
the time and effort many times beyond the call of duty.

National GARBC Representative Makes Announcement

At one of the business sessions of the recent national GARBC conference held at Lakeland, Florida, Dr. Joseph M. Stowell, National Representative read the following announcement:

"In every life there comes a time of the turning of the tide. At such times the believer must be very sensitive to the leading of the Holy Spirit.

"I now give advance notice to our beloved Association of Churches of my retirement from the office of National Representative. If our Lord has not come by conference time at Dayton next year, and I am spared until then, I will formally announce my retirement from this post to take effect October 31, 1979 D.V.

"This is being done now to give the churches time to pray for God's leading concerning my successor. It will give the Council of Eighteen lead time to do the necessary praying and search. We trust that all will unite in prevailing prayer that the right man will be found, and that the Council and Association will unite behind him and his leadership.

"When God called me out of the pastorate to this work with the Association, I asked him to give me ten more good years. October 31, 1979 (termination date) will complete those ten years. I will then be 68 years of age.

age. "I, of course, am not retiring from the Lord's work. We are trusting Him for fruitful years in other corners of His vineyard.

"As you must know, this is not a quick decision but comes after much prayer and seeking the face of God concerning His will.

"Pray that my remaining time as National Representative will be fruitful and that our Lord will give the needed health and strength for this task which always demands divine enablement."

It Could Work For You!

Your editor travels far and wide serving in the field of evangelism. It has been our privilege to hold forth the Word of life in churches both large and small. We have ministered in churches where little or nothing was done in preparing the people or informing the public concerning the meetings. The results were generally nil.

Generally, we clear of gimmicks, contests, prizes and the like, however, recently we held a meeting in the Faith Baptist Church of Gallipolis, Ohio. They had a bit of a contest which they used and it proved most effective. It was handled most inoffensively and yet, with enthusiasm. There might be some who would object to it. It did bring a good sized crowd to each service - saved and unsaved alike. It resulted in very good meetings!

Other pastors have well prepared their people and notified their community. Different means of making the meetings known have been used, such as radio, T.V., telephoning, the printed page, banners, etc. and all, to one degree or another, have been effective.

We asked Pastor Lahaie to write concerning this interest-catching program. We submit his reply.

--We asked ourselves the question -"How can we motivate our people to invite their neighbors and friends during our special evangelistic mettings?" The following plan was suggested by our deacons and it worked!

Each night several (we chose five) people are designated publicly as "Inviters" for the next night. Each person they invite who comes to the meeting will be counted. Triple points are given for first-time visitors. Double points are given for those who have not been present at any of our church services for at least two weeks. One point is given for anyone invited who are regular attenders.

Ushers should be assigned at each door with a clipboard and a tabulation sheet to welcome people and to record the points for each of the "Inviters". It helps to say you cannot invite anyone while on the church property. Personal invitations by the "Invitor" is the rule to follow.

Enthusiasm can be generated by carefully selecting the "Inviters". Deacons and Sunday School teachers always generate enthusiasm but do not limit your selecting to these alone. Provide some nice prizes worth working for, such as good books, carefully selected records, and the like.

Each evening the number points earned by the "Inviters" is given to the pastor and he, in turn, will announce the winner for that evening. It is good to let the people know the number of points earned. A nightly prize of a record is given to the "Inviter" who earned the most points that evening. A grand prize (a good Scofield Bible) is given to the "Inviter" with the most points during the meetings.

So often, a pastor urges everyone to bring someone and no one does anything! With this simple contest, a select few are designated who will work hard with all their might - the results are tremendous. We suggest you try it. IT WORKS!

A Preacher and a Singer Take a Train Ride

Bible School Goes To Children

Editor's Note: Whenever local papers print stories of activities in our churches, we like to share these with our O.I.B. readers. The following appeared in the Bellefontaine, Ohio paper concerning the Calvary Baptist Church.

There won't be any children attending vacation Bible School at the Calvary Baptist Church this year. Instead, the school will be going to them, in the form of "five-day clubs."

Because church membership is scattered throughout the county, "we just decided to go where the kids are instead of having them come here. In this way, we hope to reach more children who wouldn't normally come, and their families as well," according to the church's outreach pastor, Bob Whitney.

Five-day clubs consist of five, onehour sessions held Aug. 6-11 in the yards of various homes around the county. "We anticipate having 10 clubs. Already one has been scheduled for DeGraff, one at Russells Point and a number in Bellefontaine," he said. "We hope to involve at least 150 kids, kindergarten through the sixth grade.

"There will be five teaching teams, consisting of three members each, who will meet at the homes at 9 or 11 a.m. In case of rain, the classes will be held indoors or on a porch.

"The teaching material has been provided by Child Evangelism Fellowship, an organization which has spent years working only with children, and its material has been used successfully," the Rev. Whitney stated.

