The Master's College Defends Title in Shootout

Greenville, SC – When the final results were tabulated at the 2003 NCCAA Men's Golf Championship, held October 13-14 in Panama City Beach, Florida, The Master's College Mustangs' had successfully defended their 2002 title. However, the 2003 title came under great pressure as Malone College (OH) and Southern Wesleyan University (SC) made final round charges. Master's 599 total for the two-day event edged Malone by 1 shot and Southern Wesleyan by 2. This represents the smallest margin of victory in the history of this seven-year-old event.

Leading the Mustangs' was Ryan Higton (145), Chad Wensel (150) and Seth Cotter (152). This trio all earned All-American honors for their efforts. Joining them on the All-American team were medalist, Adam Harding (142) of LeTourneau University, Keith Cunningham (146), Scotty Jones (152), Grant Gates (152), all from Malone College, Jon Guenthner (149), Nick Gottfried (149), and Matt Cheezam (151) each from Southern Wesleyan University, Spring Arbor University's Shaun Page (151) and Jeff Malburg (152), North Greenville College's Matthew Bayliff (151) and Darrell Ketola (152) and Todd Chin (152) of Indiana Wesleyan University.

Playing the Bad and the Ugly nines of The Hombre Golf Club in Panama City, Florida, the players faced a rain-soaked layout featuring well-protected greens that put a premium on ball striking. When the clouds finally blew out early into the final round, the sun was a welcomed sight but the 20 mph winds that accompanied the sunshine left players uncertain of club selection and required patience. As one player stated, "We went from throwing darts at soft greens to trying to hit the wall the dartboard was attached to."

The Master's coach, Jim Lundstrom, was named NCCAA Coach of the Year and Southeastern College from Lakeland, Florida was recognized as the top NCCAA Division II team as they finished at 682 for the two days.
