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

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A Word From Your Editor

On June 16, Mrs. Moffat (Lois) and I flew from Chicago, Illinois to Anchorage, Alaska. We travelled United Air Lines and flew in a huge "747". It was a smooth trip. As we neared Anchorage, we looked from the plane and viewed for the very first time the beautiful Chugach mountains all covered with snow.

We were met at the Anchorage airport by Missionary John Bigelow. He then drove us to his home at Eagle River where we saw the rest of his family - his wife, Judy and their boys - John, Brad, Marcus and Ryan. It took awhile but we eventually got over our "jet lag".

All told we spent seven wonderful weeks in Alaska. We travelled about by van, truck, car and plane. We visited not only Anchorage and Eagle River but also Glennallen, Paxson Lake, Valdez, Homer, Iliamna, Kenai and Sterling. We probably saw more of Alaska than some of the folk who have lived there for years!

It is an interesting land. We saw the majestic mountains - the beautiful woods-the tundra - the rivers - the lakes - the glaciers the many flowers. Added to all of this were the animals - the moose (we saw several cows with their calves) - the caribou - the bearsthe beavers - the Dahl sheep - salmon, halibut, shrimp and prawns! We even ate some new foods moose, caribou, smoked salmon, bear and (of all things) beaver tails (only a taste - ugh).

Most interesting were the people. There were the Aleuts - the Indians - the Eskimoes. We visited an alleskimo village. These people are most difficult to reach with the gospel. They don't want to be disturbed.

We visited some dear friends (Rev. and Mrs. Carlyle Callis) who work with the Central Alaskan Mission. Brother Callis is director of their radio department - KCAM which is stationed at Glennallen. We were impressed with their hospital there.

The missionaries under Baptist Mid-Missions are to be commended for their fine work in establishing indigenous Baptist Churches. They are a grand group of missionaries! We ministered not only in their churches but at their camp as well. God in grace, spoke to some of the young people - a few came to Christ for salvation. It was a privilege to minister the Word among them.

When we pastored the Grace Baptist Church in Cedarville, Ohio, it was our privilege to support Dale and Bea Davis, as well as, Verne and Helen Kirby. "The Davises" began their work in Homer. This work is now self-supporting. We had a good time ministering at the Homer church. They have a Christian Day School. The pastor is Rev. Hugh Smith. Presently they are building a lovely building. We've been invited to go back to Homer some time in January of next year and have a part in dedicating this new building.

As we look back, we praise the Lord for a wonderful trip. Everyone was most kind and very gracious. Of course - mostofour time was spent with the children of God those who are of like precious faith! THE CHALLENGE OF ALASKA

Majestic, beautiful, awe inspiring - those are the words one uses to describe Alaska, "The Great L and." Magnificent mountains, mighty glaciers, tumbling streams rushing to hundreds of bays and inlets along thousands of miles of rugged coast line, the glistening white of wilderness snows, the endless stretches of forest, the biting bitter cold of the artic, the endless beauty of the long summer days, the untapped riches of mineral

wealth - all this goes into the making of the lure of the North. It's a harsh, demanding, hard, unforgiving country, but it's where the action is., "North to the Future", they say - and so independent, industrious people are still going, and with a ruggedness to match the land.

The Arctic night is matched by a spiritual counterpart in the lives of many. Sin and self seem concentrated. Godly influences and righteousness have vaporized in a condensed unrighteousness. There is no sin in sinning - it's a joke. There is very little grime left in crime. Per capita, alcohol consumption is said to be 50% over the national average. The general religious picture is confusion, as every philosophy has zeroed its focus on the state, trying for a sizeable piece of the growing cake.

Baptist Mid-Missions has hung a string of lights across the northern sky, from Ketchikan in the southeast, stretching through a great half-circle arc 1200 miles long into the villages of southwest Alaska. Using radio, airplanes, Bible camps, children's work, Bible classes, visitation, our missionaries are evangelizing and establishing New Testament Baptist churches. Five churches are now indigenous. Others, with God's blessing, soon will be.

Baptist Mid-Missions in Alaska needs the prayer and financial sup-port of God's people. A major problem is the super-inflationary spiral that has pushed the living costs a frightening 30 to 40% above the national urban average. The missionary must live, support the family, and construct buildings in that financial environment. But God! He knows no limitations. And His Gospel of love can melt arctic hearts. The city of Anchorage with its 185,000 people advertises as the "Air Crossroads of the World": a strategic position for the advance of the Truth, and a potential garden bed for the production of new missionaries and supporters for the worldwide outreach of the Gospel.