Each one-hour session will consist of about 10 minutes of singing, followed by five minutes of memory verse, 20 minutes of Bible lesson, more songs and a 15 minute missionary story.

"On Sunday, Aug. 13, the evening service will be dedicated to the five-day clubs. The concluding missionary story will be told, and awards will be given to children who attended. Also, Rev. Earl Decker will have a special message geared toward this," he said.

"The primary purpose of these fiveday clubs is to teach boys and girls and to share with them what the Bible has to say. We want to teach the claims Christ makes on our lives, and we want to explain who Christ was and what He did for us," the Rev. Whitney said. "We're also using this as a way to meet new families in the community."



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

To acquaint our readers with the men whom God has raised up to direct the G.A.R.B.C. approved mission agencies, we plan to carry a resume of one of the leaders each month. We believe this information will be of interest to you in this special series on missions. (Editor's Note)

REV. DAVID L. MARSHALL, General Director of the EVANGELICAL BAPTIST MISSIONS, INC., Kokomo, Indiana, was born in 1928 and is a native of Norristown, Pennsylvania. He attended Norristown schools, Williamson Trade School and the Bible Institute of Pennsylvania (now Philadelphia College of Bible). He also served in the U.S. Navy in 1945-1946.


Rev. Marshall was married in 1948 to Elaine Beswick of Upper Marion Township, Pennsylvania, and in the following year they applied for missionary service in West Africa under Evangelical Baptist Missions, then known as Christian Missions.

The Marshalls sailed for North Africa in 1950 and after a period of language study in Algeria and France, they began their missionary work in the fabled city of Timbuktu in the French Soudan. When independence was granted to this colony in 1960, it became the new nation of Mali. At the same time, Brother Marshall was appointed Field Director of EBM's ministries in this West African country. In 1968 the Mission Board retained him in the States for a year as Promotional Secretary.

Mr. Marshall has had twenty-two years of missionary experience and has traveled and visited in twenty-two countries. He speaks three languages. In August, 1972, he was appointed General Director of Evangelical Baptist Missions' operations at home and abroad. EBM is currently involved in twelve countries seeking to win converts to Christ; training and educational institutions; and the establishing of indigenous churches.


Three of the members, Mrs. Ethyl King, Mrs. Lula Tarlton, and Mrs. Josephine Carter have been members for over 65 years.

And The New"

by A. W. Tozer

All unannounced and mostly undetected there has come in modern times a new cross into popular evangelical circles. It is like the old cross, but different: The likenesses are superficial; the differences, fundamental.

From this new cross has sprung a new philosophy of the Christian life, and from that new philosophy has come a new evangelical technique - a new type of meeting and a new kind of preaching. This new evangelism employs the same language as the old, but its content is not the same and its emphasis not as before.

The old cross would have not truck with the world. For Adam's proud flesh it meant the end of the journey. It carried into effect the sentence imposed by the law of Sinai. The new cross is not opposed to the human race; rather, it is a friendly pal and, if understood aright, it is the source of oceans of good clean fun and innocent enjoyment. It lets Adam live without interference. His life motivation is unchanged; he still lives

The new cross encourages a new and entirely different evangelistic approach. The evangelist does not demand abnegation of the old life before a new life can be received. He preaches not contrasts but similarities. He seeks to key into public interest by showing that Christianity makes no unpleasant demands; rather, it offers the same thing the world does, only on a higher level. Whatever the sinmad world happens to be clamoring after at the moment is cleverly shown to be the very thing the gospel offers, only the religious product is better.

The new cross does not slay the sinner, it redirects him. It gears him into a cleaner and jollier way of living and saves his selfrespect. To the self-assertive it says, "Come and assert yourself for Christ." To the egotist it says, "Come and do your boasting in the Lord." To the thrill-seeker it says, "Come and enjoy the thrill of Christian fellowship." The Christian message is slanted in the direction of the current vogue in order to make it acceptable to the public.

The philosophy back of this kind of thing may be sincere, but its sincerity does not save it from being false. It is false because it is blind. It misses completely the whole meaning of the cross.

The old cross is a symbol of death. It stands for the abrupt, violent end of a human being. The man in Roman times who took up his cross and started down the road had already said good-by to his friends. He was not coming back. He was not going out to have his life redirected; he was going out to have it ended. The cross made no compromise, modified nothing, spared nothing; it slew all of the man, completely and for good. It did not try to keep on good terms with its victim. It struck cruel and hard, and when it had finished its work, the man was no more.

The race of Adam is under death sentence. There is no commutation and no escape. God cannot approve any of the fruits of sin, however innocent they may appear or beautiful to the eyes of men. God salvages the individual by liquidating him and then raising him again to newness of life.

That evangelism which draws friendly parallels between the ways of God and the ways of men is false to the Bible and cruel to the souls of its hearers. The faith of Christ does not parallel the world, it intersects it. In coming to Christ we do not bring our old life up onto a higher plane; we leave it at the cross. The corn of wheat must fall into the ground and die.

