These were to be delivered in early March. The goal was to have the auditorium ready for special meetings - March 20 through 27. The auditorium will seat 400 with 50 more in the choir with additional seating for 250 in the four overflow class room areason each side.



Rev. Joseph Godwin

The new pastor at the First Bapore list Church, Gallipolis, Ohio is our brother, Rev. Joseph Godwin. He began his ministry there on March δ . We believe it will be a fruitful onic one.

Brother Godwin is a graduate of Piedmont Bible College and the Detroit Bible College. Just prior to coming to Gallipolis, he served pastor of the Faith Baptist Church in Greenville, Ohio. He as there just two months short Je of seven years. His ministry was GE Breatly blessed of the Lord. Much as accomplished as pastor and esident¹ People worked together seeking to make Christ known.

During his ministry at Greenville a new sanctuary seating 500 with an expansion to 700 (if needed) was constructed. This new building includes a lovely foyer and fellowship hall. It was first occupied five years ago. Additional land was purchased so that the church now owns eleven acres. Eleven new missionaries were added to the Mission Budget -four colleges - and four approved agencies. Support is given monthly to three new churches.

Among the young people - five young men are presently in school studying for the ministry - one young lad is preparing to go to the mission field and two young men are now serving in full-time pas-

The yearly total giving of the church climbed from \$32,000 to \$100,000. Giving to missions trip-led. The Sunday School went from an average of 166 to an average of 343. The highest attendance for any one Sunday was 450.

Added to the staff at the Greenville church were a Minister of Youth and a Minister of Music. Brother Godwin is quick to declare that that which was accomplished at Greenville was indeed the work of the Lord and having a people who served the Lord with gladness.

totaled \$12,888.11. Because of this increase in missionary giving, the church was able to increase some of their missionaries' support. Thirty-three new members were received and five dismissed leaving a gain of 28 for the year. The present pastor, Brother Matheny, began his ministry at the First Baptist Church in February of 1975. There has been a continued growth since then. Growth, however, has been hampered some because of need for more room so the church began a building pro-gram in the Fall of '75. This has continued during '75 and '76. Through the sacrificial giving of the people, faithful workers, and the pastor (serving as contractor foreman) this \$300,000 structure is being built for ap-proximately \$200,000.

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Sweet Hour Of Prayer

An Old Carver Dictates a Poem

Everybody in Coleshill, England, knew Wil-liam Walford. On Sundays he preached around at different churches for his minister friends. During the week the townsfolk made his little trinket shop their favorite meeting place. He was forever whittling out novelties for children and he made his scant living carving items from ivory. Though his life was filled with adversar-ies and he had seen many "seasons of distress and grief" there was something uplifting about the old carver's outlook on life.

One day in 1842 when Congregational Minis-ter Thomas Salmon stopped in Walford's shop he found his friend with more on his mind than his carving and usual optimistic philosophy. He had composed a poem and he asked the Rev. Salmon to take the words down as he recited them

Three years later, on a visit to New York, Sal-mon presented the old carver's poem to the New York Observer. It was printed in the Sep-tember issue of 1845 but nothing of note came of it until 14 years later. Then, in 1859, a copy of it came to the attention of New York's organist and composer William Bradbury. In organist and composer William Bradbury. In addition to directing choirs, writing music for some of the most famous hymns and manu-facturing organs, Bradbury published some 60 hymn books. He immediately saw in Walford's poem material for a hymn, set it to music and publiched it published it

The reason William Walford had asked the Rev. Salmon to take down his poem while he dic-tated it was because the old carver was blind and couldn't see how to write.

Leon Wood At Home With The Lord



Dr. Leon J. Wood

Leon J. Wood, 58, educator, Bible scholar and author, died on March 1977, at his home after a long illness. While family members and pastor were gathered around his bed in prayer, Dr. Wood slip-ped away to be with the Lord he loved and served. Dr. Wood was Dean of the Seminary and Head of the Old Testament Department of the Grand Rapids Baptist College and Seminary where he taught for 31 years.

He was a native of Middleville, Michigan, and a resident of Grand Rapids since 1931 when his father, Rev. Clyde E. Wood, became pastor of the Berean Baptist Church llicothin that city. He graduated from Creston High School and both Cal-vin College and Seminary. He pursued graduate work in Israel under the auspices of New York University, at the Oriental Insti-tute of the University of Chicago, and received a doctor of philosphy degree from Michigan State

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University. Prior to joining the faculty of the Baptist College and Seminary, he served as pastor of the Covey Hills Xenii ange Baptist Church in Paw Paw, Michi-OHIC gan. He also served as interim Pastor for Berean Baptist Church ULAF is not WES of Grand Rapids three times dur-Ing his 45 years as a member there. From 1953 to 1954 Dr. Wood ser-LOW ved as interim president of the Baptist College and Seminary bee mis coming Seminary Dean in 1954 and continuing as such until 1975. Al-erfect though he had hear ill with arrive though he had been ill with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (the Lou Gehrig disease) for more than three years, he taught until last December.

