This period saw the baptism of 132 people and 188 new members were added, along with increases in the General Fund Budget from \$59,000 to \$75,000 and the Missionary Budget from \$16,870 to \$18,800. Truly the Lord blessed!

Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing

A Drunken Fortune-Teller Sets a Youth to Thinking

Young Robert Robinson poured the gypsy fortuneteller another drink and sat back to watch the fun. The boy's widowed mother had sent him to London when he was 14 to learn the barber trade under Joseph Anderson. But he cared little for the trade and when Anderson wasn't reprimanding him for acts of mischief he was bawling him out for spending his time read-ing books. Now it was 1754. Robinson had served his five years and Anderson was relieved of his ward.

Suddenly realizing that he had to earn his own living, 19-year-old Robinson went to a fortuneteller for advice -- and fun. But when the gypsy looked groggily into the crystal ball she came up with a bit of intelligence that set her mischief-loving customer to thinking. Said she, 'You will live to see your grandchildren.

Robert Robinson realized for the first time that he must die eventually. This and the thought that his grandchildren might regard his life as useless haunted him for months. Then, in December 1754, he stopped at an open air meeting to hear John Wesley's co-preacher, George Whitefield, warn his congregation of

> Come, Thou Fount of every blessing, Tune my heart to sing Thy Grace; Streams of mercy, never ceasing, Call for songs of loudest praise.

Teach me some melodious sonnet, Sung by flaming tongues above; Praise the mount - I'm fixed upon it -

Mount of Thy redeeming love. Here I raise mine Ebenezer; Hither by Thy help I'm come

And I hope by Thy good pleasure, Safely to arrive at home


"the wrath to come." That did the trick. Find-ing "peace by believing," the youth determined to get on the narrow path and to devote his life to persuading others to do likewise. And he started praying that when his time came he would die "softly, suddenly, and alone."

Armed only with his barbershop book learning, Robert Robinson started preaching as a Methodist, changed to the Independents and switched to the Baptists. Pastor of a small church at Cambridge, England, the self-made minister became one of the empire's most forceful writers and preachers. On June 9, 1790, when he was 54 years old, he went to Birmingham to fill the pulpit of Dr. Priestly. The following morning Priestly knocked at the door of his guest. There was no answer. Robinson had died in his sleep.

Robert Robinson was only 23 years old when he left to posterity a hymn that has been sung for six generations. It was only four years after he made the gypsy fortuneteller drunk that, at the age of 23, the converted Robert Robinson wrote . . .

> Jesus sought me when a stranger Wandering from the fold of God; He to rescue me from danger Interposed His prescious blood.

O to grace how great a debtor Daily I'm constrained to be! Let Thy goodness, like a fetter, Bind my wandering heart to Thee. Prone to wander, Lord I feel it, Prone to leave the God I love Here's my heart, O take and seal it Seal it for Thy courts above

Do You Have Loyal Students?

Webster says "Loyalty implies a close personal relationship that is steadfast even in temptation to renounce or ignore it."

Every person alive is concerned with loyalty...husbands and wives, children and friends, employers and employees, teachers and students, even gangs and gangsters.

How can YOU keep your students loyal?

Loyalty is spontaneous, like res-pect. It is deserved and not demanded. We can demand faithfulness, but never loyalty. We can demand good behavior, but not attention. We can demand obedience, but never respect. We can demand kindness, but never love. We can demand truth, but not trust. By de-manding the first, we do not neces-sarily obtain the other.

We have faithfulness BECAUSE our students are loyal to us. If they respect us we have their willing obedience. If we have earned their attention we also have their good behavior. If we have earned and deserve their love, they shower all sorts of kindnesses on us. If we have proven to be trustworthy, they will be truthful and honest with us.

Our students must feel loved and wanted. They must feel that they are an integral part of us and the class. But we must also be a part We must, as teachers, teach our lessons, or tell our stories in such a personal way that we ourselves are in the midst of the events taking place, or are one of the characters. In this way the students identify with us either in joy and love and happiness, or in sympathy and sorrow, and thus they became 'involved' with us personally.