We who preach the gospel must not think of ourselves as public relations agents sent to establish

'What Can I Do?'

Occasionally someone asks me, "Pastor, what can I do?" Love those people and love those words. Not everyone has the gift of teaching, or singing, or administrating, or playing organ or piano: however, there is something that everyone can do. EVERYONE CAN BE FRIENDLY. It doesn't cost anything to be warm, wear a smile, and be friendly, especially to guests. The Bible says that he who would have friends must first show himself friendly. You can do that. Try it.

EVERYONE CAN BE THANKFUL. Paul said, "In everything give thanks." A Thankful spirit brightens everyone's life and enables us to count our blessings instead of aches and pains. What things

good will between Christ and the world. We must not imagine ourselves commissioned to make Christ acceptable to big business, the press, or the world of sports, or modern education. We are not diplomats but prophets, and our message is not a compromise but an ultimatum.


an ultimatum. God offers life, but not an improved old life. The life he offers is life out of death. It stands always on the far side of the cross. Whoever would possess it must pass under the rod. He must repudiate himself and concur in God's just sentence against him.

What does this mean to the individual, the condemned man who would find life in Christ Jesus? How can this theology be translated into life? Simply, he must repent and believe. He must forsake his sins and then go on to forsake himself. Let him cover nothing, defend nothing, excuse nothing. Let him not seek to make terms with God, but let him bow his head before the stroke of God's stern displeasure and acknowledge himself worthy to die.

self worthy to die. Having done this let him gaze with simple trust upon the risen Saviour, and from Him will come life and rebirth and cleansing and power. The cross that ended the earthly life of Jesus now puts an end to the sinner; and the power that raised Christ from the dead now raises him to a new life along with Christ.

To any who may object to this or count it merely a narrow and private view of truth, let me say God has set His hallmark of approval upon this message from Paul's day to the present. Whether stated in these exact words or not, this has been the content of all preaching that has brought life and power to the world through the centuries. The mystics, the reformers, the revivalists have put their emphasis here, and signs and wonders and mighty operations of the Holy Ghost gave witness to God's approval. Dare we, the heirs of such a legacy of power tamper with the truth? Dare we with our stubby pencil erase the lines of the blueprint or alter the pattern shown us in the Mount? Let us preach the old cross and we will know the old power.

Of course the Devil doesn't want us to be healthy and robust and spiritual, but God does. Don't wait for others to start, begin right now.

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The Word Of Discrimination

In James 2:4, the writer admonishes his readers with regard to discriminating between people by showing deference to notable individuals who come into the assemblies but showing no deference at all to poor folks who come in. He says, "Are ye not then partial in yourselves. . .?" The words "Are ye (not then) partial" are the English rendering of the Greek verb diekrithete, from diakrino, which is a term of unusual interest and significance. Its basic sense is "separate, be separated," and deep in the background of the word is the idea of discrimination in various aspects. It appears in the Papyri in the sense of "making a decision, to distinguish between persons and things, to make distinctions." There are also frequent occurrences of the word in the Septaugint Version. In Job 12:11, Job asks, "Doth not the ear test words?" Here the word has the idea of dis-tinguish or discern clearly. Exodus 18:16 cites Moses' words to Jethro, "When they have a matter, they come unto me and I judge between one and another. ... In this statement the verb carries the thought of careful consideration and a deciding between people. In 1 Kings 3:9, Solomon prays that God will "give therefore to thy servant an understanding heart to judge thy people, that I may discern between good and bad. ..." Here the meaning of "separate, distinguish between, discern" is clear. In Ezekiel 20:35, the thought of "strive, dispute with, judge, and thus make a distinction" is found in God's warning that He will "enter into judgment with His people." All the various ideas and shadings of meaning in discrimination may be found in these usages, including the New Testament text in James 2:4, where the notion of discrimination in the sense of unequal and unfair treatment occurs.

The uses of the word in the New Testament are interesting and important to us. In Acts 15:9, Peter testifies that God "put no difference between" (diekrinen) Jew and Gentile. In no respect did God discriminate between them, circumcised and uncircumcised. He cleansed all hearts by faith. Unclean Jews and unclean Gentiles alike He cleansed in the same way: i.e. by means of the faith - the Word of God received by faith. Paul states significantly in I Cor. 11:29 that the one who eats and drinks unworthily at the Lord's Table eats and drinks judgment to himself "not discerning (diakrinon) the Lord's body." The failure here is that of not discriminating that which is represented by the symbols, i.e. the body of the Lord. To fail to do so is to partake unworthily. How many in our day who participate in the communion service of remembrance fail to discern spiritually the Lord's death and truly apprehend the significance of the elements?