Dr. Wood authored a number of /linistr' books: Is the Rapture Next?, A Commentary on Daniel. Daniel: A Study Guide, The Bible and Fu-fure Events, Distressing Days of the Judges, Elijah, Prophet of God, The Holy Spirit in the Old Testa-ment, Genesis: A Study Guide, and a Survey of Israel's History. He is also one of the translators of the Berkley Version of the Bible, and was working on the New Interna-to b^t tional Version of the Bible when opy of he became ill.

The Word Of Constraint

One of the grand statements of the Scriptures occurs in 2 Cor. 5:14, where the first clause reads: "For the love of Christ constraineth us. . . The word "constraineth" is the Greek sunechei, a most interesting word and of great significance for believers. Surely all true Christians must desire to know what is meant by the fact that the love of Christ "constrains" us.

In its early usage, this word sunecho meant "keep, keep together, hold tightly, confine, shut up close," in a variety of ways. A man wrote to another with reference to "<u>not keeping</u> a piece of land flooded for more than five days." A group of sailors on leave from their ship went into a certain town, were arrested for misbehaviour and were <u>held in custody</u> by the police chief. A wife petitioned the Chief Justice of the Court that her husband, who had deserted her, might be compelled to pay her a sum of money. A man was des-cribed by his friend to another as being very ill, "having been <u>seized</u> and pressed with a fever."

The word also appears in the Septuagint Version in several places, for example in Isa. 52:15, 'So shall He (the Messiah) sprinkle many nations; the kings shall shut their mouths (<u>sunexousin</u> to stoma) at Him....' It occurs in 1 Samuel 23:8, 'And Saul called all the people together to war, to go down to Keilah to besiege (<u>sunechein</u>) David and his men." In Job 3:24, Job speaks of fear "pressing him in" (<u>sunecho menos</u>). Again in Job, 30:3, Job speaks of the desert be-ing shut up to "waste (sunochen) and desolation."

In the New Testament, it is used of the Jews pressing their hands upon their ears in order to stop the hearing, so they would not have to listen to the words of Stephen (Acts 7:57). It is the word used in Luke 8:45, to describe the crowd "thronging" about the Lord, and pressing in around Him. It also appears in Luke 19:43, where the Lord predicts the future siege of Jerusalem, and states that the enemy will surround the city and "<u>keep its people in</u> (sunexousin) on every side." It is the same word

used by our Lord Jesus Christ Himself in His great statement recorded in Luke 12:50, where He refers to the purpose of His coming in terms of a baptism, and says, "And how I am straitened (sunechomai) till it be accomplish-ed." It is the word which Paul uses ed. It is the word which i an asset to describe his dilemma as set forth in Phil. 1:23, "I am in a strait (sunechomai) betwixt two." The Apostle says, "I am hard pressed on both sides," i.e. to go on living in the flesh, yet greatly desiring to depart and be with Christ. The same term occurs in Acts 18:5, where P aul is described as being "pressed (<u>suneicheto</u>) in the spirit, and testified to the Jews that Jesus was Christ." In 2 Cor. 2:4, itoccurs again, when Paul says to the Corinthians that he wrote to them "out of much affliction and anguish(sucoches) of heart ... ' 'His heart was greatly pressed and pained because of events in the Corinthian Church.

From such a variety of usages, we may thus determine its sense in the text here. Paul says the love of Christ (the Lord's own love for those who belong to Him) holds him and his fellow-servants tightly to their task, so that nothing can keep them from discharging it. It thus presses them, holds them tightly puts a vise-like cumpulsion upon them, constrains and compels them. It has them in its embrace and grasp, has tight hold upon them on both sides, urging them and impelling them onward in a course which they cannot evade. They have no choice under its irresistible power, but to be what they are and to do what they are doing: to make known this unsurpassed love, and to announce its great Person to men everywhere, that they too - having been made alive by it might live unto Him.

So it is with us. We must be pressed and compelled by the love of Christ for us, hold so tightly to our duty that nothing can keep us from discharging it faithfully. We must be so straitened to the path of fidelity that we cannot evade it, so irresistibly moved by the over-mastering force of the love of Christ that we cannot do other than give ourselves over to Him for His total and absolute purpose. His love must coerce us, press its hold on us, and therefore govern us and impel us onward in the Cause of Christ. It will <u>restrain</u> us from doing what displeases Christ and acting solely for ourselves, but it will <u>constrain</u> us to serve Him, honor Him, and glorify Him.