We can never demand or expect of our students, or others what we ourselves do not do, or give. . . to them and to others. Our students'

minds are closed to the things we say if our daily lives are not saying the same thing. If we expect loyalty we must BE loyal to them, to others and most of all to God.

If we are striving for loyalty, we must first of all give, and give, and give of ourselves. .. UNSELF-ISHLY! We must love the student, love our privilege of teaching them, and love Christ, and imitate His example in teaching. (Don't forget, He didn't cater to the rich, or beau-tiful, or well dressed. His teaching and ministry was often to those who vere poor and needy, dirty and un-fortunate, and unliked by others).

Teaching cannot be an impersonal 'group-therapy' sort of thing, either to us or to them. In a class of 10, or even 20 or 40, you must teach on a one-to-one basis. Every student should feel that you are teaching him alone. You have to be (in their eyes) near perfect, aperson they want to be like. You need to be giving them something they don't want to miss. They need to know that you are interested in them personally, that you love them, and are a person to whom they can talk to freely. AND you must be a person who LISTENS to them. ...someone they love and respect.

You have succeeded in gaining true loyalty of your students when you can guide them to believe the thing you believe, to believe the things you teach, the Bible, to love Christ and the church. When your me class is growing, and students come because they WANT to, and listen because they WANT to... YOU HAVE LOYAL STUDENTS! WH

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Resolutions Passed

At OARBC Conference

The Bible - The Word Of God

WHEREAS there is a growing and widespread controversy over the nature of the Bible, particularly the character and extent of its inspiration, and

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WHEREAS many are now claiming to be evangelical Christians while at the same time denying the historic doctrine of the verbal, plenary inspiration of Scriptures, substituting instead varying views which allow for only par-tial inspiration of the Biblical text, while employing familiar terminology.

BE IT RESOLVED that we, the messengers of the churches in fellowship with the Ohio Association of Regular Baptist Churches, meeting in Annual Conference in Cincinnati, Ohio, October 18-20, 1976, heartily reaffirm our deep conviction that the Bible, as given through holy men of old, is divinely, verbally and plenarily inspired, each and every word in the original languages in which they were authored being the word that God desired to be used, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we accept the authority of the Word of God as final in matters of faith and practice, and that we reject as erroneous any attempts to equate ecclesiastical pronouncements, church dogmas, denominational tenets or personal religious experiences with that which is written in the Word of God.

Personal Holiness

WHEREAS the Scriptures clearly teach that God's people deny ungodliness and worldly lusts "but live soberly, righteously, and goldly in this present world'? (Titus 2:12) and

WHEREAS the general looseness of morality, the increase of broken homes and the frightful scandal of national drunkenness and drug-use mark this generation as one of epidemic immorality, and

WHEREAS our own fundamental church people as often observed with shabby dress, immodest garments, hippy hairstyles and even questionable social practices,

BE IT RESOLVED that we, the messengers of the churches in fellowship with the Ohio Association of Regular Baptist Churches, meeting in Annual Conference in Cincinnati, Ohio, October 18-20, 1976, urge pastors, youth leaders and faculties of our Bible colleges and seminaries to hold up "holy hands," to speak out forthrightly on the evils of worldliness in dream expression and behing dress, appearance and habits.

God's Order Of The Sexes

WHEREAS the humanistic movement to "liberate" women has repudiated the Scriptural teaching of woman's special and God-ordained position in creation even to the place of rejecting the husband's authority in the home,

WHEREAS this philosophy has designed and promoted the Equal Rights Amendment which belittles woman's highest and noblest calling of homemaker and mother, and

WHEREAS even some evangelicals have been caught up in this movement as seen in the Evangelical Women's Caucus which met in Washington, D.C., last Thanksgiving, where some challenged Biblical standards of order and authority as taught in Genesis 1, 2; Ephesians 5:22-33, and I Timothy 2:9-15.

BE IT RESOLVED that we, the messengers of the churches in fellowship with the Ohio Association of Regular Baptist Churches, meeting in Annual Conference in Cincinnati, October 18-20, thank God for the host of godly women of our churches, and state <u>clearly that we</u>, both men and women, firmly believe in the teaching of the Word of God which emphasizes that men and women are heirs together of the grace of life, and that woman was created to be a helpmeet (suitable) for man, and the glory of the man.