The verb also occurs in Jude 9 and 22. In v. 9, it is used to describe the archangel Michael separating himself in opposition to the devil in striving with the great adversary of God and His people over the body of Moses. In v. 22, Jude uses the verb to describe those "who separate themselves from you," i.e. those who are flirting with false teaching. Toward such - have compassion. When men are yielding to error, it is the time for well-taught Christians to come alongside to help them. This is certainly an admonishment to us that we shall attempt to reach those who are separated from us by false teaching, and are unfortunate enough to be held captive under the deceptive, treacherous ministry of liberal churchmen and spurious religious teachers. The writer of this article has been able by the grace of God to influence a considerable number of people to separate from liberal churches and false teaching, and find their way into good fundamental assemblies. Some even have been saved, and as a result have realized their need. Very little effort is being made in this direction today by our churches and by evangelical-minded leaders.

Again, the verb appears in I Cor. 6:5, where Paul remonstrates with his readers and very carefully makes plain the sense of "adjudicate between" (diakrinai). He says, "Is it possible that among you there is not even a single wise man who shall be able to <u>decide between</u> his brother and another?" The need is for rendering a Christian decision between one brother and another without appearing before judges in a secular court. Furthermore, the verb is used by Paul in I Cor. 4:7, to prick the pride of his readers and bring them down to the level of proper Christian humility. He says, "For who maketh you to differ <u>(diakrinei)</u>?" That is: who has given you an advantage over others, so that you have the preference above them? You have no right to consider yourselves superior to others. God has surely not given it to you, nor has anyone else.

But perhaps the most interesting and important uses of the word occur in three passages: Romans 4:20, Hebrews 5:14, and James 1:6. These passages teach plainly that Christians are to be discriminatory. First, however, the composition of the verb should be noted briefly. The word is formed from the preposition dia (lit. "two," but it comes to mean "through" - a designated interval between), and the verb krino (determine, decree, render an opinion, judge"). The composite nature of the verb is important to its usage and meaning in the New Testament. The New Testament passages previously cited should be considered with the composition of the word in mind.

Romans 4:20 tells us that Abraham "staggered not at the promise of God..." The English rendering "staggered not" is a translation of diekrithe, and although the English translation is not literally correct, it does come close to the idea in the expression. The verb here means "let one's judgment go now this way and now that way." so - - "not arrive at any cer It is as though one is divided tainty." into two men: one man striving in one direction, the other man in the opposite direction, with no division with Abraham where the promise of God was concerned. There was no interval between two directions of thought with him. This is a most accurate description of doubt: Shall I believe, or shall 1 not? and remaining in between the two, unable to make up the mind. Far too many of us are like this when it comes to trusting God and His Word.

Hebrews 5:14 has the noun form of the word, <u>diakrisin</u>, where the writer of Hebrews speaks of having our senses

trained and able for discernment of both what is good and what is bad. This is imperative in our time. It is absolutely essential that believers have the faculty of discernment, and are able to exercise it properly and fully. Christians - both young and older - must be inculcated with the right kind of knowledge and be able to perceive what is good and bad, true and false, right and wrong. We need the ability to penetrate through (dia) our experiences, examining the circumstances and situations that confront us, and not be trapped between them or in the midst of them. But rather, we should have the maturity and capacity for discriminating and making the proper distinctions. Without this ability we shall never be able to approve and endorse things that are excellent.

Finally, we come to James 1:6, where the verb form again occurs. James speaks of One's faith, and says: "But let a man ask in faith, nothing wavering. For he that wavers is like a wave of the sea, driven with the wind and tossed." The word appears twice in this verse: "But let a man ask in faith, nothing wavering (meden diakrinomenos). For the one who wavers (ho diakrinomenos), is like a wave of the sea. . . ." The verb may be correctly translated "doubting," although "wavering" is not a bad rendering. God sees the believer who doubts as a "wave of the sea wind-driven and tossed up and down." We ask for wisdom from God, and then we begin to doubt that He will give it. We turn in one direction and then in another, and are caught between the two. We do not know which is right. A thought strikes the unstable mind from one direction and then from another, and the mind has no resistance, no constancy, no steadiness. It simply yields. There is no discriminatory capacity, no ability to look through the facts and separate the right from the wrong. Such a person is guilty of "wavering," i.e. sinking and falling, then rising, then sinking and falling again. Back and forth, up and down, our minds go: back and forth with double-mindedness and doubt, up and down first in enthusiasm and then in doubt and discouragement. We look

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through the things we pray for and separate those things that appear possible to us from those things that seem impossible. Hence we make up our minds that God will not answer some of our prayers even though He is capable of doing so. When we have decided that God will not bring certain things to pass, then we sink down in depression and discouragement. In such a state we are assessed by God as "two-souled and unstable" (v.8).

May the Lord deliver us from such a status and empower us to ask from Him in simple faith, believing Him and trusting implicitly in His Word. God grant to us the faculty of discrimination and the ability to discern the good from the bad, the right from the wrong, and the true from the false. The days in which we live make this necessary.