Kempton said, "This new administrative assistance position adds a new dimension to ABWE's goal in worldwide evangelism. We are definitely in need of a man who is capable of thinking ten years into our future, projecting and planning directions ABWE should be taking on different fields, resulting in effective utilization of our man-power." Dr. Kempton added, "Dr. Amstutz will also be involved in a writing-journalistic ministry re-lating to the subject of missiology" Recently, at Western Conserva-tive Baptist Seminary's 50th Annual Commencement in Portland, Oregon, Dr. Amstutz was awarded an earned Doctor of Ministry degree. His graduate product, The Philosophy of Christian Missions in Historical Perspective, is a meticulous series of exacting expositional essays based on chapters 9 - 11 of the Epistle to the Romans and is intended as an instructional-inspirational manual for missionary candidates. The research provides an excellent orientation to Biblically-based missions.

Since joining ABWE in June, 1956, Dr. Amstutz has developed the mission's candidate program. As Candidate Secretary, Dr. Amstutz has engaged in an active public ministry, representing ABWE in colleges, seminaries, Bible schools and local churches. He corresponds with hundreds of young people annually regarding Christian service at home and abroad, processing all applications for missionary service, and then conducts ABWE's annual candidate orientation program.

A Look At Europe W. Wilbert Welch, Ph.D.

Is it possible that the Lord may be once again moving His candlestick? There seems to be some evidence that a new wave of missionary evangelization may be moving toward Europe - so long the forgotten continent of missionary enterprise. Shadows of the revived Roman Empire indicate the nearness of the end of Gentile rule, yet the Lord may allow in grace that Europe's door be knocked on once again (Rev. 3:20). Our recent 44 day visit to Europe permitted us to see our missionary activity from a limited but firsthand perspective. Being neither a tourist nor cameraclicker, our full time was spent speaking to, conversing with, and responding to our missionary personnel serving under Baptist Mid-Missions, ABWE, and Evangelical Baptist Missions of Germany, Austria, England, Scotland, Italy, and Spain plus spending eight days behind the lus performance in the second behind the Iron Curtain mainly in Romania.

In looking at my records I find Mrs. Welch and I met with approximately 87 missionaries (plus MAPPERS) from 11 different stations (at some points two stations or fields met together for the fourday sessions) and spoke approximately 100 times. Our own personal objectives of seeing the mission fields firsthand and sensing the heartbeat of our missionaries was fulfilled in an abundant manner. Our objectives of assisting the missionaries in goal setting, enlarging the vision, stretching the potential, identifying and helping to resolve hindering factors, and listing essential steps for the fulfillment of goals--these will have to be weighed by the missionaries who so patiently sat through innumberable sessions, and by the yardstick of productivity in the next ten years. The visible re-sponse was excellent. Our missionaries are to be commended for their willingness to be stretched in thinking, vision and plans. Only occasionally did I see a neg-ative spirit of, 'It can't be done here," or a faint glimmer of the attitude, "What are you endeavor-ing to do, usurp the work of the Holy Spirit?" when we talked about having a clearly defined purpose, realistic goals to fulfill the purpose, and a carefully structured organization and viable steps for reaching the goals.

What was visibly accomplished? Some startling, mind boggling, church planting goals were estab-lished and blueprinted for each field. As of this summer of 1977 compared with accepted goals for 1987, we see the following:

Have you ever stopped to pray for your MK's? There is probably no other ministry that touches the very heart of missions like that of caring for missionary children. Missionary parents pray faithfully for them, for they feel the pressure of responsibility toward their family. Fellow missionaries pray for them, for they understand and share in the responsibilities of the children. Above all, these pressures and responsibilities can greatly affect the ministry of the mission field.

It is sad to see a mission station forced to close down due to the lack of personnel. But the hard-working missionary couple who normally lives there is in the states to remain with their daughter while

ful hours were given to the potential, hindering factors, and per-sonnel needs. We left many fields deeply excited about their potential and earnestly desiring to see the Lord work through their united efforts. Their great need now is earnest, believing prayer support. The enlistment and training of national personnel is the top priority on every field--much more needed than the proliferation of missionaries.

MY EVALUATIONS. First, our churches must better know their missionaries. Our church boards must meet with the supported missionaries and both listen to their heartbeat and also ask questions. The investment demands accountability. Expect an intelligently planned operation -- for the day, for the week, for the year, and for five years. As a visitor and guest I can only challenge and suggest, but as a supporting church you can ask the hard questions. My experience with these dedicated servants of Christ is that they earnestly want a productive ministry. Pray for them? Yes. Support them? Yes. But help them also to think big.

Secondly, mission fields can use experienced men and women, especially if a language is not involved. Capable U.S. pastors should be thinking of England and Scotland as most challenging fields of service, not as an escape from mediocre performance here but as an opportunity to see the Gospel work in lands once fragrant with truth.

