

Athletic Center Nears Completion



Front Entrance To New Athletic Center

As Cedarville College entered the 1980's, the college found itself at a dramatic crossroads. Rapid growth over the past few years forced the Board of Trustees to make some decisions which would have a long term effect on the college's programs.

Our cafeteria was last expanded in 1967 when enrollment was 822, compared to the projected enrollment of 1,600 for 1981.

The heavy use of the facilities by our traditionally-strong physical education and intercollegiate athletic programs for men, combined with the high interest in our expanded women's programs (an area unheard of when the present facility was constructed), taxes our present gym facilities to the fullest.

-Scheduling difficulties for the gym are even more evident when one considers the strong intramural sports program that involves 80% of the student body.

-Offices for various campus organizations are practically non-existent.

-Limited areas for student socialization are available in only a few of the dormitories, and those are with limited

On the one hand, there was a conservative solution to the problem facing the College: simply retain the present level of facilities and limit enrollment. On the other hand, there was a bolder solution expand the facilities and allow the greater number of qualified young men and women seeking a high quality Christian education at Cedarville College to be admitted. The trustees determined that the College would not be content to maintain the status quo. Instead they giant step forward—surely a step of faith and dependence on our great God, but one which would be the most comprehensive remedy to our growing pains; that remedy, a \$2 million Athleticcenter.

We are excited about the wonderful facilities that will become available with the completion of this center. "The new fieldhouse has been designed with the whole Cedarville family in mind," says Athletic Director, Dr. Don Callan. It is designed with maximum open space to give it a great deal of versatility. The structure will have four basketball courts, four volleyball courts, three racquetball/ handball courts, 1/10 mile running track, pole vault area, long jump pit (for indoor track), two tennis courts and eight badminton courts. In addition, the attached

facility houses locker rooms, training room, storage and equipment rooms, a laundry room, a weight room, as well as a wrestling/tumbling room. The wellequipped building will not only meet the needs of an expanded men's and women's physical education, athletic, and intramural program, but it will also house student center facilities as funds become available.

This new complex will greatly relieve the heavily taxed athletic facilities and will allow the college to triple the size of the cafeteria area by freeing the present student center gymnasium. Additional offices will be made available for counseling, placement, and financial aid.

With commitments of nearly \$250,000 by Cedarville College trustees, and in excess of \$70,000 by faculty-staff, the College has pledges amounting to \$1,300,000. With only \$700,000 remaining in the project the College is turning to individuals to complete the

With the majority of the work done on the Athletic Center, the College is excited about the potential for the building. However, if the workmen relax their pace the building will never meet its Fall deadline opening. So it is with finances. Cedarville staff has worked hard to get us over the financial hump in the college's biggest undertaking to date. We are now on the downward spiral of the last \$700,000. To relax the intensity would mean not to meet the goal of a Fall 1982 payoff. The College is relying on individuals to give personal gifts to the effort. However large or small the gifts may seem to be, they are all an integral part of a complex financial framework that is a part of the completed financial

The time of rapid growth for a young teenager is often awkward and uncomfortable. The best remedy for those "growing pains" is to continue to stretch out and work the muscles toward perfecting a healthy body. Cedarville College faces the 80's with growing pains; we continue to stretch out and continue to work towards perfecting the ministry God has for Cedarville College.

Wonderful Words of Life

A Poverty Stricken Youth Turns Hymn Writer

In 1848 a ragged little ten-year-old boy walked from his log cabin home in the woods of Clearfield County, Pennsylvania, to the neighboring town of Rome. He had brought a basket of berries to sell so that he might add a few pennies to those he was saving to buy a cheap violin.

Walking the streets in search of a market for his berries, the lad heard strangely beautiful music. He hurried toward the house from which the enchanting sound came. It must be a piano, he thought, because his mother had told him about the sound. The only instrument he had actually heard was a flute he had whittled from a

Putting his basket on the steps, the boy ventured to the open door. When

Christ, the blessed One gives to all Wonderful words of Life. Sinner, list to the loving call, Wonderful words of Life,

the lady saw him she abruptly stopped playing. Phillip Bliss related in later life that he begged the lady to "please play some more." Instead of being accommodated, he was ordered away and scolded for making tracks on the porch with his dusty feet.

Before he died in a railroad wreck in his thirty-eighth year, Phillip Bliss was to write many a song that ladies would be playing on pianos for generations. He usually wrote his own words to his melodies, most of his themes being taken from sermons.

As editor of his highly popular "Gospel Songs" . . . for which his royalties ran more than \$30,000, the boy who had once been denied the luxury of hearing a piano, wrote:

Wooing us to Heaven; Beautiful words, wonderful words, Wonderful words of Life.

Sweetly echo the gospel call, Wonderful words of Life; Offer pardon and peace to all, Wonderful words of Life. Jesus, only Savior, Sanctify forever; Beautiful words, wonderful words,

Wonderful words of Life.





Baptist Mid-Missions' **Candidate Seminar**

Candidate Seminar is the culmination of the lengthy process of the screening, grilling and orientation of future mission-

Before a prospective missionary ever gets to seminar he or she passes through 1) preliminary approval of personal and academic preparation; 2) formal application including local church approval, psychological testing, references, physical examination and doctrinal statement; 3) oral examination before the General Council of Baptist Mid-Missions as to their conversion, call and convictions. Those who survive this ordeal by fire are invited to the pleasures of Cahdidate

Now that the mission has gotten thoroughly acquainted with each candidate, it is time for the candidate to get thoroughly acquainted with Baptist Mid-Missions.

This fifteen-day orientation period covers five major areas through classes, discussions, demonstrations and readings.