How To Really Read A Book

(From AAP Student Service)

A textbook, properly used, can be invaluable in any course. It provides you with essential course information, reinforces your class lectures, helps clarify and complete notes, supplies visual aids and helps prepare for exams. The following six steps have proved to be successful in using textbooks, and they can easily be applied to any assignment.

- 1. Survey the entire book
- 2. Read for the main ideas
- 3. Question yourself as you read
- 4. Underline and make margin notes
- 5. Use study guides
- 6. Review systematically

1. Survey The Entire Book

Glance through the text as a whole: chapter headings and summaries, reading suggestions, quizzes, chronologies, discussion questions, graphs, pictures and diagrams. Scan the table of contents to grasp the

organization and scope of the text. Read the preface carefully to understand the author's purpose and approach.

Read the concluding chapter or final paragraphs of the book. The author will often stress and summarize major points there. Preview each chapter before reading it.

2. Read For the Main Ideas

The author is trying to convey important ideas in each chapter. These, rather than details, should be your primary concern. Periodically ask yourself, "what is the author trying to convey?"

Coordinate your class notes with your reading. Keep full, legible, and accurate lecture notes. Like your textbook, they are a basic reference and you can return to them for guidance.

Read your assignment before each class. You can then join in class discussion to clarify and reinforce your understanding of the material. You will remember better and cramming for exams will be unnecessary.

Summarize what you have read. After finishing a page, restate the main ideas in your mind and then glance back to see if you are correct. Before closing your text, jot down the major points of the material you have read. You will find that most of the supporting details will return to you rather easily.

3. Question Yourself As You Read Ask yourself What, Why, How, Who and When? It will help you grasp the author's main ideas.

What is the meaning of the title of this chapter? What is the purpose of headings and sub-headings, the topic sentence and the concluding remarks? What is the meaning of the important terms that are highlighted? What do the photographs, tables, diagrams or graphs demonstrate?

Why has the author chosen a certain sequence of thought? Why does he elaborate upon a particular point so extensively?

How would you rate the effectiveness of the author's style and presentation? Does he use humor, exaggeration, irony, satire? Are many examples used? Are the graphs and pictures appropriate and easy to understand? For whom is the author writing? If it is a

history text, is it biased? If it is psychology, does the author belong to a special school of thought and does this attitude shape the text's ideas?




Rev. Mark R. Chandler

NEW STUDENT LOUNGE





Good communication in missions is important! In fact, it is absolutely necessary for a successful ministry. I heard a pastor who is closely associated with missions recently say to a group of missionaries the following thought-provoking statement; "As missionaries, in failing to communicate, we have ultimately failed God." Having been active in missions for 29 years, I can agree totally with our brother's words.

Communication involving the missionary, church, mission agency, pastor, fellow missionary, etc., is vital for the benefit of all. Too many times, communication is minimized to the extent that it results in misunderstandings, hard feelings and sometimes a break in relationships.

This same pastor also said, "Good communication means that you never put a pastor on the spot." Again, I agree completely with his good judgment. One area where perhaps we can all improve for the glory of the Lord is our communication with others.

ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS FOR WORLD EVANGELISM personnel are rejoicing in the dedication of a Hong Kong church.

"This is our very own church," explained the proud deacon. Evangel Baptist Church in Hong Kong dedicated their premises to God and the propagation of the Gospel a short time ago. No, it wasn't on a 20-acre plot in suburbia. But the joy in the hearts of missionaries and members alike knew no bounds. The group had many memories. ABWE missionaries, Jay and Dorothy Morgan, could look about and trace God's hand through the lives of many of those members. They remembered that the church had its beginning back in 1952 when Rev. and Mrs. Victor Barnett gathered a group of destitute refugees. from mainland China for worship and Bible study. Those poor struggling Christians came from the squatter shacks they called home, bringing their children with them to a small rented building right in the middle of the old Tung Tau squatter area. When the Hong Kong government decided to use the space for another of its Refugee Resettlement projects, the church found a place of worship on the Rooftop which God had so marvelously provided for them. The Morgans conducted a Rooftop school on those premises and the government permitted the church services in the same location. It was there (seven flights up and no elevators) that Jay and Dorothy Morgan saw them grow in the Lord and saw their children mature to adulthood and take their places in the church as teachers and deacons; each one a trophy as well as a witness of God's great grace. Mr. Morgan felt it quite fitting to use as a theme for his sermon, Phil. 1:6 - "Being confident of this very thing, that He which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ."

What a memorable dedication service; joining hands and hearts with those beloved Chinese Christians.

BAPTIST MID-MISSIONS HAS A VERY ACTIVE MINISTRY TO THE Jewish people. The contacts are made in various ways such as campus work, coin and stamp clubs, correspondence courses, state fairs, code-a-phone and for the last five years, our apprenticeship team, Baptist Youth for Israel. One of the successful outreaches has been that of Ken and Blanche White in Rochester, New York, through the CHRISTIAN INFORMA-TION SERVICE. I want to share with you some of the interesting responses received by the Whites.

