CANDIDATE FOR REPRESENTATIVE.

According to the July settlement of the Pow tax this county has 27 saloons of which 24 are located in Xenia. Osborn has three. The July settlement amounted to \$10,600.

RIDGWAY CASE IS CONTINUED.

The case of Charles Ridgway for keeping a place where intoxicating liquors are sold and receiving wet goods under a fictitious name was called Thursday morning.

The arrest was made last Saturday afternoon and Ridgway entered a plea of not guilty before Mayor Wolford. His bond was fixed at \$600 and signed by T. B. Andrew.

When the case was called yesterday morning a number of motions were filed. J. A. White of Barnesville, attorney for the Anti-Saloon League, asked for a continuance until one week later owing to the absence of some of the state's witnesses. The W. C. T. U. turned the prosecution of the case over to the Anti-Saloon League. Attorney Harry Armstrong of Xenia represented the defendant. Should the defendant be found guilty the maximum fine on each charge would be \$200.

TEMPERANCE RALLY.

The temperance rally in the opera house last Sabbath evening resulted in a meeting that aroused considerable sentiment against local violation of the liquor laws. Rev. W. J. Sanderson, president, while Rev. Mills Taylor and Dr. H. C. Middleton made short speeches. The out-of-town speakers were Mayor W. F. Brown and Rev. F. O. Ross of Xenia. There was special music for the evening.

SMALLEST WOMAN.

The sudden death of Miss Sadie Roland, the smallest woman in Ohio, at Xenia, has cast a gloom over a legion of friends, residing around her home in Greene county. Miss Roland was born January 20, 1879, at Mt. Holly, O., and resided in that vicinity until she became a young woman. She weighed but 30 pounds and was a little less than 30 inches in height. She had been in comparatively good health until last Wednesday, when she was suddenly stricken, and since Friday night was unable to recognize the relatives and friends who watched around her bedside.

In the course of a moving picture exhibit Monday at a vaudeville house at Lebanon, the portrait of President Roosevelt was thrown on the screen causing an outburst of applause and cheering which lasted 17 minutes. The show was stopped and the managers joined in the wave of enthusiasm that swept over the little theatre. Police volunteered to restore order, but the management said, "No, let them yell."

COUNTY'S SHARE.

A draft for \$784.50, Greene county's proportion of the State Common School fund, in the semi-annual August settlement, has been received by the county auditor. The settlement is made at the rate of 95 cents per pupil for each enumerated school child.

The enumeration of school youth in Greene county for this year was 7801, an increase of 80 over the number for 1907. Of the total number of enumerated youth in 1908, 2510 live in Xenia, against 2314 shown by the city last year. In Xenia the number of males enumerated was 1324, and 1186 were females. In 1907 there were 1394 males and 1220 females in the city.

Mr. Darlington was sitting talking to his wife and E. D. Smart when he suddenly said, "I believe I am going to faint." He was assisted to the couch and died a few seconds later. He was 71 years of age. He graduated from Wittenberg in 1859 and studied law for two years in Springfield. In 1876 he with Judge Winans and H. L. Smith, formed a law partnership. For a number of years Mr. Darlington has been the attorney for the Pennsylvania railroad, Little Miami division. A wife and one son, Charles L. Darlington of Cincinnati survive him. The funeral was held Monday afternoon.

RESOLUTION.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Village Council of Cedarville, Ohio, that a contract for the lighting of the streets, lanes, alleys and public places of Cedarville, be and the same is hereby awarded to The Cedarville Light and Power Company, a corporation under the laws of Ohio, which contract shall be in the words and figures following to-wit:

CONTRACT

This contract made and entered into this 16 day of July A. D. 1908 between the Village of Cedarville, a municipal corporation under the laws of Ohio, party of the first part and The Cedarville Light and Power Company, a corporation under the laws of Ohio, party of the second part witnesses:

1st. In consideration of the covenants of the party of the first part hereinafter contained and other considerations to said second party moving from said first part, said second party does covenant and agree with said first part to furnish to the party of the first part not less than twenty-five (25) electric lamps for lighting the streets and public places in the Village of Cedarville, at the places to be designated by said first party, and as many more than twenty-five (25) of said lamps and at the same annual rental as shall be required from time to time by the order of the Council of said Village.

2nd. Said lamps shall be arc lamps known commercially as Standard Two Thousand Nominal Candle-power and shall be operated at not less than four hundred and fifty (450) watts per light.

3rd. Said party of the first part to have the option to have said lamps operated upon an all night schedule or upon a midnight schedule and may change from one to the other upon the order of the Council of said Village. The midnight schedule shall include service from early evening to 11:30 p. m. (standard time) with morning service six months in each year (November, December, January, February, March and April) from 4:30 a. m. to daylight.

