HALL OF FAME

Whitehead, editor of Cedarville, who was interviewed here, has been named as one of the Hall of Fame for Ohio newspapermen, if such should be deemed by the Ohio Newspaper, published by the School of Journalism, Ohio State University. Reid, before he went to the New York Tribune, was editor of the Xenia News, an early newspaper here, from 1888 to 1893. His first assignment was to "cover" the initial commencement exercises at Antioch College, Yellow Springs.

He was later with the Cincinnati Gazette, as legislative correspondent, war correspondent and Washington correspondent. He went to the New York Tribune in 1899 and four years later became chief proprietor of that paper, which he held until 1905.

He was the author of nearly a score of volumes of wide character, including newspaper subjects and checked the climax of his career as ambassador to the Court of St. James, London, England.

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