"To whom it may concern: Please send information in English, including the study course on the Torah, and the New Testament. Thank you."

"Gentlemen: I saw your ad and am interested. But why free? Thanks."

"Gentlemen: Please send me two copies of the New Testament in Yiddish. I am Jewish and intend to remain so. Thank you."

"Dear Sir: Please send me a New Testament in English or Hebrew. I am very interested in this literature. If the study course on the Torah and the New Testament are also available, I would appreciate that material as well. Thank you for your help."

"Dear Sir: I saw your advertisement in the Boston Globe. Would you be so kind as to send along a copy of the New Testament in English for myself, and one in Hebrew for my grandfather. Shalom."

"Gentlemen: I am a Jewish person. I read with interest your advertisement in the Philadelphia Bulletin. I would appreciate receiving a copy of the New Testament in Hebrew. If you have other literature, material or information available, I would like your catalogue or list. Sincerely yours."

"I am Jewish by race, heritage, practice and to some extent, belief. Currently I am searching for something. Thus I have studied many theological systems, which explains my knowledge of the New Testament... I have heard speculations that the two witnesses discussed in Revelation 11 refer to Moses and Elijah. Do you think this correct and possible? Is the Temple referred to in Revelation 11:1 the one which my people are still waiting for to be built? Could you send me some study material dealing with eschatology? I am studying Revelation, but not understanding everything." **EVANGELICAL BAPTIST MISSIONS** has reported the construction of some new

church buildings recently. In Scotland, a new building is being constructed in Currie, just outside of Edinburgh. This is a real testimony to those people in a land where churches are closing and church buildings stand idle and empty. In France the Evangelical Baptist Church in Melun is awaiting word on the purchase of land so that they can begin construction on their building which will accommodate the European Baptist Bible School. In southern France, at Draguignan, a building is under construction which will house the church in that city. In Australia, a new building has just been completed and the first service was recently held.

In connection with these ministries, John and Sandra Clayton and Steve and Ann Kearney have been appointed to the European Baptist Bible School, and Faith Maguire to Scotland.

In its continued growth, the Board of Evangelical Baptist Missions voted to open a new tield in Zambia. William "Jake" and Sandy Schrader, presently on deputation, are anticipating laboring in this new work.

The <u>FELLOWSHIP OF BAPTISTS FOR HOME MISSIONS</u> tells how a new JOY Club was born. It all began with a testimony at prayer meeting. A Sunday School teacher stood to express words of praise to the Lord. The concern in her voice indicated the burden she had to reach the boys and girls of her neighborhood for the Lord. Already a busy mother and deacon's wife, she concluded by asking for prayer that the Lord would help her to begin a JOY Club in her home.

Global Ministry For Singers



On Saturday, June 10th, ten students and Dr. Donald Ellsworth boarded a plane at the Scranton-Wilkes-Barre Airport for California, the first leg of a ministry, which has turned into a global outreach for the group. The singers arrived in Kailua, Hawaii, on June 14th where they sang before leaving for Manila on the 15th.

Our September 1977 BBC Bulletin reported the invitation of the President of Doane Baptist Bible Institute, Iloilo, Philippines, to Dr. Ellsworth to bring a student musicalevangelistic team and come to the Institute for a ministry to the students there. President Zamar is anxious that his Philippino students be trained in the fundamentals of church music.

The BBC musical team will minister in the Institute and in local churches for several weeks until they leave for Hong Kong on July 17th. They will also stop in Iran, Rome, Venice, Munich, Austria, Switzerland, Frankfort area, and London. Through missionary contacts opportunities have opened for a musical ministry in many of these places as well

as an evangelistic and teaching outreach. The group is expected in New York on July 29. Pray for these outstanding Christian musicians as they travel and minister in the name of the Lord. Each of the eleven was responsible for securing his support, which amounted to about \$2,000. We are happy to report that their goal was reached so that all eleven were able to participate in this unique and enriching ministry.

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Saved To Serve

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following writing is a term paper by Miss Jane Sherry, a student at Faith Baptist Bible College, Ankeny, Iowa, which was presented to her missions professor, Rev. Gary Sammons. Brother Sammons sent the paper to Baptist Mid-Missions who in turn shared it with us. We believe that we should do all we can to encourage our young people and so we of the Ohio Independent Baptist count it a joy and privilege to print this paper of one of our Baptist college students. We pray that God will use it to challenge other young people.

Ever since I was saved in the spring of 1973, I have had an interest in missions, although I must say that at first it was more of a "fear" that seemed to plague me wherever I went. I had been introduced to a GARBC church immediately by my friend who led me to the Lord. I had never seen so much emphasis on the idea of missions in all my life. So, naturally, I was curious. There were many new things introduced to me that I had not been aware of before, having been raised in the Catholic Church. But this one aspect of missions seemed to tug at my heart. Although I did not recognize it at the time, I believe the Lord was moving in my heart regarding His will for my life.