WE FURTHER RESOLVE that we will teach and live the Scriptural positions assigned to men and women in the home, church, and society - taking a clear stand against the "unisex movement" of today which would rob both eve the ve the men and women of their intended places of honor and blessing.

Loyalty to Our Regular Baptist Convictions

ENTS! W HEREAS, many of us who are regular Baptist came into the Ohio Association of Regular Baptist Churches upon certain convictions and principles;

AND WHEREAS, boys and girls have come to our homes and have grown up . 43623 in churches with these principles and convictions;

AND WHEREAS, these same young people have become interested in other Young people outside of our Fellowship, have married, and have left our fellowship;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we, the messengers, and guests of this 49th Annual Conference of the Ohio Association of Regular Baptist Churches be determined to stress anew to our households the convictions and principles taught and fostered in the Regular Baptist Fellowship, so that when our children marry they will continue to be part and parcel of ^{Our} great Fellowship.

Why Not Regular Baptist Money For Regular Baptist Causes?

GARBC Report

Des Plaines, Illinois - The Gen-eral Association of Regular Baptist Churches released statistics for the fiscal year ending April, 1976. Forty-nine new churches were received into the Association bringing the total number to 1528. The average membership per church is listed as 153.

Financial reports show that gifts to missions totaled \$12,780,678. Local church expenditures totaled \$46,303,155. Building expansion reached \$8,823,426. Total giving for all purposes amounted to \$67,907,259.


A comparison of these figures with similar ones of the previous year shows an increase in mission giving of \$805,998. The per capita missionary giving was \$56.77. Local current expense giving in-creased by \$6,634,479.


The Regular Baptists are so called because of their distinctive historic position. 

It's Christmas Again Why Christ Came

OUR TEXT: Galatians 4:4, 5 "But when the fulness of time was come, God sent forth his Son, made of a woman, made under the law, To redeem them that were under the law, that we might receive the adoption of sons."

God's clock never runs a minute slow nor a minute fast. In fact the only accurate clock, calendar, time table or any such measuring device belongs to God. Even today with its chaos, confusion, con-sternation and concern, it is in the hand of God.

Your Bible is such a clear book and simple in its description that a child can understand. There are few people that have not or do not believe that such a person called Christ lived. But their varying beliefs of who He was, what He did, and where He is now is myriad: I have said before that I believe we ought to have two celebrations. One called the Honoring of the Birth of Christ, the other for our traditional exchange of gifts. It is not wrong to honor the Birth of Christ, in fact to a Christian, it is a joy.

In God's clock, Christ did not just come by happenstance. Our verse says that Christ came "when the fulness of time." We do not have to explain the phrase other than the fact that God said "it's time". But no doubt in God's plan "the fulness of time" meant the con-dition of the world, the need of the world, possibly even a religious world, possibly even a religious need. Whatever its total meaning, it was God's time. But our verse and the Bible so compliments and comments on itself. The Bible speaks of Christ as "Virgin born". There is much discussion, but it does say that "God sent forth His son". Whatever the means or the vehicle, the power behind Christ was God. It is no wonder that the writer of the gospel informing Mary about the miracle specific-ally refers to "the Holy Ghost (God) shall come upon you". The purpose of the fulness of time was so God could send forth His Son.

Was Christ real? Our text says, "made of a woman". You can debate in the millennium to come, but Christ did not have an earthly father. He had only an earthly mother, a Virgin - by the name of Mary. In this verse we are re-minded of how Christ - God in the flesh - was conceived. He was conceived by the power of God thru the Holy Spirit. Someone says, "it's impossible" - but the Bible states this to be a fact. Isaiah the Prophet, Matthew, Luke spoke of this virgin and the birth of the child. The personality of Christ was Human, the body of Christ came from Mary, the conception was Divine.