Thirdly, if I dare say it, from an observer's perspective I feel this type of ministry is desperately needed on mission fields to save our missionaries from the frustrations of working hard but with either embarrassing paucity of results or with no proper yardstick with which to measure results. These missionaries are hard workers but they need the joy of seeing progress. It is one thing to earnestly desire progress but it is quite another to gain the knowhow. Inspiration and perspiration must be married to good Biblical procedures.

Each European field with its reits culture, and its current attitude toward America is a study in itself. Don't hesitate to visit this continent of our fathers. You will return enlarged in vision and understanding.



she receives her education. There is no other solution.

Did you ever see a people hungry for the printed Word and at the same time see the printing presses gather dust in a silent print shop? But the printer who was scheduled to come to the field discovered he had a serious problem. He found out that his wife would have the heavy responsibility of teaching their five grade-school children. Then there's the heartbreak of a hospital's closing its doors when there are those nearby who are dying and in need of medical attention. But the missionary doctor had to cut short his term in order to take his son back to the States for his third year of school. His wife had tried her best to teach their little boy first and second grades, but, with her teenage and children's classes, she found it too much for her to do and do well.

Yes, dear reader, it is a tragedy to see a mission station, a printing press, a hospital or even an entire field closed because of the lack of missionaries to do the work. Oh, it's not because missionary parents do not love the Lord or His work, but they feel their first responsibility is to care for those children given to them by the Lord. You see, to these parents, the welfare and education of their children are important. You can imagine the heartache it would be for a mother and father to leave that eight-yearold girlor that fifteen-year-old boy for the next four years.

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That's why education on the field for missionary children makes such a difference in missions. It gives the parents a much easier feeling to know they are only a few hundred miles away and two months from the next visit, rather than to be six thousand miles away and three or four years from the time that they will see those precious children again.

How important is this ministry for missionary children? This writer places it as priority number one in foreign missions -- an important reason to pray for them.

Missionary children do need your prayers. True, they are different at times, but there may be reasons for making them that way. Any way you look at it, they are a group of young people who touch the very heart of missions because they are loved by parents who are deeply involved in missions. If you have never done so before, I trust this article will challenge you to pray for MK's.


BMM Candidate Seminar

Cedarville Announces Participation In ACT

Proficiency Exam Program

Cedarville College, Cedarville, Ohio has announced participation in the ACT Proficiency Examination Program (ACT-PEP), a service that is designed to make it possible for individuals to obtain college course credit on the basis of test scores.

The national program features 47 college-level proficiency exams based on specific course requirements and covering a broad range of subject areas, including arts and sciences, business, criminal justice, education, health, and nursing.

All of the ACT-PEP tests have been designated as those that qualify for possible granting of credit at Cedarville College, according to John D. Street, Jr., Acting Di-rector of Admissions.

Anyone interested in taking one or more of the ACT-PEP exams to obtain course credit at Cedarville College should contact the Admissions Office for information about registration, location of area test centers, descriptive materials about content of the exams, and cost.


Each of the ACT-PEP tests has a companion "Study Guide" that is available to prospective candidates without charge. These guides describe the total scope of the test and include suggestions about how a person should prepare for it.

The ACT-PEP tests are offered at area test centers on four weekday national test dates each year. The four dates for the 1977-78 school year are: November 3-4, February 2-3 and August 3-4. There is a designated registration period for each of the two-day test

The proficiency examinations featured in the ACT-PEP Program were developed by the University of the State of New York and have been used extensively for more than a decade as part of two widely

New Dormitories

Presently under construction on the campus of Cedarville College are two men's dormitories. Both the buildings will house men, eliminating the use of Cedar Park, on the south side of town. One new dorm will contain eight units and house 64 students. The other dorm will have nine units and house 72 students, as well as living accommodations for a resident advisor, laundry facilities, and a lounge and recreation room. The buildings follow the same plan as two present dormitories, Marshall and Carr, except that the new dorms will have no basements. The two new dormitories, with a completion date of the end of August, are the first phase of a two-phase plan to allow for campus expansion as needed.

The 47 proficiency tests were first made available throughout the United States and at military bases overseas in 1976 when The American College Testing Program (ACT) became responsible for administering them outside the State of New York.

During the program's initial year of operation, about 500 colleges and universities indicated their intention to provide course credit on the basis of the ACT-PEP test scores. It is anticipated that the number of institutions participating in the ACT-PEP Program will grow to about 1,000 during this second year that ACT is making the exams available on a world-wide basis. Headquarters for the new ACT-PEP Program is located in the ACT National Office in Iowa City, Iowa.

