RETRIBUTION FOR TAYLOR.

At Least the Friends of General Keifer Don't Shed Any Tears Over His Defeat.

Made Speeches Against Veteran Congressman.

Accused Him of Voting Against Immigration Measure Wanted By Junior Order men.

HELPED BEAT HIMSELF

Jamestown Aspirant Made Lots of Trouble for Himself Every Time He Spoke.

The following article was taken from the Springfield Daily News: Though General Keifer studiously avoids making any comment, his friends see in the defeat of Jesse Taylor for congress in the Sixth District a bit of retributive justice that is by no means displeasing to them.

As has been noted from the returns from this county and to a certain extent from other counties in the Seventh district, General Keifer fell behind the ticket, slightly, but noticeably. Those who were not aware of the true inwardness of the situation have ascribed this to the fight which was made upon him in regard to pension legislation. It is stated, however, by those on the inside, that this had little or nothing to do with the slight loss which General Keifer sustained.

Taylor Attacks Him.

General Keifer himself attributes the knifing which he underwent solely to the attacks which were made upon him nearly two years ago by Jesse Taylor.

Taylor was at that time a paid legislative representative in Washington.

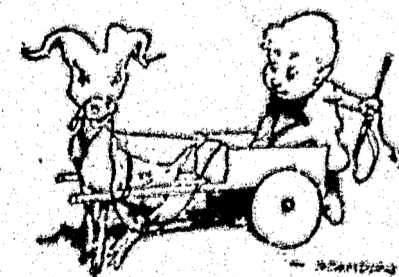
General Keifer was interested in an immigration measure which did not go as they wished. Taylor thereupon denounced publicly every congressman who had not in his estimation voted as the order desired.

General Keifer denied the charges made by Taylor. He now declares them to have been lies. He taxes Taylor with maliciously trying to misrepresent him. He avers that his stand on the immigration measure would have been perfectly satisfactory to the Juniors if Taylor had not placed him in a false light.

Has a Sharp Tongue

It was known to Keifer's friends through the campaign that he would have to suffer some from this source. Two years ago this winter, Taylor spoke in all the Springfield Junior Order lodges and what he said about Keifer was sufficient to Taylor has unfortunately for himself a sharp tongue and a habit of sarcastic speech. He lashed General Keifer. He painted him as an enemy to the American workingman, asserted that he was no true patriot and said other mean things. After Taylor was nominated as the choice of the two factions of the

Republican party in the Sixth district there was not noticeable any indication of cordial relations in the campaigning in the Sixth and Seventh Ohio District. So far as is known the two Republican nominees met but once during the campaign.

They Probably Spoke.

That was on the day that Judge Taft came through Springfield on his way from Middle Bass Island to Cincinnati. General Keifer had been with the candidate while at Middle Bass and Taylor who was attending the state council of the Juniors in this city went up to Urbana and got on the Taft train. When the train pulled into Springfield, General Keifer introduced Taft to the populace and Taylor stood behind the big man and placed his steadying hand on his shoulder when the train lurched.

It was remarked at the beginning of this recital that General Keifer doesn't say anything when his friends remark in his presence, with ill-concealed satisfaction that Taylor got beat. Undoubtedly General Keifer as a party man is sorry that a Democrat is going to represent the Sixth District again; but just a plain human being, he may have other feelings.

Jay Jesse Got His.

His friends however, have no seal upon their lips. They come right out and say that Taylor got what was coming to him. They say that he told untruths about General Keifer and that his relations with General Keifer were of a piece with the "dumb politics" which he played throughout his entire campaign and he managed it in his own way. His friends told him that he would be better off if he did not talk so much, yet he held meetings constantly and paid the bills himself if the committee did not arrange them for him.

It is stated that the Democrats had in their possession two sets of letters which Taylor had sent out to the vets and drys in the district. Taylor had at one time been a vigorous anti-saloon league speaker, and had posed as a leader of the movement, yet at the same time he failed to get the support of the temperance and church people, particularly in his own county. This was the occasion of bitter complaint

that he had been berated by both sides.