Paul reminds us in Philippians of the humility of Christ - "who being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God, but made Himself of no reputation and took upon Him the form of a man." To the Corinthians he wrote, "that, though he was rich, yet for our sakes he became poor". "Thanks be unto God for his un-speakable gift."

Christ was "made under the law." What law? Every law of human nature and life. The law of birth as a baby - The law of growth, the law of the Jews - In fact, Christ was the only human ever able to keep "every jot and tittle" of the

law. Christ came to earth that Christmas in the form of man so that his life could test all that man has. What a plan!

But all of God's power and God's miracles and Christ's birth would mean nothing without an eternal purpose. What is that purpose? Don't hedge, don't reason, don't think beyond the Word of God and truth. Listen to the phrase "to redeem them that were under the law. . ." Christ came to redeem. To redeem means "to buy back" or "to ransom". If this was necessary then we ought to pay attention to it. Who needs redemp-tion? Well, first of all, "those that were under the law". That's right, Christ came to redeem His chosen people, the children of Israel. But they refused Him. It says "He came unto His own, and His own received Him not."

But redemption was Christ's eternal purpose. . . And so redemp-tion is offered to all. "But as many as received Him (His redemption) to them gave He the power to be-come the sons of God. Are you redeemed? You're not? Then Christmas is all in vain – for Christ was sent by God thru Mary "to redeem". You can't keep laws to be redeemed. If so, God would not have found it necessary to send Christ the Son.

Not only does Christ redeem, but He makes sons. "That we might receive the adoption of sons"... All human beings are not in the family of God - That is possible only by redemption and adoption. The best Christmas gift you could ever find is to come to Christ as your Redeemer and Savior and know by faith that you belong to His family by adoption. -

You celebrate Christmas, dear friend, but celebrating Christmas will not redeem you. Only personal faith in Christ, the Redeemer, will do that. He waits for your decision -- What will it be?



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Have you ever wondered what it would be like to live under such suppres-Many of God's people have and are presently doing so in some areas of the world.


Dear Readers, it does each of us good to take stock now and then as to what we possess in the Lord and what we are privileged to do for the cause of Christ. God's people represent the thrust of missions and how vitally important it is for each of us to do our very best. The day is far spent and the time of opportunity to work for Him will soon be gone. ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS FOR WORLD EVANGELISM's Dr. Floyd A.

Davis shares some thoughts with us concerning evangelism and church planting. Dr. Davis writes that evangelism is church planting. He goes on to say that though these words are not verbally synonymous, they are certainly incomplete without each other. Evangelism usually denotes a person witnessing the Gospel in a specific place; church planting indicates the establishment of a Gospel-preaching assembly in a specific place. Evangelism uses means such as evangelists in special meetings, tracts, radio, television, street meetings, Bible classes, or any Scripturally-honest means to spread the Gospel; the church-planting ministry of the Gospel uses these same means. These statements are so simplified that one would lose the point of it all unless the original statement is repeated--EVANGELISM IS CHURCH PLANTING!

While some have evidenced deep concerns, only our wonderful Lord knows how desperately the United States of America needs the kind of evangelism that is church building and church-planting evangelism. Every time we witness, pass out a tract, or speak to someone about his soul in any manner, we should endeavor to connect that witness to a new or existing assembly of believers -- a church.

Realizing how many complications there are to this admonition, Dr. Davis submits for our thinking that many hours of witnessing could be multiplied greatly if Christians would refer their contacts to a church by some method. If tracts are used, be certain to have some name or number for future contact. Who knows how many unsaved have assumed that all churches were the same. That all preached the Gospel, and have sought additional help from the "church down the street."

Where there is no church to refer to, do the follow-up personally and then ask yourself, "Why is there no Gospel-preaching church in that whole area? Could it be that God is speaking to your heart about that area not having such a church? Could you do something about it? Discipling converts from special meetings, repeated follow-up contact information in all radio and television programming, well prepared brochures referring to a local church for street meetings and Bible classes, or a personal tele-phone call will all multiply our effectiveness in witnessing as well as help build churches where we witness.