A national and nonprofit educa-tional organization, ACT provides a variety of educational programs and services designed for use by students and their educational institutions. The best known and most widely used of ACT's programs has probably been the ACT Assessment Program, which is used each year by about one million students as part of their precollege planning.

I'm embarrassed. . . .

On March 16th the annual All-Ohio "Talents for Christ" Contest was held at Cedarville College. I was a contestant in the category of General Comprehensive Bible Knowledge. This contest consists of a 150 question written test covering the entire Bible. I came in second with a 66% score for answering 99 questions. The winner had 72%.

Before you congratulate me, let me tell you what happened. When I sent in my application, I did not think I had a chance of even placing in the contest. I thought it would be good experience and expected at least thirty people to be competing in that category. I was in for a big surprise (maybe I should say small surprise!) for when we arrived at Alfred Auditorium, there were only 63 competitors in a contest that consisted of fourteen categories.

I am not faulting the staff which ran the contest. It was a beautifully organized event. The thing that shocked me was that the nearly 200 GARB Churches in Ohio only produced sixty-three contestants.

I went to Cedarville completely unprepared. I did not deserve to wear a second-place ribbon. Believe it or not, there were only four contestants in my category. I do not be-lieve our churches are supporting their "Talents for Christ" Contest. What are our young people doing in our churches? Only four contestants in General Bible Knowledge, when we have Bible taught in our Sunday Schools, in our Worship Services and in our youth groups??? Only four? There should be more contestants in this field than any other.

This was my first year in the contest and I plan to return next year to see what will happen. If the contest is to grow, it needs the support of the churches who are supposedly behind it.


Thirtieth Anniversary And Dedication Service

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

It was the privilege of your writer to attend the annual conference of the General Association of Regular Baptist Churches in Des Moines, Iowa, June 27 to July 1. To me, this was an outstanding conference and the working of the Spirit of God was evidenced in many ways.

All the messages were excellent, starting with the keynote speaker, Dr. Joseph Stowell on "The Fellowship of the Saints", to the closing message on "The Fellowship of Soul-Winning" by Rev. Donald Tyler. One of the highlights of the conference was the preaching of Dr. William Fusco, Western Deputation Secretary of <u>BAPTIST MID-MISSIONS</u> on "The Fellowship of Supplication." When this topic was assigned to Brother Fusco, it was not known that his talented wife, Lorene, would be over 90% paralyzed from a malignant brain tumor. Fed by a special machine through a tube inserted through the abdominal wall directly into the stomach, her head held in place by pillows, able to speak in only a whisper because of the paralysis and a tracheotomy, this dear servant of the Lord has taken on a new dimension in her work: the ministry of supplication. Brother Fusco told me that Lorene is rejoicing in the Lord for the privi-

lege which is hers to be able to spend most of her waking moments praying for others. Yes, the assigned topic, "The Fellowship of Supplication," became a living reality to Bill and Lorene Fusco.

The Lord is too wise to make mistakes as we see from this article from the ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS FOR WORLD EVANGELISM:

"We sat spellbound in back of the living room of the Japanese pastor's home and watched the service proceed. Some 35 young folk, with a few oldsters too, had congregated to begin their meeting. Japanese style, they removed their shoes before entering, and then sat on a cushion on the noor. This would be nothing unusual, but as the service progressed, our unizement knew no bounds. Singing, announcements, special music and preaching were all in Japanese sign language. This was a deaf church.

This was a deaf church. The missionary, Mrs. Paul Shook, sat nearby and explained all that went on. "Did Mr. and Mrs. Shook come to Japan with a call to such a ministry? No, but God had Hisplan for them. In 1953, the Lord brought twin boys into the Shooks' home. Soon after that, Paul and Vada Shook became affiliated with A.B.W.E. as duly appointed missionaries to Japan. It was during their deputation ministry that they discovered that baby Steven was totally deaf. They were baffled. God reconfirmed their call to Japan, and one term was spent in a church-planting ministry in Kagoshima.

"While on furlough, Mrs. Shook took a course in teacher-training for the deaf at the University of Iowa. Thus equipped, she was able to assist young Steven in his studies.

During their second term, a Christian deaf boy came to them for fellowship and learned of their deaf son. He knew the Shooks had a heart for the deaf and felt close to them. Later Takeshi Minatozaki felt called to preach and started a 'deaf church'. The Shooks also had the privilege of teaching his deaf brother in the Word of God. The brother now has a ministry among the deaf in Nagasaki Prefecture.



The article goes on to say, "Bayview Baptist Church is moving from Jeffers Gardens to 7th and Olney Streets in Astoria. At 7:30 a.m., Saturday morning, Foreman (Pastor) Dean directed the raising of the first section of the structure. By noon, workers had most of the framework up. On Sunday morning, the new church needed only paint and interior work to be ready for services." The Spirit of God was evident in this evangelistic effort as believers were strengthened in their faith and new converts added to the body of Christ.

