WE SAY LET IT COME SOON

Now that Secretary Wallace once more is going to save the nation and make farmers rich by a magic stroke we find the head figure jugglers in the Department of Agriculture are out this week with a statement that farm labor is the most depressed of any class in the United States.

If these figures from the Wallace department are correct probably the Roosevelt Social Security Board in Washington is right in urging that all farm labor and domestic help for homes, numbering 16,000,000 persons, be placed under federal control for New Deal experiment.

Farm labor at \$24 a month also gives John L. Lewis and his union leaders just ground for demanding a minimum wage for farm as well as industrial labor.

We hope the Wallace-Lewis idea of social security and minimum wage is forced on farmers at the earliest date that the fruits of the New Deal can be spread to all classes.

LIFTING THE COVER ON "BRICKER-DAVEY" DEAL

Democratic papers followed up a well laid plan to mix Gov. Davey and John Bricker in the governorship contest. John McSweeney, Democratic candidate for Congressman-at-Large traveled through the Seventh District last week-end spreading the report in Democratic circles that Davey and Bricker had formed an alliance and that in Hamilton county Bricker was to be traded off for Democratic support of Robert Taft over Robert Bulkley.

Just why deals and trades should be made in view of straw votes it is hard to conceive that Republicans would want to jeopardize chances of winning by cross trading. What gave ground for the Sweeney report was that Democrats are much peeved because the Democratic Enquirer refuses to support "Rubber-Stamp" Robert Bulkley for senator.

As we see it Gov. Davey might help the Republicans in Greene county by cleaning house in the Old Age Pension Board. The law requires two Republicans and two Democrats on that board but as constituted it is three Democrats and one Republican.

The Herald calls Gov. Davey's attention to the fact that Member Oglesbee secured a pension for his mother after she had transferred her interest in real estate. The Governor might also find out whether the mother of the board member while an inmate of the County Home did not receive a pension in violation of the law?

We bring this to the attention of Mr. Sweeney, Gov. Davey and also Charles Sawyer, the Democratic nominee. There is no question but the house cleaning will start soon after John Bricker becomes governor.

Mr. Sweeney has done a very poor job of spreading a smoke screen in the Seventh District.

Bernard Baruch, who pushed Woodrow Wilson into the World War; who is a Wall Street operator; who misled Herbert Hoover on domestic as well as foreign affairs; who is known as a representative of International Bankers, calls on Roosevelt to build more battleships, fighting airplanes and more coast defenses.

It was only a few weeks ago that European powers met at Munich, Germany, to plan for peace. It was then England to save herself and establish a supposed friendship for Hitler, agreed that Germany should have what she wanted from the Czechs. It was not to avert war that England became alarmed but her fear of both Hitler and Mussolini acting jointly.

Hitler has his eye on South American countries and this disturbs Baruch and Roosevelt. Mind the Munich treaty was to once more avert W.A.R. Now Baruch and Roosevelt are planning for more war equipment. One day it is "Roosevelt and Peace" and the next it is "Roosevelt and War."

A Greene County Democrat of the old school evidently has not been satisfied with what his party has been doing in this county, it reports are correct. It seems this Democrat who had publicly objected to the party being used by Roosevelt-Wallace Communists, was the object for attack from a few New Dealers in his community.

It was a boozing party at the Bulkley-Taft debate in Dayton last Friday night. No charge has been made that Republicans had anything to do with it. Under the terms of debate management each political party committee was to have equal number of tickets for free distribution. More than 4,000 persons attended the debate. One feature of the debate was that Robert Taft, the Republican candidate for U. S. Senator, used debating methods and only used notes for reference.

