Jones became pastor of this work. The church has been meeting in the Knox County Memorial Building and has grown steadily with a record attendance of 171 reached on Easter Sunday of this year. Church Dedicates Activities Center

On June 29, 1980 a special "Dedication Service" was held by members and friends of the First Baptist Church, Elyria, Ohio. The pastor of the church, Rev. Willis Hull led the people in giving praise to the Lord for the great things He had done! The theme of the service was -"To God Be The Glory". That which was dedicated - "unto the Lord" was their lovely new Activities Center building.

The following appeared in the special bulletin they had for this service.

"The Activities Center, which we dedicate to God's glory, today, began in the heart and mind of Mr. Glen Carey, Chairman of the Building Committee.

"After numerous efforts to provide an expanded ministry at the Washington Avenue location had failed due to cramped conditions and excessive costs, it was deemed wise to build this building.

"Begun on June 12, 1979, it has steadily developed at a very good pace. Dozens of men have expended a total of thousands of hours through heat and cold to see it built. Vacations, days off, long evenings, personal deprivation, aching muscles . . . all of these and much more will be appreciated today and for a long time, but will be fully rewarded in heaven.

"Some have contributed tangible things in the matter of electrical, plumbing, heating, landscaping, parking lot, decorating, furnishings, etc. Our special gratitude is given today to the Green Circle Growers whose many contributions are appreciated in literally every part of this building. Without the numerous gifts of many people, this building would not be here today.

"We are eager to give a word of genuine and heartfelt appreciation for the labor of Mr. Glen Carey. He has shouldered from start to finish the heavy responsibility of this building. Each waking hour (and some sleeping) he has been involved. We praise God for our Brother Glen, and thank him and all who worked with him for this labor of love for God and our church and school.

"Two and a half years ago, this 33-acre site was purchased with the dream that one day the ministries of First Baptist Church would be located here. Little by little that dream is taking shape. Athletic fields, land improvement, full waste treatment facilities and now the Activities Center, each in their time, prove that God is at work in the lifestream of First Baptist Church.

"What is the next step? The Washington Avenue property is for sale. When God sends a buyer or other funds are available, we plan to erect the educational facility of the master plan.

"May we today join in praise for the past, and prayer for the future that we may use what God has given us for the salvation and discipleship of many and that God may lead us on to further accomplishments for His glory."

Everyone seems to forget their own supply. Folding chairs, the metal pulpit and overhead projector are brought up from the basement. My best living room wall picture is removed to use the overhead projector. Bibles, tracts, bulletins, and offering basket are laid out on the dining room table.

Baptist Mid-Missions Triannual Conference

The OHIO INDEPENDENT BAPTIST commends Dr. William Brock and the church family of Maranatha Baptist Church, Columbus, Ohio, for the excellent job which they did in hosting the recent Baptist Mid-Missions Triannual Conference. Well over 300 mission personnel took part in the five-day missions emphasis.

The opening night of the conference, Saturday, July 12, featured a forty minute cantata, "Go Tell Your World," by the twenty-voice Maranatha Christian School Ensemble.

Dr. Allan E. Lewis, President of Baptist Mid-Missions, delivered the Sunday morning message and Rev. William Smallman, newly appointed Candidate Secretary, brought the evening message.

Monday through Wednesday were fully scheduled with services and business activities. Over fifty General Council members were on hand to conduct mission business which included the examination of 33 candidates.

Dr. James Jeremiah, Chancellor of Cedarville College as well as mission Council member, brought a very interesting series on Archeology and the Bible.

Mrs. Myrtle Thompson, Director of the mission's Women's Department conducted a special women's meeting on Tuesday afternoon. Attendance was good as women came from all over the central part of the state.

Immediately following the Triannual Conference was the mission's annual Candidate and Senior Seminar held on the campus of Cedarville College. Some 65 attended the Candidate Seminar while 25 took part in the Senior Seminar. This year's Candidate Seminar class showed an increase of 28 over 1979.

Serving In Jamaica



The Bible Baptist Church of Bedford, Ohio was privileged on June 29, 1980 to commission to missionary service two of their members, Rev. and Mrs. Edward Morrell, Jr. The Morrells are traveling as Missionary Evangelists with The Committee On Missionary Evangelism, whose home office is also in Bedford, Ohio. They will be ministering in the island of Jamaica for six months of itinerant evangelism.

Three New

Ministry Majors

The GRAND RAPIDS BAPTIST COLLEGE announces three new ministry majors for fall, 1980 - Christian Education, Missions, and Pastoral Studies. Each major involves an identical core of courses including a music and worship seminar, an internship, and a Christian Ministries seminar with the College's president, Dr. W. Wilbert Welch. An additional 28 hours of credit is required in ministry-related courses, plus 24 hours in Bible and Theology. Students are required to take an additional minor Cross-cultural studies, linguistics, speech and psychology are among the most appropriate minors of some eighteen possibilities.