The crusade in Puerto Cortes is even more thrilling. It was scheduled for the local soccer stadium, beginning May 23 and ending June 5. The first three meetings were designed primarily for our Baptist churches of the city, a time of prayer, preaching, and dedication. Over 1200 people were in attendance each evening, and again the Spirit of God was evident. People were saved, many rededicated themselves and plans for the crusade were finalized.

At this writing, the crusade is in progress and an attendance of 2000 to 4000 is expected each evening. The missionaries and national pastors are asking God for at least 500 converts. Each service will be on national radio. Praise the Lord for revival and blessing in Honduras.





Report On National GARBC Conference

The following report comes directly from the HomeOffice of our General Association of Regular Baptist Churches, 1300 North Meacham Road, Schaumburg, Illinois - 60195. We are happy to be able to share it with our readers. We thank God for His blessing on our GARBC and for those who serve so faithfully at the HomeOffice and on our Council of Eighteen.

1. Sincere greetings were extended to the All-Ukrainian Evangelical Baptist Fellowship (in America) and the Baptist brethren behind the Iron Curtain. Assurance of prayers, love and concern was given to the Ukrainian Baptist Church Fellowship of the U.S.S.R. on their 125th anniversary.

2. Affirmation on the inspiration and inerrancy of the Bible as God's holy Word included a list of five truths held to be common among the churches of the Association. They are:

- A. The very words of Scripture were chosen by the Holy Spirit.
- B. The Bible is inerrant and infallible and is to be trusted in all and every subject on which it speaks.

C. The Bible is divine author-

- ity to be obeyed joyfully. D. The Genesis account of creation and subsequent events are historical, not mythological or parabolic. Man was created by direct act of God, not by evolution.
- E. Recorded miracles are really supernatural, divine interventions in history and are to be interpreted literally.

The churches were encouraged to be consistent in the teaching of these beliefs and the practicing of them.

3. "Go Teach All Nations" is a call for concern and dedication to soul-winning with the desired end of church planting. Emphasis was placed upon allowing the Bible to be the guidebook in methodology and realizing that we are totally dependent upon God as to the increase that comes from preaching the Word.

4. A declaration of opposition to all forms of pornography and a call to lawmakers for legislation that will protect the citizen against pollution of the mind.

5. A statement of opposition and condemnation of all homosexuality and a call to repentance for all who practice it and a compliment to Anita Bryant for her fight against the Gay Rights movement in Florida. 6. Since the U.S. office of HEW and the Civil Rights Commission have no position on the origin of man and the teaching of science and state legislatures and boards of education are now requiring that public school courses include teaching science as it supports a special creation, a request was made for a hearing to verify the fact that there are materials for public school use that incorporate science as it supports a special creation.

Thirty-two churches were received into the Association at the business session on Tuesday. Of the 18 churches that severed connections with the Association, seven either dissolved or merged with others in the Association. The General Association of R egular Baptist Churches now numbers 1,542 churches.

The finals of the national Talents for Christ contest were held in conjunction with the Youth Day program. First-place winners in each of eleven categories received one-year tuition scholarship to any of the seven GARBC-approved colleges. Second place winners received half-year tuition scholarships.

Other reports given to the assembled messengers included the approved mission agencies, colleges and social agencies. All of these institutions and agencies are independent and receive annual approval from the Association as good outlets for missionary giving for the churches. The missionary committee re-

ported that the five approved mission agencies (Association of Baptists for World Evangelism, Bap-tist Mid-Missions, Evangelical Baptist Missions, Fellowship of Baptists for Home Missions and Hiawatha Baptist Missions) now have 2,278 missionaries, including 1,669 on the field, 206 on furlough and 234 accepted candidates. Another 169 are now on the inactive or retired list. They further re-ported receiving over \$15.85 million for the work of missions around the world. Regular Baptist missionaries are now serving in more than 59 foreign countries, the United States and Canada. Church planting is their ultimate goal.

On the educational scene the Association now approves eight institutions of higher learning:

Baptist Bible College of Penna. and Baptist Bible School of Theology, Clarks Summit, Pa.

Cedarville College, Cedarville, Ohio

Denver Baptist Bible College, Denver, Colo.(approved June/77) Faith Baptist Bible College, Ankeny, Iowa

Grand Rapids Baptist College and Seminary, Grand Rapids, Mi. Los Angeles Baptist College, Newholl Collif

Newhall, Calif. Northwest Baptist Seminary, Tacoma, Wash.

Western Baptist Bible College, Salem, Oregon.

The schools (excluding Denver) reported a total of 4,487 students enrolled during the past academic year.