Iron Curtain countries are receiving God's word through OPERATION PENETRATION, a unique ministry of <u>BAPTIST MID-MISSIONS</u>. Concern for the spiritual needs of the millions who live under Communist control, and the particular challenge resulting from hearing the Gospel, have gener-ated considerable Christian interest in this type of ministry. This natural attraction has, in some cases, been encouraged by means of wide-spread publicity and the noteworthy efforts of certain individuals who bear personal testimony to the suffering of Christians in the Communistic states. Operation Penetration is not identified with any of these famous individuals

and our missionaries who are ministering to the people in Communist lands have avoided publicity for fear that it might make their ministry more difficult.

A slide presentation, complete with cassette commentary, is presently being prepared in order to familiarize the friends of <u>BAPTIST MID</u>-MISSIONS with some of the open and obvious aspects of the ministry. It was felt that this would help to inform the interested individuals concerning the special needs for this kind of ministry and the way in which Baptist Mid-Missions is seeking to meet this need. This presentation is being prepared by Dr. Alexander de Chalandeau, Baptist Mid-Missions' mission-ary to France, who was reared in a white Russian family and who speaks the Russian language. Dr. de Chalandeau, has traveled in all of the Eastern European countries, and he has supplemented his personal impressions by means of extensive investigations into the situation in Eastern Europe. Rev. and Mrs. Steven Nischik, emeritus members of the Baptist Mid-Missions' family, were responsible for the earliest effort of Baptist Mid-Missions to get the Word of God to people in the Iron Curtain countries.

Ukrainians by birth, and for many years engaged in the ministry in their native land, Steven and Vera Nischik learned by life experience what it is to suffer for Christ under Communism and what it means to escape. They have had an important part in providing Bibles and other Christian literature for people still living in the countries of Eastern Europe.

Some of our Baptist Mid-Missions' missionaries in Germany, who for reasons of personal safety and continued effectiveness must remain unnamed, have been greatly used of God in the actual ministry of preaching, in extensive personal witness, and in the distribution of Bibles and Chris-tian literature to people in the Communist lands. Thousands of dollars worth of Christian literature have been provided by supporting churches of these missionaries and by some of the young Baptist churches in Germany. A new phase of this ministry is the preparation and the distribution of theological education by extension courses for the training of fundamentalist pastors in Eastern Europe. Men who have been called of God in those lands where there are not fundamental Bible institutes are today being trained for an effective ministry in the founding of New Testament Baptist churches.

Where the personal testimony of the missionary cannot be sent, the printed message can sometimes go. Prayer is earnestly needed for this vital ministry of Operation Penetration.

FELLOWSHIP OF BAPTISTS FOR HOME MISSIONS reports progress in all departments. Rev. Virgil Freyermuth has assumed the directorship of the mission's youth program which is expanding rapidly. New works have been undertaken in Connecticut, Nebraska, Iowa and California. A new church building was dedicated in Salamanca, New York, and the churches in Gaithersburg, Maryland; Des Moines, Iowa; and Fairview, Pennsylvania have all graduated.

The Bicentennial slide/tape presentation, "One Nation Under God", is still being widely shown throughout our land even after the concentrated use made of it around July 4. Yes, F.B.H.M. is on the move and ex-periencing God's blessings. <u>REMEMBER TO PRAY FOR INFORMISSIONS.</u>



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
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Statistical Report

Christmas And Its Customs

In visiting Bethlehem you discover some customs that have been built up there. In Germany, England and our own country certain customs have grown up there and here. The important thing is that we do not forget its origin and purpose. In reading Washington Irving's essay on Christmas it seemed worthwhile to quote some of it that you too might enjoy his thoughts.

"Of all the old festivals, however, that of Christmas awakens the strongest and most heartfelt associations. There is a tone of solemn and sacred feeling that blends with our conviviality, and lifts the spirit to a state of hallowed and elevated enjoyment.

The services of the church about this season are extremely tender and inspiring. They dwell on the beautiful story of our faith, and the pastoral scenes that accompanied its announcement. They gradually increase in fervour and pathos during the season of Advent, until they break forth in full jubilee on the morning that brought peace and good-will to men. I do not know a grander effect of music on the moral feelings than to hear the full choir and the pealing organ performing a Christmas anthem in a cathedral (or simple chapel) filling every part of the vast pile with triumphant harmony.