Called the Editor Names

One of the strongest factors in his loss of Greene county, which voted more than 2,000 plurality for the head of the Republican ticket, was the attitude of the Cedarville Herald, a Republican paper, Karl Bull the owner, opposed Taylor but mildly until Taylor made a speech in Cedarville in which he applied offensive epithets to Bull. Bull cut loose in the next issue of his paper and attacked Taylor personally.

Eyer, move Taylor made seemed to get him deeper in the mire. He played with the machine in Greene county, and so maneuvered that he lost its support and the support of the reform element as well. He had for a number of years fought the organization and its candidates and these all united to do him harm when he was a candidate. Taylor lost every county in the district but Warren and the Democrats were split by local factional troubles.

Denver Has District Solid.

On the other hand Congressman Denver remained at home the greater part of the time and allowed things to take their own course. His friends are naturally elated and are claiming big things from him in the future. They point out that he has twice in succession carried a district normally, Republican by more than 4,000 majority and that he is stronger than ever. He has been able to do much for the district among them, securing an appropriation for a government building for Xenia, which the city has been vainly trying for years to get. He has recently been given a high sentimental standing in the Democratic party because of the honors heaped upon him at Denver last summer at the time of the Democratic National Convention, the city of Denver having been named for his father, the late General Denver.

It is now believed that he can go to congress as long as he wants to stay. It is believed that he has a hold on the district which cannot be shaken.

DEATH OF G. W. HARPER.

George W. Harper, a life long resident of this county and one of the best known men in this part of the state, died at 5 o'clock Friday evening at the age of 88 years. For several weeks the aged financier had been in poor health. For about a week he was a patient in the McClellan hospital in Xenia but there was no hope of his recovery and he was brought home.

Mr. Harper was born May 20, 1820 in Ross township. His grandfather John Harper was a native of Virginia and Harper's Ferry comes from this family name. The father of the deceased settled in Ohio in 1812 in what is now Ross township.

Mr. Harper was one of Ohio's large land owners. He and his wife have about 5,000 acres, 2,000 being in Greene county. In early life the deceased after finishing school entered the cattle business in Illinois and Indiana driving them through to the Philadelphia markets. While in this profession he boarded with Abraham Lincoln, whose acquaintance resulted in a warm friendship between the two. Being successful in this Mr. Harper purchased more land and his wife kept the

house in an early building. His fortune is estimated at half a million. He was considered to be the wealthiest man in the county.

In 1850 Mr. Harper was united in marriage to Miss Virginia Murray of South Charleston, an estimable woman, who still survives him.

In 1858 Mr. Harper started the Cedarville Bank and continued this enterprise for several years, in Exchange Bank acquiring the property owing to the advanced age of the founder.

Mr. Harper kindly remembered Cedarville College during his life time by a gift of \$5,000, which has been greatly appreciated. He held decided views along political economy lines and was prominent in Democratic circles. He was a member of the Methodist church and for several years was a trustee.

The funeral was held Monday from the residence, burial taking place in the cemetery north of town.

The services were in charge of Rev. W. E. Puff, who was assisted by Dr. W. R. McChesney.

The pall bearers were T. W. St. John, Andrew Jackson, T. B. McElwain, R. F. Kerr, R. Hood and C. W. Crouse.