There are also four social agencies approved by the Association. The Baptist Children's Home of Valparaiso, Indiana, provides child care and foster home placement, adoptive ministry, a home for unwed mothers and family counseling service. The Michigan Christian Home Association of Grand Rapids offers a home for senior citizens. The Regular Baptist Children's Home of St. Louis, Michigan, provides child care, foster home placement, care for unwed mothers and family counseling services. Shepherds, Inc., ahome and training school for the mentally retarded, is located in Union Grove, Wisconsin.

The international radio voice of the GARBC is "Living Reality," now heard on 58 stations in the United States, the West Indies and the Philippines. Dr. Joseph M. Stowell, National Representative, is the regular speaker on the broadcast. Over 10,000 copies of the radio message booklets go out each month to listeners. Also heard periodically on the broadcast is Dr. William Kuhnle, Assistant to the National Representative.

The total number of chaplains, including those on active duty, Reserve Components, National Guard and the Civil Air Patrol, is 61. Of these 61 chaplains, 24 are currently on active duty. The Baptist Builders' Club, which

The Baptist Builders' Club, which gives financial grants of up to \$5,000 to needy churches, reported that eight churches had received grants totaling \$38,000 during the past fiscal year. Since the Club began, 392 churches have shared in grants totaling \$823,840.

One of the far-ranging ministries of the Association is Regular Baptist Press. Brought into existence 25 years ago by the express wish of the churches, the Press now serves over 4,600 churches with Sunday School curriculum materials. In addition to Sunday School literature, the Press publishes books, Vacation Bible School material and gospel tracts, and conducts a Sunday School conference ministry. Gospel Literature Services supplies free literature to missionaries serving under GARBC-approved mission agencies as God provides the necessary funds. Literature was fur-nished to 25 foreign countries in addition to 27 states in the USA; 326 literature projects were completed during this fiscal year, an increase of 112 over last year. Do You Know Joel Kettenring?

Someone once said, "You really don't know a fellow staff member until you have to work all day in an office with him." This may or may not be true. At any rate, it is a joy to my heart to share with you some information about my Baptist Mid-Missions' Home Office co-worker, Rev. Joel Kettenring.

Joel has had a rich background in the Christian life. Because his father was a fundamental Baptist minister, he heard the gospel at an early age. He was ten years old when he was born again and baptized. During his junior year of high school, God placed upon his heart the burden to become a preacher.

Brother Kettenring attended Bryan College in Tennessee and received a B.A. degree in Bible with an English minor. It was while attending Bryan that he and his wife, Pauline, began traveling in Public Relations for the school as well as directing a gospel team.

After Bryan, Joel enrolled at Grace Theological Seminary, where he earned the Master of Divinity degree. During his seminary days he served the Lord in a student pastorate and later became music-and-youth director of Glen Park Baptist Church, Gary, Indiana. After graduation from Grace, Joel became assistant to the pastor.

From Gary, God led the Kettenrings into a pastorate in Wisconsin for a period of three and a half years.

With this experience behind him, Brother Kettenring then accepted the position of Chairman of the Bible Department at Pillsbury

Baptist Bible College, Owatonna, Minnesota, where he served nine years. While he was at Pillsbury, he was also involved in Bible Conference work and evangelistic campaigns. At the same time, he completed work on the Master of Theology degree from Central Theological Seminary, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

After Pillsbury, Joel returned to the pastorate as pastor of Faith Baptist Church, St. Paul, Minnesota. It was at this time that God spoke to Joel and Pauline's hearts concerning the field of Jamaica. They applied to Baptist Mid-Missions and were accepted for that field. Their main responsibilities in Jamaica were teaching at Fairview Baptist Bible College and developing the Hillview Baptist Church which became an indigenous work.

In 1975, the Kettenrings returned from Jamaica. At that time he accepted the position as Candidate Secretary of Baptist Mid-Missions.

We who have the joy and privilege of working here at the HomeOffice with Brother Joel thank the Lord for him. I trust that you, too, will have the joy of meeting him one of these days.



Safe In The Arms Of Jesus

A Hymn That Was Written in 15 Minutes

William Howard Doane was one of those yersatile individuals who could keep several irons hot at the same time. He was an expert accountant, an inventor with 70 patents to his credit and president and general manager of a plant in Cincinnati. He played several musical instruments, sang in church choirs, published no less than 40 song books, wrote, 2,300 compositions and was awarded the degree of doctor of music by Ohio's Denison University.