It is a beautiful arrangement, also derived from the days of yore, that this festival, which commemorates the announcement of the religion of peace and love, has been made the season for gathering together of family connections, and drawing closer again those bands of kindred hearts which the cares and pleasures and sorrows of the world are continually operating forth in life, and wandered widely asunder, once more to assemble about the paternal hearth, that rallying-place of the affections, there to grow young and loving again among the endearing mementos of childhood.... Heart calleth unto heart: and we draw our pleasures from the deep wells of living kindness, which lie in the quiet recesses of our bosoms: and which when resorted to, furnish forth the pure element of domestic felicity. (This time provides the true believer with great opportunities to declare his faith and invite others to know his Savior.)

It brought the peasant and the peer together, and blended all ranks in one warm generous flow of joy and kindness. The old halls of castles and manor-houses resounded with the harp and the Christmas carol, and their ample boards groaned under the weight of hospitality. One of the least pleasing effects of modern refinement is the havoc it has made among the hearty old holiday customs. . . . The world has become more worldly. There is more of dissipation, and less of enjoyment. Pleasure has ex-panded into a broader, but a shallower stream, and has forsaken many of those deep and quiet channels where it flowed sweetly through the calm bosom of domestic life. Society has acquired a more enlightened and elegant tone; but it has lost many of its strong peculiarities, its homebred feelings, its honest fireside delights. The traditionary customs of golden-hearted antiquity, its feudal hospitalities, and lordly wassailings, have passed away with the baronial castles and stately manor-houses in which they were celebrated. Shorn, however, as it is, of its ancient and festive honours, Christmas is still a period of delightful excitement. . .

It is gratifying to see that home feeling completely aroused which seems to hold so powerful a place in every (English) bosom. . . . Stranger and sojourner as I am in the land -- though for me no social hearth may blaze, no hospitable roof throw open its doors, nor the warm grasp of friendship welcome me at the threshold,---yet I feel the influence of the season beaming into my soul from the happy looks of those around me....

As we gather together in our bough decorated churches and homes it be-hooves us to remember He said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." So let us give hospitality to the stranger in our midst for did He not also say, "In as much as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me." Luke 25:40. So let us make room for others a Christmas Custom of our hearth and home.

THE LETTER FROM THE PARENTS Monday, October 18. 1976

Dear Friends, Even as I date this letter, I realize Strat has spent nine days in the presence of the Lord. But in the light of Eternity, it is only a moment. We have three girls; Strat was our only boy. We prayed for a boy before he was born, and the Lord answered that prayer by letting us have him here on this earth 16 years. And now, with Job, we can say, "The Lord has given and the Lord has taken away. Blessed be the name of the Lord." Strat was killed on Saturday morning. The very next morning we began to see public decisions in our church; some to be saved and others to rededicate their lives to the Lord. Then we began hearing of many other decisions in other churches in the area. Yesterday morning our church altar was lined with precious men, women, boys and girls; some to be saved and others to rededicate their lives to the Lord. And this is only the beginning. When we prayed for a revival so many times, we did not know that the Lord would take Strat Home. But if only one Soul had been saved through his death, I rejoice in Strat's Homegoing. I believe far more can be accomplished through his death than ever could be through his life.

Yes, we will miss him. We have many precious memories of him - especially we are thankful for the day he accepted Christ as his Saviour. We are glad for the many times we had to discipline him, and also tried to direct him in the ways of the Lord.

We have dedicated ourselves to the Lord until that day when we see Jesus first of all, and praise Him for His love, mercy and perfect will. After that, we would like to sit down and talk with our son, and brother.



National Informissions Conference – 1976

The dates of the National Informissions Conference are December 27 -31, 1976. This is the Second Annual Conference and will be held on the campus of Grand Rapids Baptist College and Seminary, Grand Rapids, Michigan.

Approximately 75 speakers will take part in the INFORMISSIONS '76 program. Baptist missionary personnel from around the world will present the challenge of missions to over 1,000 college-age adults.