Whichever schedule be used, all night or midnight with morning service as aforesaid—said lamps shall be operated upon the Philadelphia Moonlight schedule starting promptly thereafter and continuing to the time designated thereby for stopping and in addition thereto said lamps shall be lighted at all dark periods before and after the time fixed by said schedule when the necessity for the same is apparent.

4th. Outages may be charged against said party of the second part, and it is agreed, may be deducted from the amounts hereinafter stipulated by the first party for such lighting, by the following plan, to-wit: In case one or all of said lamps shall be out or so defective in lighting power as to furnish practically no light and shall remain so for the period of one (1) hour during the time they should be lighted as herein before provided for, there shall be deducted from the amount so to be paid, said second party two (2) cents per hour per lamp for such time as they remain out of use. Such outages may be reported to the Village Clerk by any responsible citizen and an account shall be kept of the same by the said Clerk. In case the parties hereto shall not be able to agree as to the amount of said outages, the same shall be arbitrated by the Mayor of said Village.

5th. Said party of the first part shall have the right at any time to test the power of such lamps by calling in a non-resident electric expert to examine and test the plant, electric appliances and lamps of said second party; and if the same shall be found below the standard herein fixed, a deduction proportioned to the decrease in candle-power may be made by the said first party, on the failure of the said second party to bring the said lamps up to the standard herein provided for after five (5) days' notice of such defect.

6th. All poles shall be set and the wires strung in accordance with the ordinances now in force governing the same, and the party of the first part shall have the right to change the location of any of the lamps at any time during the life of this contract by paying the actual cost of such change except that said second party shall furnish the wire necessary for change free of charge.

7th. For lighting the streets and other public places of said Village in the manner and subject to the stipulations hereinafter made, said party of the second part doth hereby contract and agree with the said party of the first part to furnish and operate said twenty-five (25) or more arc lamps in accordance with the above provisions for a midnight schedule and morning service as aforesaid for the annual rental of fifty-four dollars (\$54.00) per lamp or for an all night schedule for the annual rental of seventy dollars (\$70.00) per lamp, payable in monthly installments for the full period of ten (10) years in one of said rentals (dependent on which one is used) beginning on the 1st day of January A. D. 1909 and ending on the 31st day of December 1918. And as further consideration for the covenants and agreement on the part of said party of the first part, said party of the second part agrees during said period of ten (10) years to furnish eight (8) lights free of charge for the council chamber and engine room in said Village.

8th. For the purpose of carrying out the provisions of said contract, said party of the second part does hereby undertake and agree to furnish and fully equip its said light plant with the necessary machinery and appliances of the latest and most improved pattern and keep the same in good repair at all times during the life of this contract. And said party of the second part does hereby agree with said first party to enter into a bond in the sum of \$1000.00 to the approval of the Mayor of said Village, and to be given simultaneously with the execution of this contract which bond shall be conditioned for the faithful performance at all the agreements and covenants of this contract by it to be done and performed.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, The said Village of Cedarville has caused its name and corporate seal to be affixed and the Mayor of said Village duly authorized has signed the same and the Village Clerk has signed the same and The Cedarville Light and Power Company has also signed the same and affixed its corporate seal by its proper officers duly authorized this 16th day of July A. D. 1908.

ORDINANCE.

To regulate the prices which The Cedarville Light and Power Company may charge for electric light during the ensuing ten years.

Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Cedarville, Ohio.

SECTION 1. That during the period of ten years from and after the passage of this ordinance and its acceptance by The Cedarville Electric Light and Power Company said Company may charge for the electric light furnished to the citizens or private consumers 15 cents per 1000-watts. In case the amount consumed by a private consumer in any month shall not equal or exceed 50 cents per month then said Company shall be authorized to charge said consumer the sum of 50 cents for said month as meter rent but said meter rent charge shall be in full of all charges for electric light consumed in said month. If payment is made on or before the 15th day of each month for the preceding month a discount of 10 cents per 1000-watts shall be allowed.

The said The Cedarville Electric Light and Power Company shall furnish all night service to private consumers whenever there is an all night schedule in force and operation for lighting the streets and public places in the Village and midnight and morning service whenever there is a midnight and morning schedule in force and operation for lighting the streets and public places in the Village. And said The Cedarville Light and Power Company shall extend its lines for commercial lighting from its corporation line to corporation line north, south, east and west and furnish electric light to all private consumers within the corporate limits of the Village who may desire the same for the prices above specified.

The said The Electric Light and Power Company shall in no event during said term of ten years charge for electric light furnished as above mentioned more than the prices herein specified.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its acceptance by the said The Cedarville Light and Power Company and its publication as required by law.
