## W. F. Orr Trapped by W. A. Smith, Colored, in a Crooked Business Deal.

Last week the Herald exposed W. F. Orr in that he gave a check to Richard Bowman of Xenia for coat when he had no money in the bank. The statement of what we found on the Clerk of Court's books has brought out many other things in private and public life that has had a tendency to awaken voters of this county as to the kind of a man that is out for office.

One was No. 3109 and sent May 11, 1901 and cashed by W. F. Orr, May 20, 1901. The other was No. 3393 and was sent June 6, 1902 and cashed by Orr June 7, 1902. These receipts Smith still has, having obtained further proof only a few days ago from Frank Orr, Xenia postmaster and brother of W. F. Orr.

W. A. Smith had no knowledge where the note was until he was notified a few days by M. J. Hartley, who is settling the Jackson Holmes estate that there is a note against him for \$15 long past due. Smith upon receiving the notice became out of humor as any other man would after having been trapped. He communicated with Mr. Hartley

and found that there was no credit on the note and here is where W. F. Orr must answer. The circumstances were related to Orr by Hartley, who denied that there ever was a payment. He did not know of the receipts from his own brother showing that the Xenia office had honored the orders. Later Orr has the nerve to write Smith and "explain" how it happened.

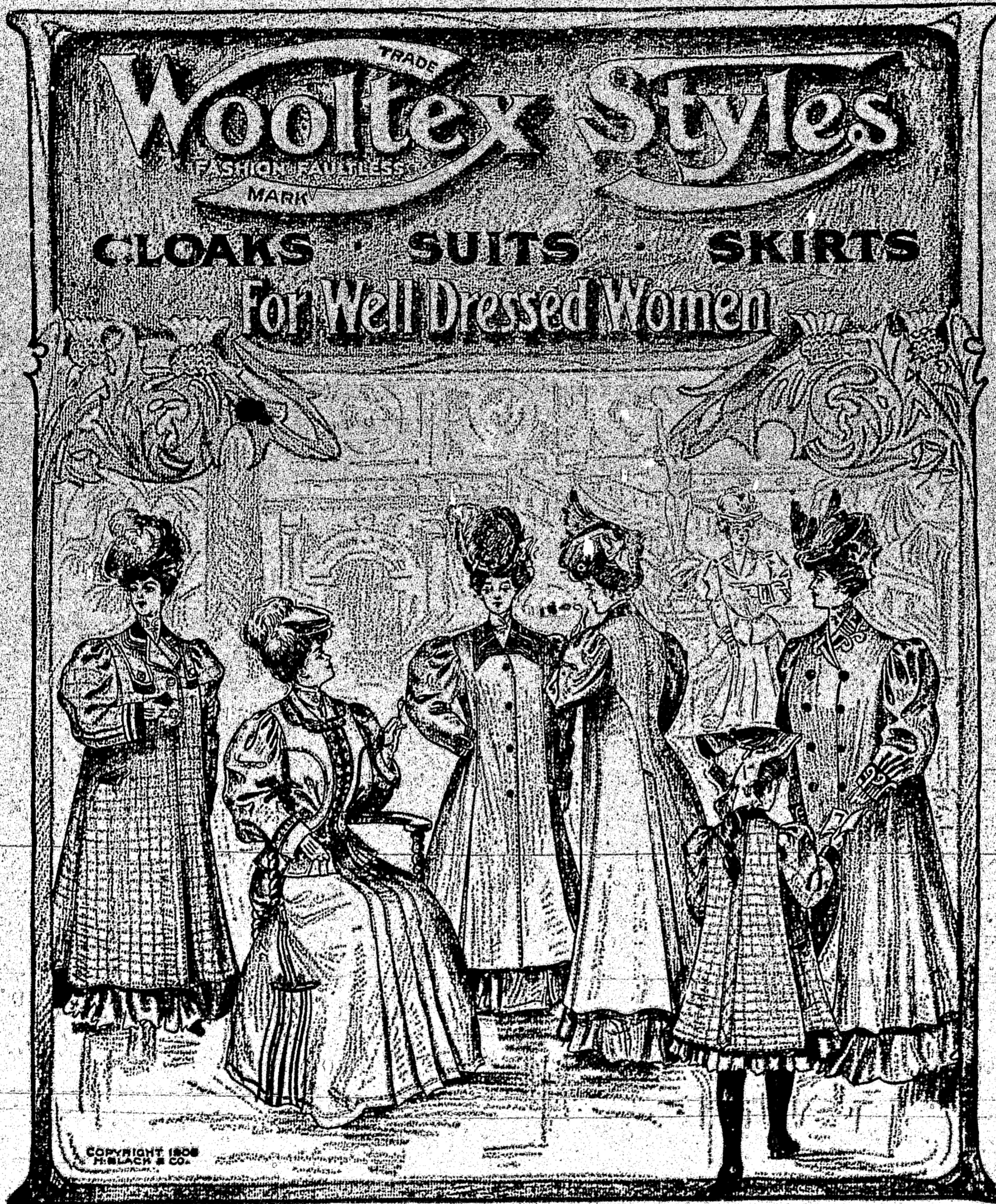
