faulted because of the undescribable ever present idea that the foreign missionary and his ministry is superior to the home missionary and his God given task, We must never forget that it is the Holy Spirit who calls and the only responsibility that we have is to respond to that call. The best place for any believer to be in is that place of God's choosing. The home missionary and the foreign missionary are of equal importance as to their location of service because God placed them there.

Perhaps it would be well at this point to state an actual case that took place not too long ago. A fine missionary couple who had served the Lord admirably for over sixteen years in the heart of Africa found it necessary to leave the field and return home to the United States because of a health problem. Upon their return to America and just as soon as they were able to do so, they became involved in a ministry in the state of Maine. This they did to keep busy in the work while waiting upon the Lord for further direction as to a permanent place of ministry. Within a very short time after it was known that they became involved in home missions, a few of their supporting churches ceased with their financial support. In fact, they immediately lost over \$400 of regular monthly support. Why? Simply be-cause they dared to become involved in a home missions ministry. What a tremendous sacrifice to make in order to work for the Lord during a transition period here at home. This is a tragedy but very much a reality in some of our Bap-

Is there some guideline from the Lord regarding this matter of "home and foreign missions"? In Mark 16:15, we are commanded to "go into all the world" and in

this Great Commission to evangelize the world, Christ said, in Acts 1:8 that "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." There is a scriptural principle here for us in these great verses relating to missions. While the witness was to be given in Jerusalem it was to also extend into Judea, Samaria and the uttermost part of the earth. This is simultaneous action. The witness was to be carried at the same time in these four areas. The converse

As the witness is carried to the ends of the earth, it is absolutely necessary that a strong base be developed at home. It is known worldwide among Christian circles that the major source of missionary recruits as well as finances is in North America. America must be kept strong and in order to do this, a strong emphasis must be made for home missions. It is interesting to note that one third of the 1,040 missionary personnel of Baptist Mid-Missions are home missionaries.

Support home missions? Yes, it is vitally important that we make every effort to strengthen and build up the home base. Prayer and financial support of home missionaries results in evangelizing and planting churches. Churches send forth missionaries and missionaries plant churches. A cycle you say? You are correct but this is God's program and evangelizing and church planting is His method to carry out that program.



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What Is Heresy?

The Scriptures themselves give us the answer to this question. The word "heresy" (Greek hairesis) is one of the most interesting and significant words in the New Testament. In 2 Pet. 2:1, specific warning is given to true Christians concerning apostates who will craftily introduce into the church and among its people "destructive heresies." The word "heresies" is the Greek haireseis, and a consideration of its nature, background, and use is of prime interest and major significance. In the early Greek writings the noun <u>hairesis</u> denoted: "a taking of something, a capturing or conquering, a taking for oneself" - hence, later on, "a choosing, choice, the

thing chosen - so, a plan or purpose, course of action." Thuctdides described the rapture of a certain city with the words he hairesis tes poleos. The verb haireo, from which the noun hairesis is derived, was used to mean: "take a thing in hand, take for oneself, to choose." Herodotus used the verb to describe the election of an official to office by vote tion of an official to office by vote, and in Xenophon it is used to designate the preference of one course of action over another.

The idea of "choice" is reflected in the Septuagint Version, in several passages, such as Judges 5:8, "They chose (heiretisan) new gods," and 2 Samuel 15:15 has hairetai for "shall appoint." Choice has already been made of the one who will be seen as the one who will be seen as the same seen the one who will be appointed before the appointment is made. Leviticus 22:18 has <u>hairesin</u> to translate "free-will offerings." Here again the idea of choice is present because one must select what he intends to render as a Patristic Writings, the thought of "choice, to choose" is carried on by John Chrysostom, Hermas, Justin Martyr, and Eusebius. But the noun hairesis is given the connotation of "way of thought, system of thinking, those who profess such a system, a body of people who hold false doctrine," and then, "heresy, false teaching which purports to be Christian." Such background and usage are most significant when we come to the Holy Spirit's use of the word in the New Testament.

This is the word which occurs in Matt. 12:18, where the Lord Himself quotes from the Old Testament prophecy in Isa. 42:1-4, and says, "Behold my servant, whom says, "Behold my servant, whom I have chosen (heiretsia)..."
Paul, in his well-known declaration in Phil. 1:22, states: "But if I live in the flesh, this is the fruit of my labor, yet what I shall choose (heiresomai) I know not." The great pronouncement in 2 Thess. 2:13 tells us: "God hath from the beginning chosen you (heilato) to salvation..." The noun hairesis appears in Ac. 5:17, "The sect (hairesis) of the Sadducees" designating the Sadducees as a body

of men separated from others and following their own ideas, hence the rendering "sect", i.e. a party which has chosen to pursue a certain course of thought and action. The noun form is used in the same way of the Pharisees in Ac. 15:5. "the sect (haireseos) of the Pharisees"; and of Christians in Ac. 24:5, "sect (hairoseos) of the Nazarenes." In 1 Cor. 11:19, Paul uses the word, "For there must

even be divisions (haireseis) "among you" - to point out the divisions in the church which were disrupting the congregation. Here again however the idea of "choice" persists, for these heresies (divisions) denote something that people select or choose for themselves, thus peculiar doctrines or opinions. Gal. 5:20 lists "heresies" (haireseis) as one of the works of the flesh, i.e. the choices of peculiar opinions and doctrines by the human mentality. They are the results of the thinking and desires of the natural mind.