As I said, I wondered why missions seemed to be foremost in my thoughts in my new Christian life. Suddenly I recognized that missions does not mean going over to a cannibal island and being boiled in a cauldron! Oh, yes, it could be that, too, but there was so much more! I began to see that missionaries were real people who went to real places throughout the world and possibly risked their lives for the sake of Christ and giving to others the real message of truth

Could it be, I thought, that I would ever become one of those missionaries? I laugh at my ignorance now, as I see how far I have come and how my understanding of missions has broadened. Because of my lack of knowledge of Scripture and my immaturity in the Lord I was more petrified at the thought of becoming involved than anything else.

Yet, I was still curious. "What is missions all about?" I would ask. With the intent to find out, I began reading missionary stories but was soon overwhelmed by the enormous trust and faith such men as Hudson Taylor and William Carey possessed. I was more grieved than relieved, because as a young Christian I couldn't see how I would ever match up to one of them if I did go out to the mission field.

After I came to Faith Baptist Bible College in the fall of 1974, I began to see the school's position toward missions, along with the students' attitudes, through becoming involved with various missionary activities and projects. At first, this involvement scared me off--especially the idea of the Missionary Apprenticeship Program. As far as I was concerned that was too much involvement for me! I was just plain unwilling! But God made me aware that I needed to be willing to go wherever he wanted me to go and do whatever he wanted me to do. So, I made the next step and dedicated my life publicly in my freshman year.

Gradually, God showed me through our missionary conferences, chapel speakers, and missions courses, the needs and blessings that there are in this field of missions. I was still apprehensive, but it began to be clear to me that God had something for me in missions. I didn't feel "called" and had no particular burden for any one people or place, so I began to pray about these things.

As the missionary conference of 1975 rolled around, I was excited and very much open to the Lord's leading. I wanted to find out if He would talk to me through this conference - - and He When Carolyn Renner of Baptist did. Mid-Missions spoke on her participation in Jewish evangelism and what bringing the Gospel to the Jews meant to her, God spoke to my own heart; and for the first time I realized what God felt for His specially chosen people, Israel. This touched my heart, too, and somehow I felt a sudden desire to be able to tell Jews that they are God's chosen people and in need of believing Christ as their Messiah. It was no coincidence, therefore, when Dr. Donn Ketcham, who was the last speaker of the conference, spoke on "Knowing God's Will." He encouraged immediate action if we sensed God's leading in one way or another and so began my correspondence with the five GARBC-approved mission agencies.

I wrote letters to each agency asking for general information: their fields, their work, home office, etc. Each one answered by sending a multitude of pamphlets and information regarding the mission board and its field of service. I also became interested in the summer M.A.P. opportunity to go to Israel and work on a kibbutz, a grand opportunity to witness to Jews. So I began my correspondence with Baptist Mid-Missions, joined their Valuable Information Program family and became absorbed in this many-faceted organization. Organization! That is one thing I will always look for in anything. I appreciate and enjoy anyone or anything where there is a sense of orderliness, cleanliness and just plain organization. For some reason, this seemed to stand out in every way when I considered Baptist Mid Missions.

In the summer of 1976 I spent two months in Israel sowing God's Word and reaping many blessings. One of these blessings was getting to know a few of the Baptist Mid-Missions' missionaries and becoming acquainted with the work of missions on the first-hand basis. This impressed me even more, and so I determined in my heart that God would have me become a part of this family someday. This determination has been affirmed as I have kept close contact with the Mission and have been blessed by personnel who "care" and want to help me as an individual to determine God's will for my life.

Although at the present time God seems to be moving me into another aspect of missions-medical work - I am still positive that He wants me in missions and that Baptist Mid-Missions is to be my choice. The Fall Quarter of 1978 I plan to enroll in Winona State University in **New Pastor At**

Minnesota to begin nurse's training and preparation for the medical aspect of missions. Although I do not know where the Lord would have me use this muchneeded skill, I am confident that He will show me in His own perfect timing.

There are two principles that Dr. Donn Ketcham used in his message on knowing God's will that have made an indelible impression on me and have helped in my deciding how to serve the Lord. Just recently I checked his taped sermon so that I could be refreshed by what had touched my heart before. His first principle is based on Psalm 37:4 - "Delight thyself also in the Lord and He shall give thee the desires of thine heart." Dr. Ketcham said that if we are delighting in the Lord, being obedient in as many ways as we can, with a warm devotional life, then we have the promise that the desires of our heart have been placed there by God. The second principle ties in with this one. It is what he calls the principle of the "rattled door-know." He said that a person can be perfectly willing to do the will of God, willing to go wherever he wants, but then sit and wait for God to open the door. Dr. Ketcham gave some illustrations regarding this. One was how a car won't steer easily unless it is in motion. The other was concerning a person in a building that was on fire where the only possible escape was through one door. He asked if that person would wait for someone to open the door or would he at least run to it and try to "rattle the door-knob." With this in mind, he said we need to set a long-range goal. For me this long-range goal is medical missions. Then, too, we need to set some shorter-range goals that will lead to this major goal. We need to commit ourselves to them and move in their direction and then God will open and close doors as He sees fit.