- MISSION POLICIES AND PRINCI-PLES: basic policy, finances, home office, constitution.
- 2. FIELDS OF SERVICE: presentations covering all 38 current fields plus other approved fields awaiting new personnel. Some candidates arrived at seminar undecided as to their field and everyone finished with a firm sense of God's direction to a definite field. A survey of the history of the mission links candidates to pioneer members of the family,
- 3. FIELD WORK: church planting, language aptitude, culture shock, maintenance of buildings, maintenance of health, ministry workshops, leadership, separation, the faith principle, field council administration and other helpful studies.
- 4. INTERPERSONAL RELATIONS: getting along with one another, conflict management, women on the field, spiritual maintenance, continuing studies, family life enrichment, ethics.
- 5. DEPUTATION MINISTRY: contacts, slide/tape presentations, displays, prayer cards, prayer letters, photographic equipment, the missionary message.

New Gym Gets \$200,000 Boost

"This is the largest single gift ever received by Cedarville College," stated college president Dr. Paul Dixon. "This will give our fundraising efforts for the new Athletic Center a great boost." Dr. Dixon was referring to a recent letter he received from The Kresge Foundation informing Cedarville College that they were to be the recipients of a \$200,000 challenge grant.

Chosen from among 1,551 charitable organizations that made qualified proposals to the foundation, Cedarville was one of 176 to receive grants. A total of \$33,354,000 was given to organizations in 39 states, the District of Columbia, and Canada. This was the first Kresge grant that Cedarville College has ever received.

The grant "challenges" the recipient to complete funding for an ongoing project. In Cedarville's case, this is the \$2 million Athletic Center. Nearly \$1.5 million has already been received or pledged, and the goal is to raise the remaining funds before school opens September 28. If \$300,000 can be raised, The Kresge Foundation grant of \$200,000 will complete the project.

The Kresge Foundation was created solely by the personal gifts of the late Sebastian S. Kresge. Since 1924, appropriations of over \$416 million have been made to institutions in the areas of higher education, health care and related services, the arts and humanities, social welfare, science, conservation, and religion.





Interview With Mr. Michael DiCuirici

Michael DiCuirci, professor of music at Cedarville College, recently returned from a trip to Australia with the Kingsmen Quartet. The following is an interview made with Professor DiCuirci that gives insight into his ministry this summer and that of the Missionary Internship Program at Cedarville College.

O.I.B.: Professor DiCuirci, what is the M.I.S. program at Cedarville College?

DiCuirici: It's a unique program whereby teams from the college are sent to the mission fields of this country and around the world to assist missionaries. They get their support from churches and individuals, and the college provides their

O.I.B.: What makes the M.I.S. pro-

DiCuirci: It's the training process. The young people are ready to serve as soon as they step off the plane. Also a thorough screening process insures that no spiritual deadbeats are sent out.

O.I.B.: How many teams were sent out this summer?

DiCuirici: Two teams traveled to Australia, and one to Brazil. The men's basketball team ministered in the Philippines and the girls' basketball team served in China. Besides this, a number of individual students ministered in other countries including the U.S.

O.I.B.: Where in Australia did your team minister?

We began in the Sydney area. DiCuirci: Two and one-half weeks later we switched with Rev. Harold Green's team and worked in Melbourne.

O.I.B.: What kind of ministry did you have;

DiCuirci: The Kingsmen sang, and I played trombone and preached. We served in churches, public schools, nursing homes, and shopping centers. It was exciting to present the Gospel in public schools during the day and see the kids return to our services that night held in the local church. By the way we held 75 concerts in five weeks.

O.I.B.: Were you able to record any tangible results?

Yes, although statistics never DiCuirci: tell the complete story. We praise the Lord for 64 decisions for Christ, some for salvation and others for rede-

O.I.B.: Did you sense that the M.I.S. program from Cedarville has had lasting effects upon the missionary work in Australia?

DiCuirici: Yes, this was really evident. A missionary said, "It's like Christmas when Cedarville College comes." They really do look forward to it with baited breath, and they would desperately miss us if we didn't come. They have their largest church attenddance when we are there and I suppose that more decisions for Christ are made. And then there is the rich music ministry which they so enjoy. In Australia they say, "If you come once, we know that you care. If you come twice, we know that you really like us. But if you come a third time, we are convinced that you love us."

O.I.B.: How did you personally benefit from your ministry in

DiCuirci:

I think that it is safe to say that it changed my whole life. One, it gave me a new appreciation for Cedarville College's M.I.S. program. Two, it spoke to me about the untold millions who are lost and without Jesus Christ. Three, it convinced me about how much we take for granted in this country. Many of the Australian churches do not even have a piano, much less an organ. I didn't see one choir. Four, I was surprised to see so few men in the churches. We need to pray for Australian manpower! Five, I received a firsthand picture of the difficulties of missionary life day-to-day in a foreign land. And lastly, I was impressed with the financial need of our Australia missionaries. Inflation is high and it's tough to meet expenses.

O.I.B.: Can you describe your feelings about what you saw of the continent of Australia?

DiCuirci: It's a beautiful country. We were there in the winter and the trees and bushes were still green. Sydney has the prettiest harbor that I've ever seen,

and the cities are really clean. Of course, there is the unusual wildlife - kangaroos, etc. I was impressed with the bird life. You can buy a cockatoo there for only \$12. It would cost \$1,200 if you bought one in the U.S.

It must have been trying at O.I.B.: times to continuously be in close quarters with the same 5 individuals.

DiCuirci: Actually, our relationship together as Christian men was one of the highlights of the trip. We tried to mix up as roommates in order to get to know each other equally. We had regular, daily devotions and constantly were in prayer for one another. I'll always have a special place in my heart for those fellows.


O.I.B.: Lastly, would you go back to Australia?


God willing, it would be a pleasure. Only this time, I would take my wife and son. The only way to adequately know about the work going on in Australia is to be there personally.
