
Modern Conditions.







In spite of your efforts, you will find that the wedding ring moves If a man is holding the string the wedding ring will commence slowly to Mrs. Ella Medaris of Middletown sway back and forth along the fork. sways a ross the fork. With some people the movement is slight, while with others it is marked, but at all times it is unmistakable.

> Now here's the most curious part. If a woman is holding the string when the movement across the fork has once been firmly established, let a man place his right hand firmly upon her left hand which rests upon the table. The ring will be seen slowly to stop its cross movement and after a few moments the motion will be reversed. The ring will swing the length of the fork.


