## **Musicians Graduating With Re-Imagined Recitals**

**CEDARVILLE, OHIO** -- The junior year may have ended on a low note for Cedarville University class of 2021 music students, but they hope to end on a high note in their final semester with re-imagined senior recitals.

This year's senior recitals include Micah Yeh, a music major with a focus in trumpet performance; David Kravets, a music ed major with a concentration in choral and voice; Wright Harvey, an oboe performance major; Jacy Stahlhut, studying music with a concentration in harp performance; and Landon Cina, a music composition major.

All recitals will take place in the Dixon Ministry Center Recital Hall. Attendance will be limited based on Cedarville's "Caring Well. Staying Well." COVID-19 guidelines. The performers' family and friends will be given precedence, but once their seats are filled, attendance is open to the public. Everyone attending the events will be required to wear masks and follow the six-foot social distancing guideline.

The first recital will be Saturday, Feb. 20, at 3 p.m. and will feature Yeh, who will be playing a variety of pieces ranging from Gershwin to the Arutunian trumpet concerto. He will also perform a duet with Cedarville trumpet professor Charlie Pagnard, who gave Yeh his first trumpet lesson in 2011 during a visit to Cedarville to see his older brother.

Yeh is also a ROTC Army cadet and will be commissioning as an active-duty 2nd Lieutenant upon graduation.

Kravets' spring voice recital will take place Sunday, Feb. 21, at 7 p.m, featuring works by Schubert, Brahms, Rachmaninoff, Tchaikovsky and others. He will be accompanied on piano by Brienna Wiegner. When reflecting on this past year, Kravets said, "Despite the inconveniences that the pandemic has caused, I think it has highlighted the strength of the community on this campus and within the department."

Harvey's recital will be held on Saturday, March 20 at 3 p.m. and feature works from Bach, Mozart, Gordon Jacob and Charles-Édouard Lefebvre. The concert will also be live streamed on YouTube.

"I'm really thankful that my professors were able to find a way to rehearse large ensembles in a safe environment this year," Harvey said as he reflected on his senior year.

Stahlhut's recital will take place on Saturday, March 27 at 3 p.m. and feature three solo works and three chamber works, among which are pieces by Salzedo and Debussy. Her junior recital was canceled due to COVID-19, leaving her unable to perform a chamber piece she had been working on with six other musicians. In January 2020, Stahlhut's sister underwent a very long and critical surgery.

“That semester was very influential for my reliance on God’s faithfulness,” Stahlhut said.

Cina’s music composition recital is on Saturday, April 10, at 11 a.m. and will showcase original music he composed throughout his time at Cedarville, performed by 18 other Cedarville music students in various combinations throughout the recital. Cina plans to apply to graduate school post graduation to pursue music composition.