Recent visitors to <u>ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS FOR WORLD</u> <u>EVANGELISM</u> headquarters in Cherry Hill, N. J., were two choice servants of God, Rev. and Mrs. Antolin Zamar. Rev. Zamar had been invited to address the great INFORMISSIONS Conference in Grand Rapids, Michigan.

His ministry was wonderfully blessed of God. What is so unique about the Zamars? Mr. Zamar is the President of Doane Baptist Bible Institute in Iloilo, Philippines. DBBI is a fine Bible-training school where many Filipino pastors and Christian workers have had their Bible instruction.

Mr. Zamar testified that he is a product of ABWE missionary efforts in the Philippines. Through a tent campaign held near his home town, he heard the gospel and later accepted Christ as Savior. He then attended the mission's Bible-training school. Here he came under the instruction of Godly missionaries. After graduation, he served as a faithful pastor among his Filipino brethren.

"Do you want to go with me shooting roos, Pastor?" one of the men of our church asked me last week. Shooting kangaroos! Sounds sort of odd, doesn't it? But here in Australia, 12,000 miles from the United States, kangaroos aren't the only unusual things we run into. The missionary faces a "she'll be right" attitude. It is a favorite Aussie expression. Don't worry about anything. If it doesn't rain, if the locusts take the crops or the boys drop out of school, "no worries, she'll be right." Unfortunately, this same attitude carries over to spiritual things

as well. The average Australian is very indifferent to the Gospel and also shows definite anti-American feelings. Because we are Americans, door-to-door canvassing has been virtually unsuccessful. The American sects have been here a number of years; and as far as the Australians are concerned, we are all the same.

The Lavington Baptist Church, of which I am pastor, is small but enthusiastic. It shows signs of developing into an agressive evangelistic center for that area. Our most successful church outreach has been with Awana boys' and girls' clubs. We have over 100 enrolled now, and this has opened homes that we never would have reached otherwise. We also run a Saturday-night teen club much on the order of the Pro Teen program. Our 80-acre Camp Murindindy, in the Strathbogie Mountains, was again the scene for many spiritual victories this year. We provide the Lord for these means of correlated

praise the Lord for these many areas of service.

Doug and Sally Couch and the ten other Baptist Mid-Missions' missionaries are doing a great work for the Lord in Australia. This is a work which produces fruit, not only for time but for eternity.

Under the capable leadership of Rev. Arthur B. Cunningham, HIAWATHA BAPTIST MISSIONS is showing new dimensions. In my own travels, I hear excellent reports of the growth and blessings of this sister mission agency. During the year of 1976, there were four churches that "graduated" from H.B.M. and three new churches were started. Brother Cunningham tells me that the mission also assumed the responsibility of several existing works to help them in their development. May, 1977, has been designated as Hiawatha Baptist Missions Month. 

classrooms, new office complex and a library. The present auditorium will be renovated and converted to an all-purpose recreation room and a new and larger kitchen.

The architect for this project is Mr. Bill Gunter of Trotwood, Ohio. He is a fine Christian. We are very well pleased with his work, di-rection and dedication in building a functional building of quality material and workmanship at a conservative cost. Mr. Gunter is also directing the Construction Management Corporation which is doing the actual construction. The church is acting as the general contractor, thereby saving a substantial amount of funds.

The church recently purchased an additional house and five acres of property adjoining the present property, making a total of ten acres which will be adequate for future expansion.

During the past three months, 24 persons have been added to the church. Several who have recently accepted Christ will be baptized when we occupy the new building. Rev. Lawrence G. Fetzer is the pastor of this fine work.

Bill Bright — Campus Crusade

We read recently that Bill Bright of Campus Crusade says he does not personally believe that the Lord's return is imminent. This statement appeared in an article in CHRISTIANITY TODAY for September 24, 1976. No doubt that helps to explain the unscriptural slogan of Campus Crusade -"Come, help change the world." When men quit believing that the Lord may return at any moment, Lord may return at any moment, they usually become involved in trying to fix this old world up. The newest Campus Crusade program called, "Here's Life, America" is described by Bright as a "move-ment of disciplineship and evangelism that involves thousands of churches. ... Such programs do not constitute either true discipleship or evangelism and Bible-taught believers cannot cooperate.



- the Holy Spirit who seals unto the day of redemption. We enter heaven's gates because our Passport - the Lord Jesus Christ - is in order. He completed all that was necessary.

2) As we travelled through different airports our luggage and person were carefully checked. (I liken this to I Corinthians 3:12 - 15 where the Christian is brought before the Bema and his works are tried (examined) by fire. When we entered Amman they took from our possession some hand drawn maps. In New York fresh fruit, vegetables and flowers were confiscated. When we enter the Bema all works of 'wood, hay and stubble' will be destroyed). At the Allenby bridge one whole busload of people were refused entrance into Israel. 