Registrations are now being received. The registration fee is \$15.00 to hold a reservation. The balance of \$50 to be paid at the time of registra-tion. This sum of \$65 entitles a person to campus housing, meals, workshop outline notebook and workshop admission. It is to be understood that the \$15 is not refundable. It is possible to attend the conference by paying a total of only \$30 if the individual can care for their own housing and meals. In either case, an advance sum of \$15 must be sent in registering to attend.

We submit here the proposed program for this exciting conference.

Theme: The Son shall make them free!

In Romans 5:12, 14 it says: "Wherefore, as by one man (Adam) sin entered into the world, and death by sin; and so death passed upon all men (you and me), for that all have sinned: Nevertheless death reigned from Adam to Moses, even over them that had not sinned after the similitude of Adam's transgressions, who is the figure of him that was to come." The day concluded with a concert of classical and sacred selections by Denis Moffat, pianist.


Sunday morning brought the special activities to a close, as a Bible class and the morning worship service featured alumni speakers with a special number by the alumni choir.

First of all, where did death originate? Secondly, where is its end? We have to go back to the book of beginnings to find where death began. That book is Genesis. Death is first referred to in Genesis 2:17; 3:3. The word there means a spiritual death and a physical death. Because of Adam's sin, he died a spiritual death and,

The Word Of Completeness. . .Col. 2:9-10

The passage in Col. 2:9-10 is incontrovertibly great, and by the assertion of the truth in v.9, the Apostle Paul demonstrates that all the philosophical views which strip Christ of His sovereign deity are empty deception. Every religious theory and system which do not confess the whole sum and substance of deity residing in Christ, and do not exalt Him to the supreme Position of eternal God, and acknowledge Him as true God-Man are refuted once for all by this remarkable statement. Christ is no mere emanation from the supreme God, but "all the fulness of the Godhead." All the eternal, infinite perfections and attri-

butes of God are in Him. This fulness has always dwelt in Him, dwells in Him now, and will dwell in Him forever. Moreover it dwells in Him "bodily" - i.e. conditioned now as to its manifestation and communication by His present sacred bodily state. It is in Him not only as the Son, but as He is - the Son Incarnate. Nor is it limited and confined by the fact that He 'became flesh and dwelt among us'' The adverb ''bodily'' (somatikos) modifies the verb ''dwelleth'' (katoikei) - ''dwells bodily,'' and stresses the manner of the indwelling: it is <u>bodily</u>. It is not mystical, not spiritual, not only in the spirit of Christ - but in His whole human nature. He is the God-Man, true God and true Man at once, no less, and all who do not confess Him as such are not of God, but of the spirit of antichrist. But the blessedness of this great and wonderful truth of the Lord's person is brought directly down to us by Paul's next statement in v. 10, "And ye are <u>complete</u> in Him." We who know Him, who have received Him as our Saviour and God, <u>are His</u>, and He is joined to us and we to Him. He is in us and we are in Him. His fullness is for us who belong to Him. His fullness is for us as though we are immersed in it and filled with it. In Him we have been filled and are now full with all His blessed fulness.

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before. The word rendered "complete" in v. 10 is derived from the same root as the expression "fullness in v. 9. It is from the word pleroma, which describes a fulness which fills to the fullest, a filling which makes complete in every particular, the realizing of a perfect consummation. It speaks to us in this life of a filling up to the very top so that nothing shall be wanting to full measure. It assures the saved of the reality of that union withour Lord Jesus Christ, which - though we may not understand it all assures us nonetheless that we

are filled to the full with all that our blessed Lord is in Himself, and all that He bestows and supplies.

This grand word is not very common in the Papyri, but it may be illustrated by a note from Papyrus Petr III, 43:12, 240 B.C., in which a subordinate leader writes to his chief: "You wrote to me not to withdraw the whole company (to <u>pleroma</u>) before they had finished the work." The verb form occurs quite frequently however. In Papyrus Oxy XII, 1489:5, late 3 A.D., a man writes to a friend: "You wrong me about the money which you owed to Agathodaemon; <u>I have</u> <u>paid him in full</u>" (pepleroka). There is a note in another Papyrus in which a man says: "Your debt to me is fully paid and more too!" (pepleromai).