The missions major is particularly attractive as a student has not only cross-cultural or linguistics minors to draw upon, but he is also offered five world religion courses including specialized courses on Buddhism, Hinduism, Islam, and Judaism.

The Bible major, of course, is still available. This student can elect over 80 hours of Bible-related subjects in light of a 39-hour major, a required ministry minor, and the possibilities of a Greek minor. The Bible college concept is "alive and well" at Grand Rapids, in addition to the many liberal arts programs.

Three other Bible programs are also of interest. The Basic Bible Studies Program is for students who desire one year of Bible after high school before pursuing other occupational goals. The Special Studies Institute is intended for college and professional school graduates who desire an upper-level one-year program of Bible study. Lastly, the new Associate of Arts degree in Religious Education is a two-year program intended for the paraprofessionally oriented and those interested in continuing adult education.

Rev. Cramer is a graduate of Baptist Bible College of Clarks Summit, Pennsylvania. He received Christ as his personal Saviour through the ministry of the First Baptist Church in North Tonawanda. He was called to pastor the Grace Baptist Church in Sunbury, Ohio beginning March 6th. The Lord is blessing his work in the Sunbury church and area.



In the United States, women spend two billion, four hundred and eighteen million dollars yearly at beauty shops. (\$2,418,000,000) Thirteen billion, four hundred and fifty-eight million dollars is spent in women's clothing stores alone. (\$13,458,000,000) This does not include by any means the other cosmetic purchases made. All of this is done to enhance the outward appearance of the body. So as not to come off as "Pious Pam", it is my opinion that there is nothing wrong with Christian women working on and giving forth an attractive and neat appearance. It is good for their own self esteem, and is an encouragement to those around them. (It can be a testimony to the unsaved.) However, limits certainly need to be set on the time one spends, and the money one spends on the exterior appearance.

As opportunity has presented itself to be in larger groups of women, rubbing shoulders closely at retreats, etc., there is some grooming and special care that we need in an area that is hardly seen with the eyes, unless we would happen to lick our lips. All kinds of things have come from the cosmetic laboratories to control wrinkles, tame the hair, bleach unwanted age spots, but to my knowledge, I've never seen Tame Cream-Rinse for the tongue. "But the tongue can <u>no man</u> tame;" James 3:8. This preventative care comes only from the Holy Spirit, and letting Him do His perfect work in us.

When quick and unnecessary comments have proceeded out of my mouth, I've said, "I didn't think." This is the basic and crux point. When we let God control the mind, He also will have control of our tongue.



ON TARGET

WHAT IS DEPUTATION? IS IT NECESSARY? These are just two of the questions being asked regarding the missionary and his deputation ministry. Because deputation is an important part of the life and work of a missionary, I would like to share some of my thoughts with you on this very important subject.

It is vitally important that we operate on a Scriptural basis in all we do in the scope of missions. Just as we have a Scriptural pattern for evangelizing and church planting, so it is equally important that we have the same basis for the ministry of deputation. In Acts 13 and 14 we have such a pattern set forth for us to follow.

In Acts 13:1-3, the church at Antioch sent forth Barnabas and Saul following the Holy Spirit's call to them for a ministry of evangelization and church planting. Here we have the local church sending out its missionaries in the harvest field. Actually, the word "sent" means "loosed them and let them go." The GARBC-approved mission agencies adhere to this very same Scriptural principle: first of all, God calls the missionaries and, second, the local church sends them out under its authorization. It should be said here that the local church is always the final voice of authority for its missionary. The mission is simply a service agency to assist the local churches in sending out its missionaries.

In Acts 14:25-26, we read of some of the missionary activities: "When they had preached the Word in Perga, they went down to Attalia; and then sailed to Antioch, from whence they had been recommended to the grace of God for the work which they fulfilled." Having had a time of service on the field, they are now ready to return home. It is "furlough time" and they come back to report of their ministry. They have a responsibility to their home church or churches, as the case may be, and they respond very positively to carry out these responsibilities. Acts 14:27 gives us a clear-cut record of this report: "And when they were come, and had, gathered the church together, they RE-HEARSED all that God had done with them, and how He had opened the door of faith unto the Gentiles."

This, then is the heart of Deputation. It is the sharing of the Lord's blessing of the work to which He has called one. It is representation of those who deputized and sent one forth.

In review, first of all God calls; second, the church authorizes the missionary and sends him forth; third he faithfully performs the duties that the Lord has given him; and fourth, he returns to rehearse all that God has done with him.

WHAT IS DEPUTATION? It is a ministry of reporting to the churches. IS IT NECES-SARY? The Word of God teaches it.