Deeply religious, it was natural that Doane should combine his talents with those of Hymn-Writer Fanny Crosby. The team grew to understand each other so well that when the composer sent melodies to Miss Crosby in Brooklyn the music often suggested themes for verses. And it worked the other way. Many times Miss Crosby sent verses to Doane in Cincinnati and the words suggested a melody. It was, in fact, Doane's ability to sense the sentiment of Fanny Crosby's words and to compose such appealing tunes for them, that the music itself made popular many of the blind writer's hymns. To men-

> Safe in the arms of Jesus, Safe on His gentle breast, There by His Love o'ershaded, Sweetly my soul shall rest. Hark 'tis the voice of angels, Borne in song to me. Over the fields of glory, Over the Jasper sea.

Safe in the arms of Jesus, Safe from corroding care, Safe from the world's temptations, Sin cannot harm me there. tion but a few: "Pass Me Not, O Gentle Saviour" . . . "Near the Cross" . . . "Saviour More Than Life to Me" . . . "I'm Thine, O Lord" . . . "Rescue the Perishing".

One day in 1868, Doane took "the cars" for New York on a quick business trip. During the ride a melody kept running through his mind. Concluding his business, the composer hurried over to Brooklyn to leave the tune with his co-worker. He ran it off on the organ and, as he had only 40 minutes to get the cars back to Cincinnati, asked "Aunt Fanny" to mail him words for the music. But Fanny Crosby asked Doane to start writing. As fast as the composer could take down the words the blind poetess dictated and, according to her own story, Doane was on his way to the station in 15 minutes.

Settled on the train, the business man-composer studied the hastily written verses. Each word fit perfectly with the melody. Thus was born a hymn that was sung 47 years later at Fanny Crosby's funeral...

> Free from the blight of sorrow, Free from my doubts and fears; Only a few more trials, Only a few more tears.

Jesus, my heart's dear refuge, Jesus has died for me; Firm on the Rock of Ages, Ever my trust shall be. Here let me wait with patience, Wait till the night is o'er; Wait till I see the morning

Break on the golden shore.



New Campus Outreach





The Children's Agency is in need of much prayer at this time as many tentative plans are taking shape. There is the need of guidance by the Lord, wisdom in making decisions, and financial help in seeing the plans finalized and the projects completed.

NEEDS FOR PRAYER

(1) Two new baths and a new furnace are needed at Unit 2 on the Riverside C am pus. This Unit, which would have a capacity of eight girls, has not been in use recently, and the Agency risks having the Unit dropped from the Agency's license which comes up for renewal in August. The cost of this project would be around \$10,000. If some move is made toward installing these improvements, perhaps Unit 2 can remain under license. This is a critical need. Please pray!

(2) Agency administrators are contacting social workers and probate judges in neighboring counties in order to increase the population of the Agency. This increase is vital if the Agency is to fulfill its purpose of serving youngsters.

(3) Pray for wisdom in planning and promoting an auction in September, which will dispose of much unneeded and obsolete equipment. This may include furniture, dishes, tools, appliances, and office supplies which have accumulated. Profits would be used to purchase new equipment. Did You Know These Facts Concerning

Baptist Children's Home?

Reaching homeless boys and girls for Christ was the burden on the hearts of Rev. and Mrs. Ernie Francis as they founded the Baptist Children's Home. Some have experienced the death of one or both parents while others come from broken homes where perhaps neither parent is able to care for them.

Nearly 50 young people (70% of our kids are teen-agers now) are presently in our five homes.

The first home was completed in 1959; the second in 1965. By 1975, the fifth was under construction and was occupied in 1976. Three are near Kouts; the other two are in Valparaiso.

Providing a family-like atmosphere is one of our goals at Baptist Children's Home. All our homes eat family-style meals around a big table. Bedrooms are shared, two to a room. Each home has from eight to twelve children. Children have come from sixteen different states.

The adoption ministry is a natural outgrowth of the Bethesda Home for unwed mothers. Girls who come to Bethesda will receive group and individual counseling on a regular basis. In order to be of the greatest service in helping these girls get their lives back together, it is desirable for them to come by the fourth or fifth month of their pregnancy.

pregnancy. At Bethesda, eight girls can be cared for at a time and the home is usually at or near capacity. The girls have come as young as 13 years old. We have had girls from all over the country. About 9 out of 10 are allowing their baby to be adopted into good, solid Christian homes.

Rev. Donald E. Worch is Executive Director of this growing ministry, headquartered in Valparaiso, Indiana. Baptist Children's Home & Fam-

Baptist Children's Home & Family Ministries is one of the approved agencies of the GARBC and is located at 354 West Street, Valparaiso, Indiana - 46384. Their phone number is (219) 462-4111.

(4) We are investigating the possibility of enrolling the children in a Christian Day School in Midland. This would require tuition support for each child, but attending the school would make a whole new impact and positive influence on their lives. If this cannot be set up for this fall, it will still be under serious consideration for 1978.