The Septaugint Version uses the word a number of times. Psm.24:1 says, "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness (pleroma). . . '' In says, "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness (<u>pleroma</u>). . . " In Psm. 49:12, we read: "If I were hungry, I would not tell thee; for the world is mine and the fullness (pleroma) thereof." The Psalmist says in Psm. 96:11, "Let the heavens rejoice and let the earth be glad; let the sea roar, and the fullness (pleroma) thereof." Jer. 8:16 speaks of the "land and all there is in it (to pleroma autes). 1 Chron. 16:32 says, "Let the sea roar and the fullness (to pleromati) thereof." It is interesting to note that Isa. 40:4 has the verb form in the statement: "Every valley <u>shall</u> <u>be exalted</u> (plerothesetai)..." And in Jer. 13:12, "Every wineskin <u>shall</u> <u>be filled</u> (plerothesetai) with wine. "Haggai 2:8 has the Lord's Haggai 2:8 has the Lord's on: "And I will fill (plerwine... declaration: oso) this house with glory. ..." The noun, <u>pleroma</u>. occurs five times in the New Testament, including the notable text in Col. 2: 9, 10. Paul says, as recorded in 1 Cor. 10:26, "For the earth is the Lord's, and the fullness (to ple-roma) thereof." The Apostle prays as recorded in Eph. 3:14-19, that all saints may know the love of

Christ which passeth knowledge, "that ye might be filled (plerothete) with all the fullness (<u>plērōma</u>) of God." John tells us: "And of His fullness (pleromatos) have all we received, and grace for grace." And then we note the words of the great passage in the text, Col. 2: 9,10, "And ye are complete ("full", este <u>pepleromenoi</u>) in Him." Our Christian life is in union with Christ, and the enjoyment of the fullness which that union with Him Therefore there can assures. never be a lack of supply - Psm 23:1, Septuagint Version, "The Lord shepherds me, nothing good shall fail to me." Just so far as we rely upon Him, and draw upon Him, and yield to Him, we realize our wealth and all the fullness we have in Him, and we are filled in fruition with what already fills us in potency. United thus to Him, and filled with such fullness in Him - what need do we have to turn to a lower range of sources for our needs?

Being complete in Christ means that in this fullness we have, every-thing, all we need spiritually for spirit and body, and all we need materially for sustenance and supply in this present life. There is not a single need that remains to be supplied by human philosophy and the schemes and religious theories designed in accord with the traditions of men and according to the elementary things of this world-age. When we are in union with Christ in whom all the fullness in the Godhead dwells, we are made full to the limit. Without Christ, we have no hope, nothing. In Him, we have all fulness, everything - even far beyond our knowledge. To the Corinthians, Paul wrote: "In everything ye are enriched by Him. so that ye come behind in no gift. . ." (1 Cor. 1:5, 7). In Christ we have pardon, peace, provision, preservation; faith, love hope, holiness, and the certainty for the future. We have grace and mercy for every day of living and serving. We have divine separation from the pollution and power of sin, and strength to resist its claims on us. We have a resurrection-life, and we have the sympathetic and compassionate care of a Saviour who has lived our life before us and who knows our case, our life-situations, our circumstances, and thus can be touched with the feeling of our infirmities in fact, in all our afflictions He is afflicted. "Many are the afflictions of the righteous; but the Lord de-

So, it is in Him that we are complete - filled with all fulness, and this is true for the weakest, most insignificant saint. But we need to remember that it is only so long as we <u>abide</u> in Him (1 Jno. 2:28a) that we continue to be blessed by this fullness. We cannot bear away our supply, as one might a full bucket from the well, and keep it full. The grace will begin to trickle out when we forget, or neglect the great facts of our union with Christ Jesus the Lord. We <u>need</u> the whole fulness of Christ to draw from. It is all there in Him for each of us who knows the Lord and is known by Him. Let us draw freely.