With this background and with these uses of the word fresh in mind, let us come back to 2 Peter 2:1, and ascertain precisely what is meant by the "heresies" in this important passage. At least three things can be determined as to the nature and character of "pernicious heresies". from the word itself and its uses.

1. Heresy (heiresis) is a view or course of action which is selfchosen in preference over other views or plans of action. A heresy is not an opinion thrust upon an individual and which he is forced to adopt against his own judgment and contrary to his own will. It does not represent a decision which a man is forced to make under duress or threat. Nor is it a philosophy of life one may use as a plaything, with which to satisfy some religious fancy or mental whim - then, its usefulness done, to be thrown away like an old toy. A heresy is a view of something which is deliberately self-chosen over other views because the subject prefers that view to all the others. The point is not that there are not other views and opinions from which to choose, or that the individual is not able to choose from these other persuasions. The point is that the subject has considered a number of views or doctrines, and has chosen one of them in particular over the others because he prefers it to the rest and because he has decided to adopt it as his pattern or course of life. The fact that it is wrong, that it is an evil system of thought and a perilous plan of action does not deter him in the least. He chooses it because he desires to do so.

2. Heresy (hairesis) is a selfchosen view or doctrine apart from the teaching of the Holy Scriptures. When Peter speaks in 2 Pet. 2:1, of false teachers (pseudodidaskaloi) who introduce

and propagate destructive heresies obviously wrong idea about a loving (haireseis) he is speaking of men God whose creatures are all who have chosen to treat the speaking of the speaking of men God whose creatures are all who have chosen to treat the speaking of the spe who have chosen to teach false-hood for truth, who teach doctrines

which they announce as true but which actually pervert the way of truth. Their teaching is the counterfeit doctrine of teachers who have separated themselves from the truth of the Word of God, and forming their own dishonest factions. "These are the ones making divisions, sensual, not having the Spirit' (Jude 19).

In the first section of the second Epistle, Peter has emphasized true, accurate, heart-knowledge, all diligence in the Christian life, the absolute certainty of the prophetic Word in an age of darkness, as based upon the fact of the inspiration of the Holy Scriptures. Now, in chapter 2, the purpose of it all appears clearly - believers will have to face the worst of these false teachers, who teach the doctrines which emanate from demons, and whose character and life are as corrupt and pernicious as their doctrines. It must be understood by all believers that a heretic (hairetikos) is one who holds and teaches a heresy (hairesis) or a number of them, which are deliberately chosen views of his own, contrary to the teaching of the Holy Scriptures. A heresy is not merely a mistaken opinion about some doctrine of the Christian faith, held by an unenlightened brother in the church, and which can be corrected by careful teaching. Rather it is an evil tenet chosen with considered intent, in opposition to the

doctrines of the Scriptures, by a religious teacher who does not believe the Scriptures to be the inspired, authoritative Word of God, and therefore repudiates and disowns them. A heresy (hairesis) may appear to be truth until it is carefully scrutinized and investigated, and found to be false, just as false prophets appear beside God's true prophets, and with their pretended prophecies try to turn God's people away from the true prophets and the truths they pro-nounce by inspiration. The devil cannot, will not let God's true people alone. He is ceaselessly engaged in sending false teachers - heretics - among them, with their anti-scriptural doctrines, aimed at doing the greatest damage to the people of God.

3. Heresy (hairesis) is false doctrine which issues in eternal ruin for its advocates. 2 Pet. 2:1 reads: "heresies of perdition" (haireseis appleies). The characteristics apoleias). The characterizing genitive construction is far stronger than an adjective "perdi-tious heresies," and should not be converted into an adjective. These heresies are evil doctrines that belong to the realm of perdition, i.e. eternal damnation in hell, and carries its advocates there. Peter uses this word three times in the first three verses of the second chapter, to emphasize its significance and solemnity. See 2 Thess. 2:3, where apoleias is used of the destiny of the antichrist; Heb. 10: 39, and Rev. 17:8, where it describes the final destination of the man of sin and all the lost dead.

All self-chosen views and doctrines that are contrary to the Scriptures and thus bear the seal of perdition, are evil, satanic, and bring upon their holders swift and utter ruin. This truth cannot be toned down, cannot be altered to suit the unsaved churchman's notions about heaven and hell, cannot be shrugged off as a "separationist interpretation of an obviously wrong idea about a loving God whose creatures are all brothers."

The next statement makes very evident the crime and guilt of the heretics: "denying even the absolute Master who bought them." This is the heart of the issue, and shows beyond all question that the false doctrines of these lying religionists merit perdition. It shows that they deny and reject much more than the fact of god. They repudiate His absolute revelation

in Jesus Christ, and the words "who bought them" mean that they reject His whole redemptive work. They deny the complete doctrine of Christ. For this, they "bring upon themselves swift destruction." The tragedy is however, that "many shall follow their per-nicious ways." Perhaps we may rescue some from the way of peridition.
