FAST TIME NEW NEIL HOUSE TO BE FOR STATE beautiful hotel buildings that can be BY LAW

Shall the legislature force Eastern time on the entire state?

Are you favorable to Eastern time the year round? If so write to your Representative from this county or to your State Senator from this district. There is now a bill before the legislature that if passed will make Eastern or fast time the legal time instead ( of Central Standard time as we now have it.

The Interstate Commerce Commission has placed the Eastern half of the state on Eastern time. The section of the state East of the T. & O. C. railroad from Toledo south.

The only argument infavor of the fast time proposed is that the state would have uniform time. When that is said all has been said in favor of a change.

A number of cities have adopted the fast time notable Cincinnati, Dayton and Springfield. This applies to the summer months only,

There are many disclyantages to the fast time for rural sections during the winter. It matters not what time we have legalized the farmer must be guided largely by the sun. The farmer has plways opposed the fast tim during the summer in that his help was forced to quit at an hour too early to be profitable. The extra hour was worth nothing in the morn-

As for the farmer housewife the fast time in winter means arising one hour earlier if there is children te prepare for school. It is claimed now by some farmers that children in the Eastern part of the state must leave home before daylight is well on to get the busses for school. It has been
