Herman Stormont Writes Letter

Is With The American Expeditionary "Forces-Letter Passed Censor and Was Cut in Numerous Places-Receive Good Treatment, Plenty to Eat and Good

Mr. Herman Stormont writes very interesting letter from "some where" in France to home folks. Says that he is well and feeling fine and now seeing active service, being quar-tered in an American camp. Every thing is better than we have had since I joined the army. I have been called out as a carpenter along with five others but when we went to get our tools they gave us pick and shovels to help build a railroad to transport supplies up to where we are to build a large machine shop. The 82nd squadron is to build it complete and we want to make a record for our-selves by building it the best and in the shortest time.

There are quite a number of fellows that always shirk when they have a chance and always find fault and say they won't work and try to pass for sick but they have a way to make them work here without putting them in the kitchen or the guard house like they do at Kelly field, Texas.

Our squadron hasn't any trucks or aptos here yet and I guess I will have to be a carpenter for a while but will try to be transferred to a squadron working on airplanes or get a job driving and caring for officers cars. We have the finest and best bunch of officers that it would be possible to get together. We are _____from the firing line. This is the largest American camp in France. I am going to try and locate P. H. Creswell if I can, don't know whether he is here yet or

The weather is not very cold, I suppose not as cold as in Greene county. We had our first snow Jast week. It only gets about 20 to 25 above here so they say. We go to drill at 7:00 a. m. for 45 minutes, then work from 8 to 12 and from I to 3:30 p. m. For breakfast we have pancakes, syrup, coffee, and bacons for dinner, pota-toes, meat, soup, and hard bread