(5) Note of rejoicing: Roger and Barbara Crampton of Xenia, Ohio arrived August 1. They will serve as houseparents and supervisors over the child care stuff. The Cramptons have had eight years experience in this type work.

(6) Above all, pray for wisdom in planning and decision making.



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The Word For 'Bearing Sins'

Hebrews 9:28 states, "So Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many..." As the Jewish priests came with the blood of animals to offer over and over again these sacrifices - would Christ have to die over and over again and repeat His sacrifice anew? No - such a thought is repugnant. The idea of such a repetition is impossible, even as is the idea that men must die again and again to attain judgment from God. Christ's repeating His endless sacrifice is absolutely excluded by the incomparable nature of the blood He shed for us. He will return - but not again to shed His blood. Christ died <u>once</u>, and actually was offered as a sacrifice Himself so as to bear our sins for us. That was the manner of His death: He was made a curse for us.

The word translated "to bear" in Heb. 9:28, is the term which describes the Lord's appearance in this world-age in order to put away sins by the sacrifice of Himself. It is the verb <u>anaphero</u>, which has the general meaning of "lift up so as to carry away." In the Papyri, it occurs quite frequently, as in Papy Peter I. 16:2 (237 B.C.) where the debts of a man are described as being laid upon another; and in Syll. 813:11, of garments being deposited with an individual who laid them away and refused to return them. It was also used of the transference of certain prisoners from a village prison to a metropolitan prison for permanent keeping. And another usage speaks of the "registration of the death of a priest in the official record," (Papy Lond 28:15, A.D. 66).

In the Septuagint Version, the word appears in 1 Sam. 17:54, where it is said that 'David took the head of the Philistine and <u>brought it up to</u> Jerusalem. . .'' i Chron. 15 has the word in vv. 3, 12, 14, to translate "bring up", i.e. the ark of God, to be put in its place. In Gen. 8:20, Noah is set forth as '<u>offering</u> up sacrifices on the altar,'' and Num. 23:2 has the same usage, as does Judges 11:31. But Isa. 53:12 goes further to state that ''He <u>bore</u> the sin of many. . . .'' The personal pronoun ''He'' refers - not to the land as the Rabbis insist with their traditional interpretation - but to the Messiah Himself, the Saviour who '<u>took up and laid upon Himself</u> the sin of many, and bore it all away.''

The Church Fathers in their writings, used the word variously to mean "lift up, take upon oneself to do something, uplift spiritually, to hunch the shoulders and then raise up, bear or carry away, offer sacrifice, lift one's mind and voice up to God in prayer, bring up a matter, take up to heaven." Finally, they were near unanimous in their use of the word to describe Christ's offering of Himself as the absolute and final sacrifice for sins. In this they agreed in their rendering of the verb to mean that our Lord Jesus Christ lifted up our sins away from us, thus deliv-ering us from their awful weight and guilt, bore their punishment Himself, and thus took them away in everlasting expiation.

The New Testament has the word in Matt. 27:1 to record the fact that "Jesus...bringeth them up to a high mountain..." Heb. 7:27 characterizes the once-for-all offering up of Christ (anenengkas) in contrast to the repeated bringing

of sacrifices to the altar (anapherein) by the earthly priests. James uses the verb to describe Abraham's offering of Isaac upon the altar (2:21, anenengkas); and Pet. 2:5 speaks of believers "offering up spiritual sacrifices to God" (anenengkai). But the supreme use of the term occurs in 1 Pet. 2:24, where it is stated that Christ "His ownself bore (anenengken) our sins in His own body on the tree. ... Peter is most exact. He says Christ, Himself sinless, carried up our sins in His own body prepared for that purpose, and with that body loaded with all our sins, died the awful bloody death of a cross. There He took all those sins away, all the guilt, and the total curse He bore in explation.

Without Himself becoming a sinner, He nevertheless took the sins place, entered into the case ner of the sinner, and, lifting up the sinner's burden, took it all over upon Himself, enduring the divine punishment on Himself, so as to carry all those sins away into forgetfulness. So, in this manner our Lord Jesus Christ has brought to all those for whom He suffered, to all who will receive Him and His redemptive work to themselves by faith, total and complete separation from their sins forever. No burden, no guilt, no curse remains. The saved stand before God as having no more connection with their old sins, or with the life of sinning. Hence, as intended by God, we now enter into the living of our lives unto righteousness. All this is involved in the word anaphero. Its Old Testament usages form the background for its great ultimate meaning and, along with its use in early Greek, contribute to its unsurpassed New Testament sense. Rev. William Fusco received an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree on May 27 from Northwest Baptist Seminary, Tacoma, Washington.
