## **Stop the Bleed Training Open to Community**

**CEDARVILLE, OHIO** -- Cedarville University's School of Pharmacy will offer its Stop the Bleed program on Thursday, May 30 from 6-7:30 pm at Cedar Care Village Pharmacy. The event is free of charge and open to the public.

Stop the Bleed focuses on how to properly control bleeding by using hands, dressings and tourniquets. The team of pharmacists from the school of pharmacy and Cedar Care Village Pharmacy will lead the 90-minute program. It will focus on providing assistance to individuals who are bleeding prior to emergency 911 responders arriving on the scene. A team of Cedarville faculty and students instructed high school students in Honduras earlier in May on the Stop the Bleed program.

Stop the Bleed is a worldwide initiative teaching people how to control massive bleeding.

"Anyone in health care, education, manufacturing, agriculture or any place people could be injured are taught Stop the Bleed," said Dr. Jeff Huston, associate professor of pharmacy practice. "It is such a great program, so we want to teach it to people in the Miami Valley who are interested in helping others in their respective community."