Who pays Charles West for "Roosevelt political planning" out west? That is a question that is troubling Democrats. Jim Enley says West does not have any connection whatever with the Democratic National Committee. He, Enley kicked West out of his office in Washington, even placing the West desk out in a hall. West has been drawing \$10,000 a year pimping for Roosevelt and getting his check from Uncle Sam each month

with campaign. He is paid for a speech in Ohio. None of the big bugs want credit for the West meeting. Roosevelt brought West out as a candidate against Vic. Donahay, Friends of former Gov. George White are sore at West for double-crossing in the White campaign. West has been doing the West for Roosevelt. The situation is complex.

Dispatches this week tell us that Sen. Robert Bulkley, multi-millionaire, Cleveland, has been willed \$50,000 by a relative in the East and will also receive one-twelfth interest of the residue of the two million dollar estate. This with the rents amounting to \$100,000 or more a year the Bulkley family is receiving for buildings in Cleveland rented to government departments, and the \$12,000 a year and traveling expense as Senator should keep the wolf from the door at the Bulkley home.

One of the few old time stores in Xenia will soon close its doors if all reports are true. The owner evidently feels he has contributed his share to the Communistic New Deal. With the shipping in of provisions and now that clothing for men will soon arrive, there is not much chance for a merchant to break even.

We heard Secretary Wallace in his broadcast speech a few days ago from Springfield, Ill. The Secretary evidently is fighting with his back to the wall. The applause was nothing what it has been early in the New Deal administration. Wallace now answers many objectionable statements with the little three-letter word. He denies that the south is producing corn to compete with the north on cotton acreage.

Hitler is at stake at issue if we follow the New Deal. We have more reason to fear Civil War to protect property than invasion from Hitler or Mussolini by water or air.

The number of large packing houses proves that much of the pork demand is supplied from southern farms. All this gives a different picture than what Wallace claims in his speeches. The south is in direct competition with the north not only in producing manufactured goods but agricultural products as well. Empty northern factories proves this and kraft paper mills of the south placed a crepe on the Hagar Straw Board & Paper plant on Xenia ave.

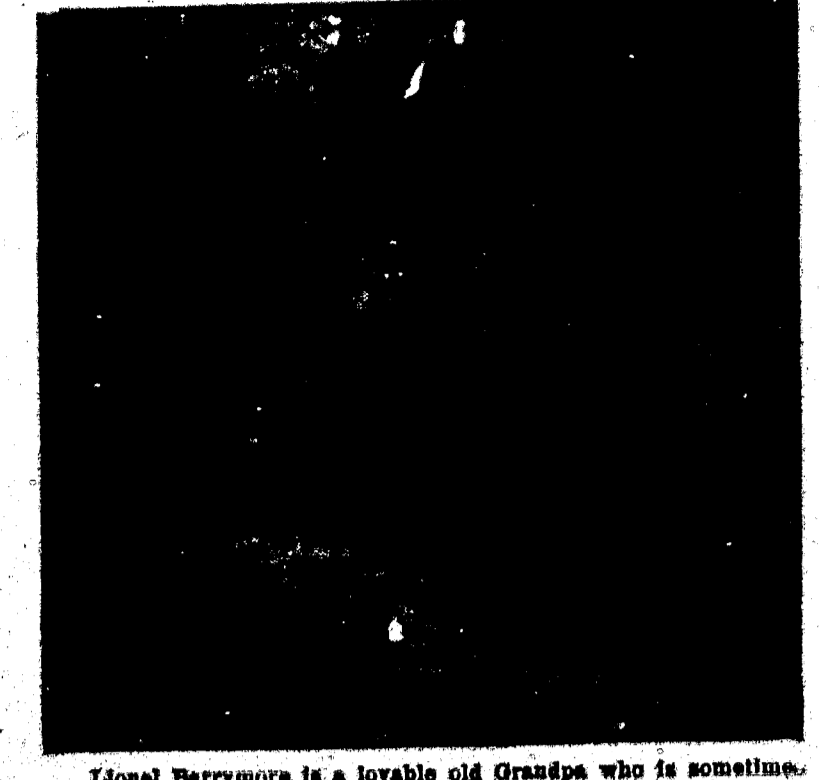