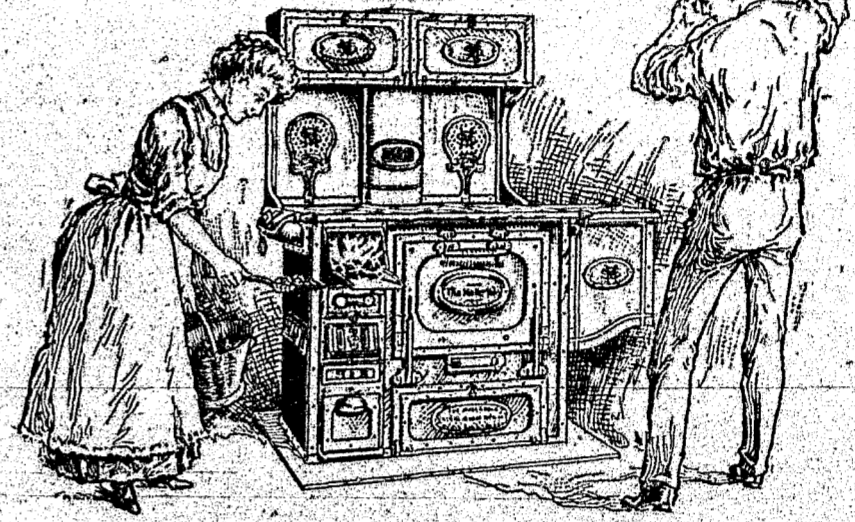



Oyster Farming.

Oyster cultivation is not an American idea. History tells of the early Romans having caught oyster fry on branches and raised oysters quite successfully and from time to time this and other methods of cultivation have been attempted in various European countries.

Oyster farming in America dates back to the year 1851, when certain East river (New York) oystermen, observing that young oysters fastened in great numbers to the shells of other oysters, started the practice of shelling their beds and the ground contiguous to them just before spawning time.

It would be hard to find a better definition of oyster cultivation than submarine agriculture—for as the farmer so must the oysterman prepare, seed and cultivate his land. As with the farmer also, eternal vigilance is the one price of success, for weeds will grow, waste matter will accumulate, enemies will lie in wait.—National Magazine.

Queensland's Ups Tree.

Queensland, Australia, has a curious tree which sometimes kills all insect life and sometimes birds also. A traveler says of it: "The seed vessels of the Queensland ups tree, 'ahmo' of the blacks (Pisonia brunoniana), which are produced on spreading leafless panicles, exude a remarkably viscid substance approaching birdlime in consistency and evil effect. Sad is the fate of any bird which, blundering in its flight, happens to strike against any of the many traps which the tree in unconscious malignity hangs out on every side. In such event the seed clings to the feathers, the wings become fixed to the sides, the hapless bird falls to the ground and as it struggles heedlessly gathers more of the seeds, to which leaves and twigs adhere, until by aggregation it is inclosed in a mass of vegetable debris as firmly as a mummy in its clothes."

Too-tee-total.

About September, 1833, Dicky Turner, the converted weaver, when delivering one of his fervid speeches in the Temperance hotel, Preston, the cockpit where the ears of Derby formerly fought their cocks for three centuries, in favor of the new pledge, declared with emphasis that "nothing but the tee-tee-total pledge would do." Mr. Joseph Livesey upon hearing this immediately cried out amid great cheering, "That shall be the name." The newly coined word was taken up by the succeeding speakers and was afterward used at all the meetings held in the town and neighborhood. It was soon adopted in every part of Lancashire and was eventually accepted as the true designation of total abstinence not only in the United Kingdom, but throughout the civilized world.—London Mail.

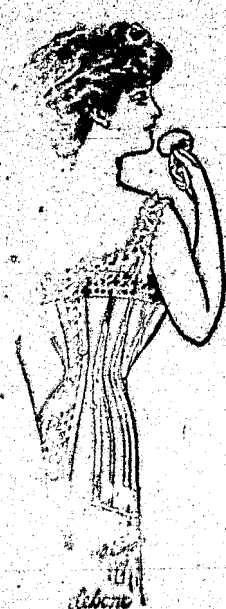

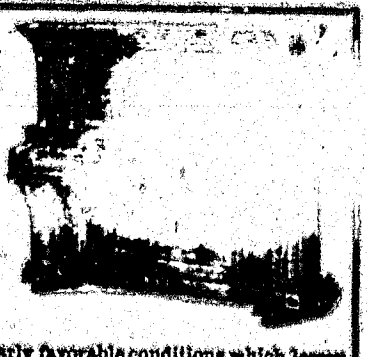