The Scriptural basis is, therefore, established. The method, it seems, has not been so well established. There is no doubt but that, "Faithful is He that calleth you who also will do it," and, "My God shall supply all your needs according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus." The divine principle is to supply the needs of those whom He has called forth. If I understand this correctly, then there should be no lack of supply when it comes to the need. The question arises, "But there is a lack. There are missionaries in need of their support."

This is true and it brings us to the question, "Why?" To understand the problem a bit better, we must remember that God works through people - human instruments. They are people, as you well know, who are prone to disobedience and failure. One might ask, "Could God's people hinder His worldwide ministry?" or "Could they be the cause for the lack of funds in missions?"

My response to this question is a definite, "Yes." The Scriptural principle is established, but the employment of the principle by His people marks the place of failure. The causes are too numerous to list in this writing. The good news is that they can be corrected.

Reams of material could be written on deputation, but it is my intention to focus only on our Baptist churches, Baptist mission agencies and Baptist missionaries. We should not expect our own Baptist missionaries to go outside their family for their support. By conviction they hold the same separatist position as we do. They are our responsibility. I'm convinced that there are more than sufficient funds within our independent Baptist circles to meet the needs of every missionary whom God calls forth from among us.

Word From American Council Of Christian Churches

The American Council of Christian Services in their Fundamental News Service - Volume III No. 3 (Editor: B. Robert Biscoe) had the following articles which we felt would be of interest to our readers.

ONE MORE STEP DOWN -

The National Council of Churches is sponsoring a symposium for the purpose of developing a joint worship for Christians and Jews. The proposed guidelines are that all prayers should be addressed to God alone and should not be in the name of Jesus. There is also to be no mention of the Trinity.

From the Christian viewpoint - prayer is not prayer if the name of Jesus is omitted.

EVANGELIST, SOCIAL ACTIVIST PRAISE ECUMENICAL COUNCIL –

In separate addresses before the 266 member Governing Board of the National Council of Churches (WCC), representatives of two seemingly divergent trends within American Protestantism - evangelist Rev. Billy Graham and social activist, Rev. Ben Chavis affirmed the work of the NCC.

Mr. Chavis, who now heads the United Church of Christ Washington office of the Churches Commission for Social Justice, one of the "Wilmington 10", who had been convicted and imprisoned on charges of fire-bombing a white owned grocery in North Carolina, told the Governing Board that its work and pronouncements on human rights at home and abroad "have an affect not only on the national government, but on the national conscience."

The Rev. Billy Graham gave glowing approval to the extensive research and advocacy work for the cause of disarmament of the Council, although the Southern Baptist Convention, to which Mr. Graham belongs does not belong to the NCC. He told the Governing Board, "Our hearts are with you in many of the things you are doing."

MILITANT ATHEIST'S SON BELIEVES IN GOD.

It is not everyone who can startle a nation by announcing he believes in God, but most people weren't raised by militant atheist Madalyn Murray O'Hair.

Special News Items From Mid-Missions

- - The Peruvian Baptist Seminary of Trujillo, Peru, founded by Baptist Mid-Missions and now in the nationalization process, reports that an "encouraging problem" (unprecedented growth) has been partially solved with the purchase of two and one-half acres of land near a bus line not too far from the center of Trujillo. National churches have given sacrificially to help meet this need and seminary leaders ask for special prayer as the construction of the first functional building begins.

- - June 25 through 29 were great dates in the history of Baptist Mid-Missions' ministry in Peru. Missionaries and national leaders met together in Lima for the formal organization of the Peruvian National Mission, which already has eleven national missionaries laboring in distinct areas of the country. Dr. Allen Lewis, President of Baptist Mid-Missions and Rev. Robert Collins, Foreign Missions Secretary of Spanish America and the Caribbean, challenged and provided specific orientation for national pastors for such an emphasis some two years ago and that missionary seed is already producing fruit.


William J. Murray III apologizes to God and to the American people for his part in the ban on Bible readings and in building his mother's "personal empire" the militant atheistic organization, the Society of Separationists.

"The part I played as a teen-ager in removing prayer from public schools was criminal. I removed from our future generation that short time each day which should rightly be reserved for God. Inasmuch as the part to destroy the tradition of prayer was brought in my name, I feel gravely responsible for the resulting destruction of the moral fiber of our youth that it has caused."

Murray said he believes in a "Supreme Being" who can't be defined by man. He occasionally attends the Unitarian Church and believes it unimportant if a person is a Jew, Moslem, Protestant or Catholic.

He left fed up with the "negativism of atheism" and his mother's organization.

Murray said he would not fit into an evangelical or fundamentalist category and had turned down appearances on evangelical Christian television programs because he did not want to be used by people who believe in a "punishing God."