Thus, I have committed myself to these goals. As I look toward further preparation and anticipate a fruitful ministry, I keep in mind that I have been saved to serve Him - that is my privilege! And serve Him, I will!

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Report On National G.A.R.B.C. Conference

The 47th annual conference of the General Association of Regular Baptist Churches (GARBC) convened at the Lakeland Civic Center, Lakeland, Florida, June 26-30, 1978. A total of 1,030 voting messengers representing the fundamentalist church group registered for the business sessions.

Eleven resolutions were acted upon by the messengers. All were passed by unanimous vote. These included such subjects as: Total Abstinence, Homosexuality, Women and Their God-given Position, The Mother and The Unborn Child, Equal Rights Amendment, Casino Gambling, one that opposed any extension of time for the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment and one urging the release of 400 believers arrested in the Ukraine on May 9 of this year.

Twenty-eight churches were received into the Association at the business session on Tuesday. The General Asso-ciation of Regular Baptist Churches now numbers 1,544 churches.

The finals of a national Talents for Christ contest were held in conjunction with the Youth Day program. Firstplace winners in each of eight categories received a one-year college tuition scholarship. Second-place winners received half-year tuition scholarships.

Other reports given to the assembled messengers included mission agencies, colleges and social agencies.

The missionary committee reported that the following five mission agencies (Association of Baptists for World Evangelism, Baptist Mid-Missions, Evangelical Baptist Missions, Fellowship of Baptists for Home Missions, and Hiawatha Baptist Missions) now have 2,026 missionaries, including 1,336 on the field, 279 on furlough, 232 accepted candidates, and 179 on the inactive or retired list. They further reported receiving nearly \$18.5 million for the work of missions around the world. Regular Baptist missionaries are now serving in more than 63 foreign countries, the United States and Canada. Church planting is their ultimate goal.

On the educational scene the Association now recommends nine institutions of higher learning:

Baptist Bible College of Penna - and Baptist Bible School of Theology, Clarks Summit, Pennsylvania

Cedarville College, Cedarville, Ohio Denver Baptist Bible College, Broomfield, Colorado

Faith Baptist Bible College, Ankeny, Iowa

Grand Rapids Baptist College and Seminary, Grand Rapids, Michigan Los Angeles Baptist College, Newhall, California

Northwest Baptist Seminary, Tacoma, Washington

Spurgeon Baptist Bible College, Mulberry, Florida (approved June/78) Western Baptist College, Salem, Oregon.

The schools(excluding Spurgeon) reported a total of 5,076 students enrolled during the past academic year.

There are also four social agencies recommended by the Association. The Baptist Children's Home of Valparaiso, Indiana, provides child care and foster home placement, adoptive ministry, a home for unwed mothers and family counseling service. The Michigan Christian Home Association of Grand Rapids offers a retirement home and extended care for senior citizens. The Regular Baptist Children's Agency of St. Louis, Missiouri, provides child care and foster home placement, adoptive ministry, care for unwed mothers and family counseling services. Shepherds, Inc., a home and training school for the mentally

limited, is located in Union Grove, Wisconsin.

The international radio voice of the GARBC is "Living Reality," now heard on 54 stations in the United States, the West Indies and the Philippines. Dr. Joseph M. Stowell, National Representative, is the regular speaker on the broadcast. Approximately 10,000 copies of the radio message booklets go out each month to listeners. Also heard periodically on the broadcast is Dr. William Kuhnle, Assistant to the National Representative.

The total number of chaplains, including those on active duty, Reserve Components, National Guard and the Civil Air Patrol, is 78. Of these 78 chaplains, 24 are currently on active duty.

The Baptist Builders' Club, which gives financial grants of up to \$5,000 to needy churches, reported that 14 churches had received grants totaling \$57,500 during the past fiscal year. Since the Club began, 405 churches have shared in grants totaling \$881,340.

One of the far-ranging ministries of the Association is Regular Baptist Press. Brought into existence 26 years ago by the express wish of the churches, the Press now serves over 4,300 churches with Sunday School curriculum materials. In addition to Sunday School literature, the Press publishes books, Vacation Bible School material and gospel tracts, and conducts a Sunday School conference ministry. Gospel Literature Services supplies free literature to missionaries serving under GARBC-approved mission agencies as God provides the necessary funds. Literature was furnished to 22 foreign countries in addition to 27 states in the USA; 372 literature projects were completed during this fiscal year, an increase of 41 over last year.

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
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