Vice-President, Mrs. Dorothy Rider, was in charge of the meeting due to the illness of our President - Mrs. Kathy Barkley.

New M.A.P. **Dimension** For **Baptist Mid-Missions**

The Missionary Apprenticeship Program at Baptist Mid-Missions has taken on a new dimension by adding Rev. R. Eldon Brock, Director of Regular Baptist Camp of Michigan, Inc., Lake Ann, Michi-gan, to its list of M.A.P. Consultants.

To assist in the many details involved in operating its large world-wide program, the mission has obtained the services of 18 selected college men who serve in the area of recruitment. They give out the M.A.P. applications as well as screen the applicants for the program.

Rev. Brock has geared his camp program to have a strong emphasis on missions. In his endeavor to expose the campers to missions, he will provide for the young people information on the various youth programs of the fellowshipping Baptist mission agencies. Included in such an exposure is Baptist Mid-Missions' Valuable Information Program (V.I.P.), a mailing program which provides missionsminded young people with vital information from the global ministry of Baptist Mid-Missions, and the Sr-Hi Teens Apprentice Mission-ary Program (S.T.A.M.P.), a sum-mer apprenticeship program for Senior, high-school students senior-high-school students.

One of the reasons for the new dimension is to provide missions-interested students to serve as camp personnel in a program which is geared to emphasize missions. Last year's M.A.P. program saw nearly 200 Mappers working with Baptist Mid-Missions' missionaries in over 20 countries. This year's program looks very promising with one of the highlights being the fourth consecutive year in Israel. It is estimated that some 90 M.A.P. personnel will be working on three kibbutzim for a period of seven weeks.

M.A.P. Director, V. Ben Kend-rick, says that he believes the M.A.P. program is the greatest source of recruitment in missions today.







SYRIA- Dr. David Freedman of the Chicago University says that recent discoveries here by Jew-ish scholars have great dimensions and significance, in light of some 15,000 clay tablets uncov-ered with some as old as 4,000 years. Their inscriptions are closer to the Bible text than any previously found. Excavators found a bi-lingual vocabulary of 1,000 words at the site containing both Sumerian logorams and Eblaic syllabic writings. They were able to decipher a number of Biblical names on the tablets such as "Is-ra-Ilu" (Israel), "Ab-Ra-Mu" (Abraham), "E-Sa-Um" (Esau), and "Da-U-Dum" (David). References were also found to the cities of Hazor, Megiddo, and Gaza, as well as "Urusalima" (Jerusalem). - The Jewish Chronicle



I suppose the question that is asked more than any other by Christian young people at camps and conferences is this: "How can I know the leading of the Lord for my life?" From the beginning it needs to be emphasized that God's will is not always the easiest, the most apparent, or the most beneficial to us at the time. Many times the leading of the Lord, by outward appearances, seems difficult and unexplainable. Now it may not always be this way. It does not necessarily mean you will go where you do not want to go, do what you do not want to do, or be what you do not want to be. Dr. Bob Jones used to say, "God never called a bull frog to sing a church solo or a one-legged man to run a foot race." He who calls also equips for the responsibility.

The age old way of determining God's will cannot be improved upon. To know God's will is to know God's Word. God's Word reveals His will. The Holy Spirit, being the author of God's Word and being eternal, has inserted eternal answers to age old ques-tions. His span of time is from A, the beginning, to 7, the end of the age. Now we are born in a part of that span of time and live for 60, 70 80 or even 90 years, then our life on earth is over; but when we go to the Word of God to find an answer for our problem we are drawing on eternal sources. The eternal Holy Spirit already knows not only our problem, but the solu-tion as well. While we read the Word and pray for guidance, He Puts his "spotlight" on a verse, sentence, or just a phrase that gives definite guidance. For example, let me mention what happened to my wife and me as we prayed about returning to Australia for our second term. We, while doing deputation, were offered several Possibilities of pastorates at home that were very attractive. This would have been perfectly legitimate if it were God's will for us at the time. In fact, I tried to instruct the Lord about His leading, telling Him how much better it ould be for all of us as a family. It was at this time that the Holy pirit placed His "spotlight" on salm 106:15, "And He gave them r request, but sent leaness unto their soul." Clearly, God's will for us was another term of service for Him in Australia.

Not long after that the brakes on my wife's car failed while she was urning into a parking lot. She and our son, Scott, pulled to the curb aafely with no damage, but how different the results might have been. You see, in the center of God's will you are as safe as the center of Cod's palm. Let me hasten to add, not every automobile accident or mishap that a pastor or missionary has is the result of being out of




